HINCLADS WIN REGIONAL

Cold drizzling rain water soaked track did not deter the Wheeler Track team as they competed for regional honors Friday and Saturday, April 22 and 23 in Lubbock. With a total of 21 points the Wheeler team won the Bookers Kiowas, 11-10, and the regional championships. Rule 112 points was Wheeler's largest score.

Allison's team-Punk Hillness-took sixth place in the meet. Punk Hillness won first in pole vault and placed second in 100 yd. dash and 220 yd. dash for a total of 24 points. Punk Hillness was state in all three events. High point man for Wheeler was Tom Smith with 28 points. Tom Smith started the Wheeler Mustangs on their way to victory with a first place win in the 100 yd. dash with a distance of 21.12". He is anchor man of the first place winning 440 relay team and also anchor of the third place Mile relay team. Ten points were earned for his first place 100 yd. run in 2:08.3. He will go to state in three of the four events entered at regional.

Tom was Wheeler's only representative at state in track meet. He placed second in broad jump and second in the 880. The first place winner in each of these events graduated last year, which increases Tom's chances of winning. Despite the weather the Wheeler team broke the school record Friday. The record standing since 1961 was 44.1, the standing record is 43.9. The team's time was greatly improved with switching the first and second man. The record was broken in the preliminaries; time of 44.0 was recorded on Saturday's finals for first place.

The 440 relay team members were David Jamison, Bobby Vanpool, Mike Lewis and Tom Smith. Frankie Rogers placed fourth for one point in the 200 high hurdles. His time was 16.8. Bobby Vanpool placed fifth in the 100 yd. dash. His time in the event was 10.4. Rogers and Rick DeArment placed seventh. Wheeler's mighty mile relay team came in third with a time difference of 9.2 between second and third place. The relay team placed second in the preliminaries. Time for the mile relay run was 3:37.6. Team members were Rogers, Vanpool, Villard and Smith. Coach Hill placed the wet track account for the slow time on each of the race.

Dan Dorman and Gary Hardcastle failed to place in their events. Dorman threw the shotput and Hardcastle pole vaulted. Coach Hill's hair is a little grayer and he might have a few ulcers after the preliminaries of the broad-jump. Smith had three tries. He scratched the first two and the last jump had to be over 18 feet to qualify for finals. The third jump with "4" to spare before scratching. Smith jumped 20'9" for second in the preliminaries. Needles to say Coach Hill and Asst. Coach Harrison are extremely proud of the showing the boys made at regional.

Three events, Broadjump, 880 yd. dash and the 440 relay will be entered at Austin at the state meet May 6-7.

GRAND JURY RETURN ELEVEN INDICTEMENTS

Indictments were returned Monday, April 25, 1966 at the April term of Court of Wheeler County, Texas, 31st Judicial District on the five men charged with the March 15 attempted burglary of the First State Bank of Mobeettie. Four men were indicted on the February 25 burglary of Hyland's Pharmacy, Production Credit, Strickland's Grocery of Shamrock and Cicero Smith Lumber Co. Indicted for the attempted robbery of the Mobeettie Bank were Tim Overton, 26, Jerry B. James, 25, Fred Hedges, 28 all of Austin; Clifton Bowen, 34 of Slaton; and William Brown, 40 of Chickasha, Okla. Two indictments were re-

turned against James Overton and William Robert Brown (together) for the burglary of the Wheeler county precinct barn and the theft of a county dump truck on March 17. Jerry Ray James and Clifford Henry Bowen were indicted for the theft of a 1956 International 3/4 ton pickup belonging to Bill Rains March 16. Indicted in the February 25 burglaries were Billy Joe Helms, Donnie Mack McCullam, Charles Riley McCafferty and Ted Jerry Valentine. The Grand Jury indicted Thomas Puryear for Assault with intent to commit rape on February 4. Billy E. Satterfield was

indicted for theft and Freeman Bean will face trial on charges of Assault with intent to commit murder upon Raymond Schlegel on February 23.

Dear Sir: I have wanted to write a letter to you and the Readers of the paper for a long time. We have been living out here in Mrs. W.L. Williams farm home since July of 1963. It is a lovely place to live and we have met some mighty nice people since living here, but last night as we attended the school music program that the children took part with the help of the bands and their music teacher and the talk the young man made, "An American." I went back home with the feeling that I had been to church; as I sat on the west side of the building, I thought about what the Bible says; "and a little child shall lead them," when they were singing the last song, "The Battle Hymn of the Republic," I could really feel the Holy Spirit, we ought to be awfully proud of our schools and teachers when we can go to a program such as was—so sweet and lovely. You know this world is just a dressing room and we are just passing through. All that we can do to make a better place for our children and their children, is all that makes life worth living. I pray that our "Blessed Country" will always be free where children can sing: "Till Jesus comes and takes us to his Pearly White City," May God bless all who read this and may all of us learn to love each other more each day we live. Letter from VIET NAM

April 8

Hi Folks, How about passing this letter around. I just got in off an operation. I haven't slept in 48 hours. I haven't had a shave or bath in 11 days and I don't mind telling you I'm bushed. We think we'll be going out to open up the Mang Yang pass in 2 or 3 days so we haven't got much time to get the tanks back in shape. Now down to this last operation, we were attached to the first Air Cavalry division and then back to the Third Brigade 25th inf. division. We set up a blocking position along the Cambodian border just north of the La Drang Rivier, (about the size of Washita Creek.) Lt. Baker, our XO, caught three round in the leg and lost his leg. Lt. Rand, one of my buddies from Ft. Knox, caught four rounds across the chest from a bunker in Cambodia and was killed instantly and two of my men received minor wounds from mortar rounds that dropped in on us about 1 o'clock in the morning and April 3rd. Lt. Rand had been married less than a year and his wife is expecting in about a month. I was really sick about him and Lt. Baker, so the next day I took my platoon orders to recon the Cambodian border. We are forbidden to cross the border, but it's not to well defined. My map reading got pretty sloppy and I stumbled on to those bunkers. (accidentally, of course.) My platoon knocked out three bunkers and got credit for killing four V.C. We splattered Charlie all over the Cambodian landscape with high explosive, cannister and Machine guns. John and Alton, take my advise and stay out of this war. It's the most frustrating thing in the world. Charlie kills or maims your buddies then runs to Cambodia or Laos and if you chase him you have everyone from Generals on down chewing on you. I haven't been chewed yet, but I'm expecting it. It sure does feel good to hit back though. I finally got Charlie where he couldn't run from me and I maulled him. He just can't fight tanks. He gives it one hell of a try but he just doesn't have it and he only tries when you corner him. Just before we hit those bunkers, I was so scared I was shaking but after the fight started I was to busy fighting and running my platoon to be scared. It sure is a weird feeling but I'm not a bit sorry for the men I killed. I've seen too much misery to worry about Charlie. Sis, I love you and I'll see you soon. Don't worry about me. I'm straight, I'm too scared to get killed. It's the heroes that catch it, not us cowards. I've gained back some weight. I guess those C rations agree with me. Well guess I'll close and try and get a little sack time. Chuck

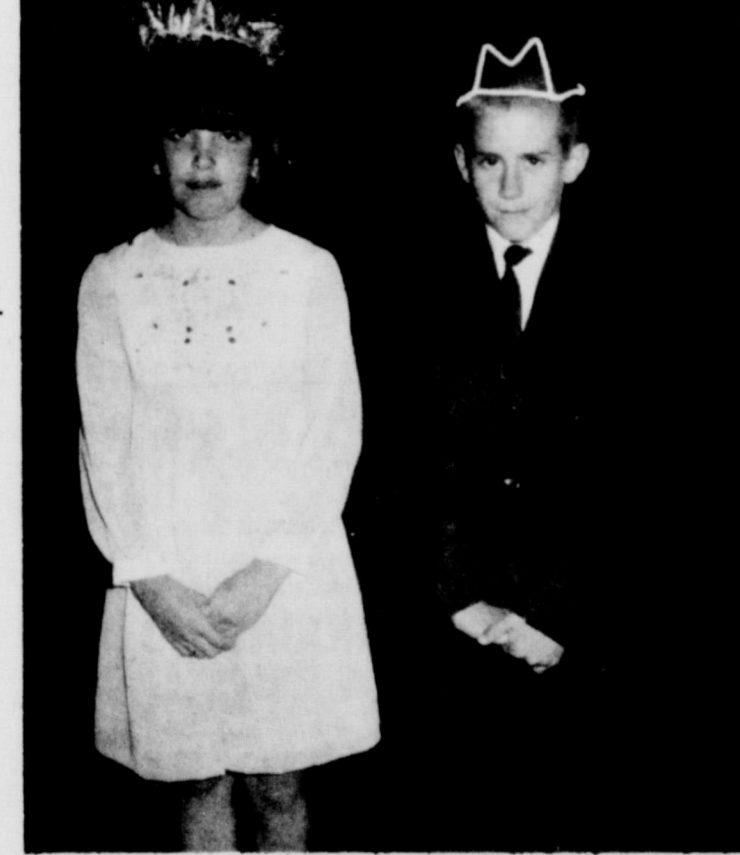

CATTLE WORMING DEMONSTRATION

Drenching to control worms did not improve gains of good and choice Texas Steers grazed on wheat for 95 days in an Extension Service demonstration reported by Gray County Agent Foster Whaley.

Drenched steers in the test gained an average of 13 pounds less than those left untreated. However, Whaley said the treated group included more steers considered "poor doers" at the beginning of the test.

Worming is often recommended for some classes of cattle, particularly those from humid regions where parasites thrive and from drouth areas where cattle have had inadequate feed.

Whaley said Southeastern cattle fed in a local feedlot have responded to worming treatment. Drenching is believed to have caused a 40 pound per head difference in gain between two similar pens of Okie-type cattle at the lot.

The 128 steers in the demonstration originated within a 200 mile radius of Ft. Worth.

In the test, 56 head were "gate-out" weighed and treated; then earmarked so they could be distinguished from the 72 head left untreated.

The demonstration started December 9 and ended in mid-March. Drench cost 80 cents per head.

Average in-weight of treated steers was 328 pounds per head and their average outweight was 478 pounds. Average in-weight of untreated steers was 318 pounds per head and their average outweight was 481 pounds.

Stockmen who have handled many kinds of cattle often can judge if worming will pay. Others can have their veterinarian check the cattle to see if worms are a potential problem.

Grubworms: Early April is the time to apply insecticides to the lawn for the control of grubworms.

White grubs are the larvae (worm stage) of the hard-shelled May or June beetles. They live in the soil and feed on grass roots. Damage shows up in April and May as brown, dead spots in the lawn.

Four insecticides, aldrin, heptachlor, dieldrin and Chlordane, used either as

sprays or as granules will give good control. If an emulsified concentrate form of the insecticide is used, it can be applied to the lawn as it comes from the package.

Because of the different formulations available, I suggest to persons interested in treating their lawns for grub control that they come by my office for a free copy of I-199 "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants." Detailed information on mixing and applying the insecticides for grub control are outlined as well as the control measures for many other insect pests.

If the insecticides are used during periods of short rainfall, it will be necessary to water them in. Where insecticides are watered-in, children or pets should be kept off the lawn until it is dry.

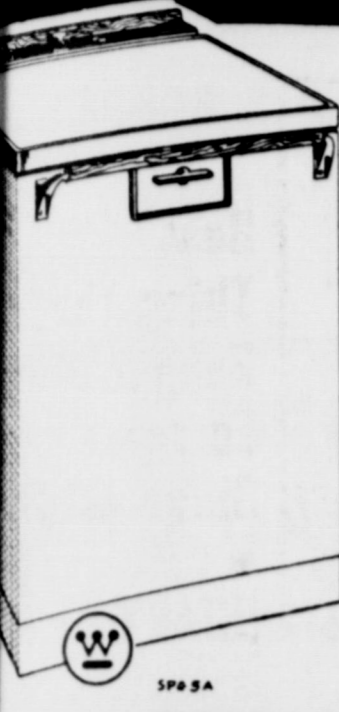

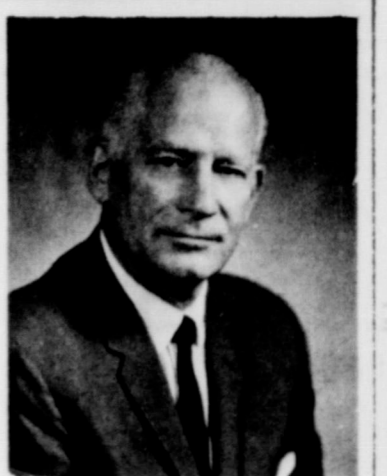

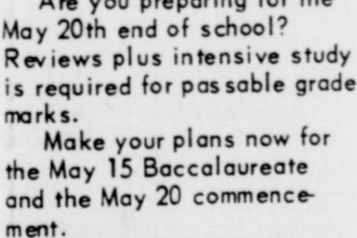
