Friday, 18, 1966 Pho-Loi-Viet Nam

Well I was glad to get some mail from collegues, back home. This shows interst and that is something. Well the situation here depends on first where you are, but after getting out 10 miles from Siagon it is pretty dangerous. write. We are 40 miles from Sigon and carry friles and clip all time in Battery area. We were shelled by VC morters 3 wks ago. Our tents are full of holes and we were doing low, low crawl. We were in the middle of a fire mission and a morter hit outside the pit and every day snipers shoot into the area but never no damage or anyone hurt.

After a week over here you never pay any mind to it. Well I am filling sand bags and guard at night and

TEMPORARY REGISTRATION

The temporary registration period will begin on Thursday, March 3, 1966 and will end at midnight on Thursday March 17, 1966.

Please note that the only persons eligible to register during the temporary registeration period are persons subject to payment of the poll tax leived for the year 1965 "who have not obtained a poll tax receipt for this

years elections. No one except a person who was subject to payment of a poll tax for 1965 may register under this law. That person is one who was between 21 and 60 years of age on January 1, 1965.

er county will not be required to register in this county during this registeration period.

Persons who have already paid their poll tax for this years elections are considered as having registered and will not be required to registered again. This law will not change their voting priviliges in any way.

An application for registeration may be made either in person or by mail at the county tax office in Wheeler.





New employees of the Soil Conservation Service, USDA, received instruction in radiological monitoring in a school held in the conference room of the Plain Coop Oil Mill in Lubbock.

Instructors for the school which concluded Tuesday afternoon were furnished through Headquarters III Corps and Fort Hood CBR Intelligence Division, G2 Sector B CBR Center and by the Soil Conservation Service.

Secretary of Ag. Freeman said the Nation's soil and water conservation districts have an exciting and challenging role in rebuilding the gates of rural America so they open in as well as out, reports Dusan Pakan, chairman of the Wheeler county soil and water conservation

Freeman, in a talk prepared for the 20th annual

meeting of the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts at New Orleans said the greatest contribution that rural leadership cam make today is to enable more people to live rich and rewarding lives where the space is...in the

country side. Freeman emphasized the country side must be equipped with adequate educational and health services, water and sanitation sustems, facilities for job training, social services and cultural activities. It also must provide more industries, businesses and service institutions, since the people who live here must be able to work here.

Soil conservation leaders who today apply their skills in conservation planning and practices to the broad range of natural resource uses essential to community development have a vital role to play in this undertaking, he said.

Of the new tools in rural development, Freeman cited President Johnson's proposed Community Development District concept as one of the most promising for the advancement of the soil conservation district principles.

Through these new proposed district, he said soil conservation district leaders can help achieve the conditions necessary for economic and social advancement in rural areas and provide greater opprotunity for more people.

Whe wise use of natural resources is combined with the programs of health and education to improve human resources, we see more clear ly that conservation is concerned not with nature alone, but with the total relation between man and the world around him, Freeman said.

"The objective is to raise the quality of life and to give it new dimension.

County Agent Reports TAXATION

OF REBATES

Agricultural Cooperatives: Many farmers and nonfarmers recently have received an IRS form 1099 from a cooperative with which they did business during 1965. These patrons may not under stand the distrinction between taxable and non-taxable rebates from coopera-

Rebates on payments for goods and services that are for personal use and not income producing are not taxable. Examples of such goods plicated situations require would be fertilizer and insecticides used for home beautification and feed and grooming supplies for a saddle horse that is not used to produce income. An example of a service would be a food locker used for fammly food. Generally, rebates on purchases that are business expenses must be reported as income and rebates on puchases that do not qualify as business expenses are not taxable.

Members of cooperatives are usually obligated by the By-laws of the Association to take taxable rebates into their tax account-ability in the year in which they are allocated. Non-member patrons usually acquire this same responsibility by signing a consent certificate or a qualified check for at least twenty percent of the rebate. The non-member who does not consent may defer tax accountability for non-cash rebates until they are redeemed for cash.

The cooperative does not

al and business services and is required to report payments aggreating \$10 or more to any

person during any calendar year. When the form 1099 is received by a patron, he should determine what part of the rebate is one personal goods and services and what part is on business operations to insure proper tax

Wheeler county livestock producers have certainly been inspired by the strong demand for beef in the recen weeks. Higher prices for all classes of cattle has been reflected at all the markets. Livestock producers are optimistic about the prices continuing at a high level into the summer and fall if world conditions remain as they are today. Stocker cattle are selling approximately six cents per pound above prices at this time last year. With cows and bulls selling well above last years prices, and higher than they have been in several years, t appears that 1966 would be a good year to take a close look at a herd and sel low producing animals and animals that a producer has been intending to cull.

Higher livestock prices has been partially attained by having 1 percent fewer cattle in the United States on January 1, 1966 as compared to a year ago. The official count in the United States is 106.6 million cattle and calves on farmers and ranchers as compared to 107.2 million on farms a year earlier. Dairy stock numbers (milk cows and replacement heifers) continue to decline and were o percent below a year earlier. This reduction was practically offset by a I percent increase in the number of other cattle, mostly for beef. January 1, 1966, marked the end of seven years of record inventory

for all cows. Texas farmers and ranchers went counter to those in the nation by increasing their holdings of cattle, sheep, hogs, goats and chickens as compared to a year ago. Texas cattle numbers increased 3 percent during 1965 to 10,546,000 head on January 1,1966. The 1965 calf crop was up l percent.

Sheep numbers in Texas

increased by 8 percent dur-

ing the past year; hogs by 7 percent; goats 9 percent; chickens 1 p ocent and turkeys 66 percent. Nationally there was a 4 percent decline for all hogs and pigs on farms one percent fewer lambs and sheep; one percent fewer chickens (excluding broilers); a six percent decline in number of dairy cattle and a

six percent increase in turkey numbers. These figures are all based on January 1, 1966 inventories and were obtained from the Texas Livestock Reporting Service.
