

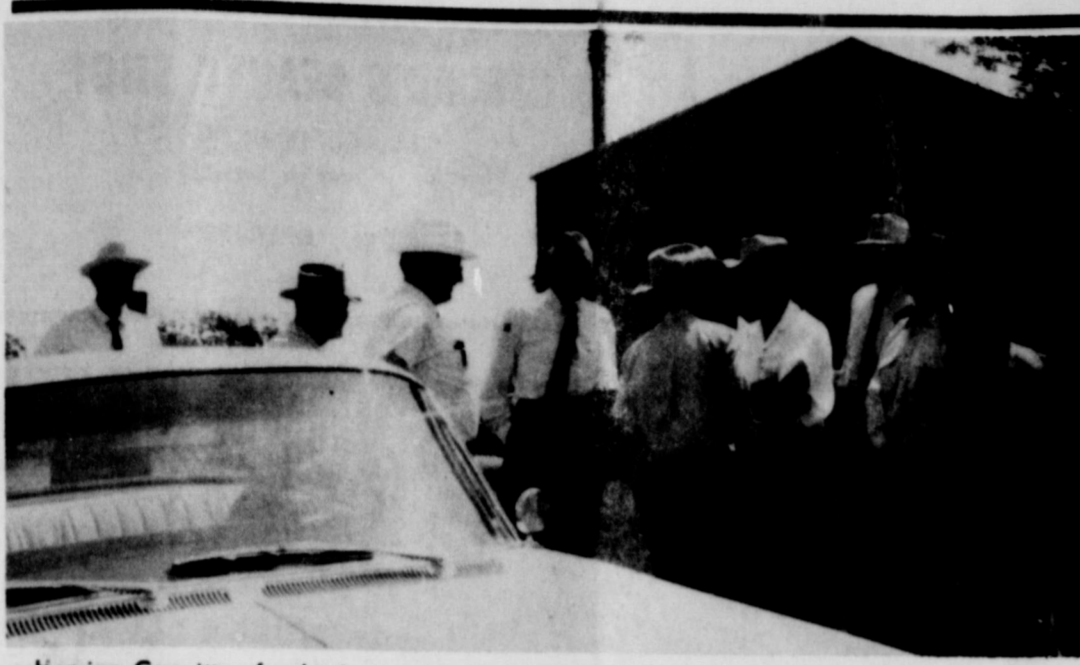

MEETING ON SWEETWATER

The farmers, ranchers, business, professional and political people from Texas and Oklahoma turned out some 100 strong last Thursday to attend a hearing committee on the Sweetwater Creek Watershed Program.

The hearing committee consisted of Mr. J.C. Porter of Wichita Falls, Mr. Frank Gray of Lubbock and Mr. Harvey Davis of Temple. They seemed to be impressed by the interest and attitude of the local people. Participation by the local people in presenting their problems to the watershed was so enthusiastic that it had to be curiously shortened by the chairman, Mr. J.C. Porter. Apologies are hereby made to those who had come prepared to make a statement but did not have that opportunity.

The program for the day consisted of: (1) a tour of the watershed area, (2) the hearing and (3) a luncheon in Sweetwater, Oklahoma with State Soil Conservation Board Officials from Oklahoma.

The tour was a whirlwind affair and left Wheeler at about 12:00 a.m. It covered the watershed from Mobeetie to about 5 miles southwest of Sweetwater, Oklahoma. The tour was prearranged and crossed the creek at strategic points. It terminated at Nora's Cafe at 12:15 p.m. where lunch was served to the tour members by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

At 1:30, Mr. Gordon Stiles, local rancher and chairman of the Sweetwater Creek Watershed hearing committee opened the hearing. After the invocation by Mr. G.P. Carpenter of Mayfield, Oklahoma, Mr. Stiles introduced Mr. J.C. Porter. Mr. Porter in turn introduced Mr. Frank Gray, Mr. Harvey Davis, Leland Parnes of the Soil Conservation State Office in Temple, J.A. "Bud" Norton, engineer for the State Soil Conservation Board, and Aubrey Dalrymple, field representative for the State Board.

Mr. Porter then explained the purpose of the hearing. There are now 67 watersheds in Texas that are in the same position that Sweetwater Creek is in. Texas has 2 planning parties that can plan, or survey, about 2 watersheds each per year. Priorities must be given to assume the continued best use of these parties. These priorities are set only after a first hand look at the watershed and a hearing of the local people. Mr. Porter then yielded to Mr. Stiles, who asked for voluntary statements from the audience concerning individual feelings about the watershed program. Participation was very good. Many points were brought out of the value of having the program. One of the main ones being that the city of Wheeler was fast approaching a serious problem of water shortage that might be solved by the use of one or more of the structures to provide municipal water.

Following the hearing the group left immediately for Sayre, Oklahoma for a meeting of Oklahoma officials. Local people attending the Oklahoma meeting were Gordon

PETITIONS FOR SCHOOL VOTE

After petitions were presented by the citizens of Kellerville and Wheeler School Districts, Judge George Hefley called an election on consolidation of the two schools on June 12. People from Wheeler will vote in the Wheeler School Community while those in Kellerville will vote at their school. All poll tax and/or exemption holders who are legal residents of the two districts will be entitled to vote. Voting time will be from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. and a simple majority of those voting will be necessary for it to carry in each school district.

RABID SKUNK IN KELTON AREA

The Texas State Department of Health confirmed a positive case of skunk rabies originating in Wheeler County, Kelton Community, killed April 22, 1964. There is no known direct human exposure, but the rabid animal did attack household pets just prior to being confirmed a positive case. All appropriate public health officials have been alerted.

The Texas Veterinary Medical Association states that rabies is a virus disease which attacks the central nervous system (brain); is invariably fatal in any warm blooded animal, and is transmitted by a bite of an infected animal. Rabies is found in wild life as well as in domestic dogs and cats. It is also transmissible to man. Vaccination against rabies is very reliable. A booster should be administered to maintain a good immunity.

GROUP HEARS TALK ON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday, May 19 for a Community Economic Development Program.

Guest speakers, James A. Conell, Director of Industrial Development of General Telephone at San Angelo, Wayne Goodrum, District Manager of General Telephone at Memphis and Carl Yancy, Sales Manager of General Telephone at Memphis spoke to 25 members of the Chamber of Commerce on what could be done to bring industry to our community.

One of the main things which lead to the growth of a community is the pride the citizens of that community take in it. "What do you think of Wheeler?" "Is Wheeler a town you would like to rear your children in?" "If so, then you will take pride in your own town. Industry will come to our town if they think they can make money here. Can our community sell itself to a prospective industry. We must evaluate and analyze our position, and come up with a favorable economic report. J. R. Killingsworth To Graduate

Jerry Rex Killingsworth, Kelton, will take part in the May 30 Commencement ceremonies at Wayland Baptist College, but does not complete graduation requirements until August.

An aggressive, seasonal control program is being put into action below the Caprock, centered primarily in Dickens, Motley and Garza counties. Extension Entomologist, says there are three major reasons for this.

First the goal is to suppress weevil populations in early season. Not only will this ultimately assist above Caprock cotton farmers, but will also reduce damage to cotton for producers in the counties in infested areas.

Second, the program is intended to prevent large-scale migration into the High Plains. And last... but not least... efforts to control the weevil in the infested areas below the Caprock should increase the chances of success for a diapause control program, in that area this coming fall.

Rummel, in elaborating on the program, said it is broken down into four steps, as follows:

Fugitive at Large

One fugitive remains at large of the four who escaped last week. Bills are being printed to send out area police forces in an effort to recapture William Eugene Guess.

Guess is 33 years of age, and is 6 ft. tall. He weighs 190 lbs. with black hair and hazel eyes. He is wanted for theft, burglary, car theft, and jail breaking.

The three escaped from the Wheeler jail Sunday evening, May 17. The escape was made after Edward Lee Jackson used a window weight to make a hole above the main door and crawled through. He then got the keys to the jail and released Charles Ray Geren and Harold Lee Beeden. These three were captured Tuesday morning, May 19.

At the time of the escape, the four took Sheriff Bus Doman's private car and headed east on 152. Guess rode seven miles and got out. He then headed across country. He came out south of Wheeler and stole a car in Twitty and drove it to Shamrock.

The other three turned north, nine miles east of Wheeler, and met Sheriff Bus Doman and wife, who didn't know about the break until they returned to Wheeler. After meeting the Sheriff, the convicts figured road blocks were set up and ditched the car in a shabby patch and headed across country to where they were captured Tuesday.

The window weight was found two miles east of Wheeler. The keys to the jail were also tossed out, but they have not yet been found. The County Sheriff is now holding a California man who was involved in a traffic accident near Shamrock and was released from the hospital Saturday night. He is being held for California authorities and was wanted for burglary.

Diapause control program: The diapause control program will be carried out below the Caprock since weevils are known to overwinter in this area. How much acreage above the Caprock might require treatment will be determined by present research and surveys during the summer. The use of the diapause control program below the Caprock will not only provide protection for the Plains but should be of real benefit to farmers in the treated areas by reducing the next year's weevil population, adds the Extension entomologist.

CO. AGENT REPORTS

Wheeler County tested more soil in the state soil testing labs during March and April 1964 than any county in Extension Service District 1 which includes 22 parham counties. Wheeler County also ranked sixth in the State of Texas in the total number of samples tested. Hale County was first with 283, Harris 216, Haskell 207, Knox 137, Jones 135 and Wheeler 132. This total was just two month period and did not include any other months in the total, but March and April are the biggest soil testing months during the year. Wheeler County's total test run in 1962 was 10 and in 1963 the total was 55.

A soil test report gives recommendations for two seasons so therefore, it is only necessary to have a soil test made every two years on each field.

The three state soil labs analyzed a total of 7,153 samples during the reporting period. During the 4 month period January - April the requests for soil tests in-

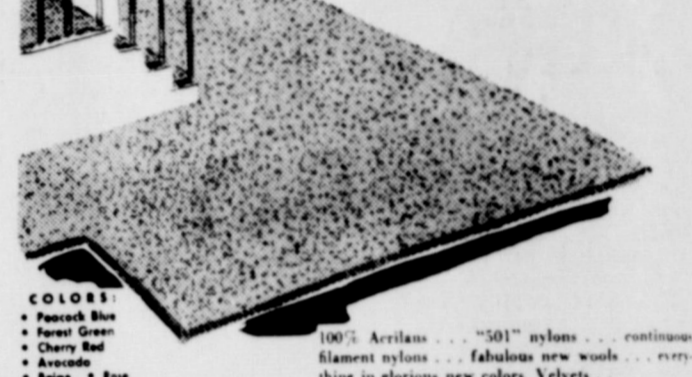

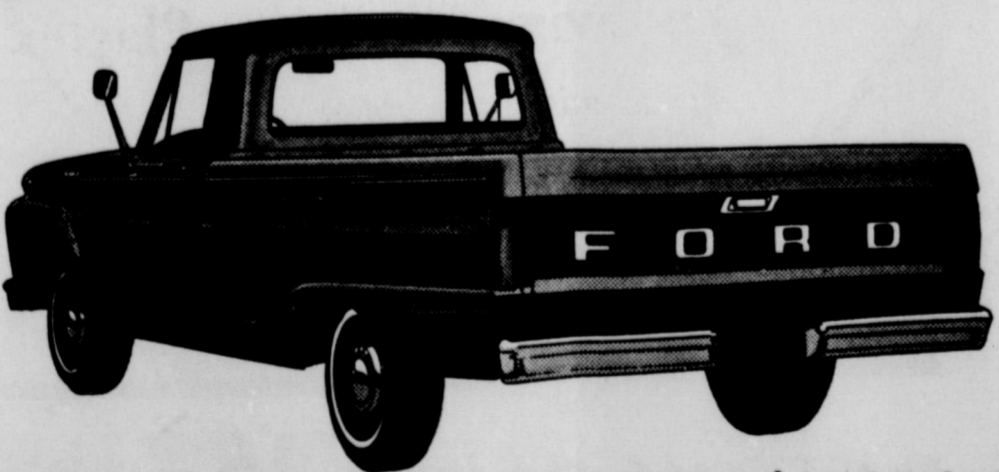
