

Wheeler County Farm Bureau now has 624 members and will be out to increase this number to 650. The drive is a part of a state-wide effort to enroll 100,000 members in the Texas Farm Bureau in 1966. The state organization ended 1965 with 95,204.

Those little forgotten items which result in an extra tripcan be quite costly. Careful planning for shopping can save you money of these extra trips.
