## THREE CAR THEFTS IN COUNTY RESULT IN ARREST OF YOUTH

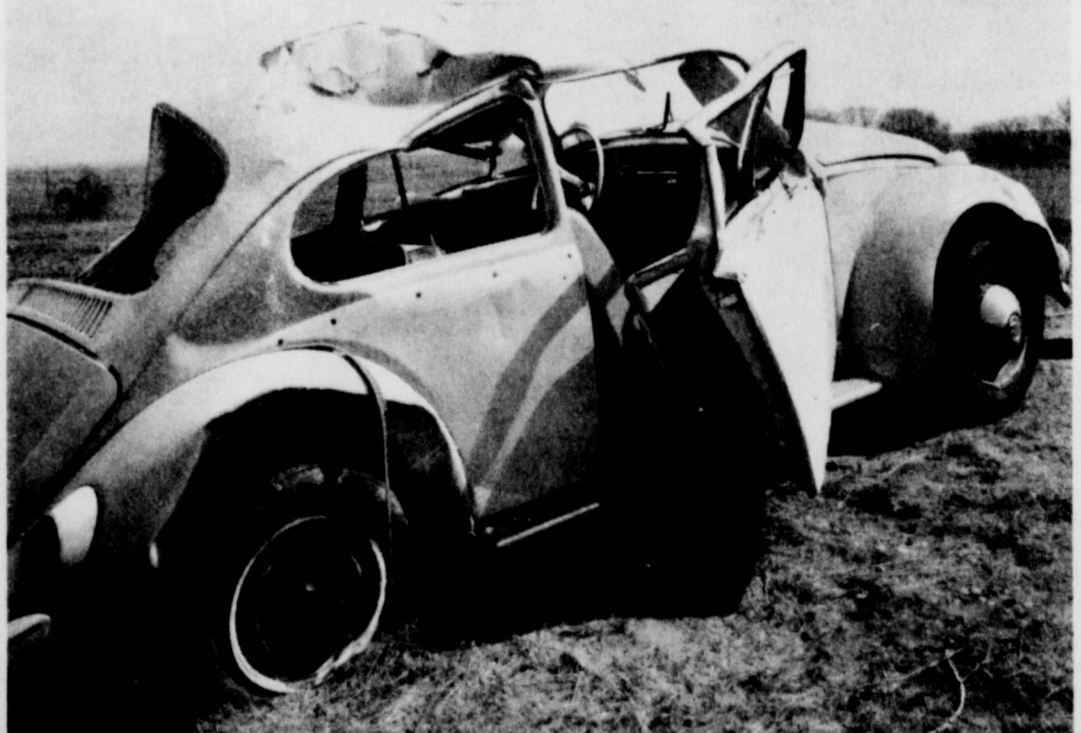
A juvenile escapee from the detention home in Amarillo was taken into custody by Highway Patrolman Paul Guise, 20 miles north of Wheeler. The youth was placed in Wheeler County Jail Tuesday evening.

Driving a stolen 1966 Pontiac the youth arrived in Wheeler County in the early hours Tuesday morning. He stole a 1966 Chevelle belonging to Mr. and Mrs. James Williams which was parked at the W.L. Williams residence one mile north of Wheeler and left the Pontiac. The Williams car was left at Elk City, Okla., and a 1961 Chevrolet was stolen there.

Coming back into Wheeler County, a 1959 Chevrolet was stolen in Shamrock. The car was left three miles south of Wheeler and a 1964 pickup belonging to J.B. Henderson was taken.

The Henderson pickup broke down several miles north of Wheeler. The youth was being carried into Canada when the vehicle in which he was a passenger was stopped for speeding. The Patrolman asked the youth his name and the correct name was given.

## TRACK TEAM WINS DIST.

Leading 7 competing track team by 69 points the Wheeler thinclads brought home district honors. The District 2-B meet was held Thursday April 7 at Lefors. Total points for the Mustangs was 160. Groom placed second with 91 points. The Mustangs received points in 13 out of 14 events entered. Of the 7 first places, three were new district records! Setting new records were Frankie Rogers, 120 high hurdles--16:3; Tom Smith, 880 dash--2:06.0; and Mile Relay, Vanpool Rogers, Hunter and Smith--3:33.4. Old records: 120HH--16:7; 880 by Smith--2:07.4; and Mile Relay--3:42.5. Wheeler now holds six district records out of a possible 14.

Allison's Punk Childress tied one District record and set one new record. Punk scored 40 out of the school's 52 points. The new record set was in pole vaulting with 11:11.2. He tied the 100 yd. dash record with a time 10.0. This record is shared with Jim Jolly of Wheeler. Childress entered five events and scored points in all five to make him high point man at the meet. He will be entered in four events at regional.

Wheeler will be represented at Regional April 22-23 at Lubbock in 10 events. Tracksters going to regional are: Bobby Vanpool, 100 yd. dash; Frankie Rogers, 120 high hurdles; Rogers and Ricky DeArment, 180 low hurdles; David Jamison, Bobby Vanpool, Mike Lewis and Tom Smith, 440 relay; Smith, 880 yd. dash; Vanpool, Rogers, Villard Hunter and Smith, mile relay; Gary Harcastle, pole vault; Dan Dorman, Shotput and Smith, broad jump.

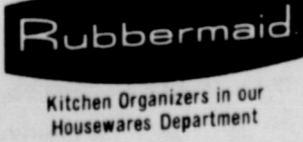

# HONEY

 Honey: April 10-17 is national Honey for Breakfast Week. That's because honey is plentiful this month, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Honey absorbs and retains moisture, so it's a choice sweetener for your baked goods. Cakes and cookies made with honey are noted for fine keeping qualities.

What better way to observe National Honey Week than by serving honey for breakfast?

**Honey Orange Bread "Tasty Toast"** provides a real breakfast treat. Ingredients for 2 loaves of bread calls for 2 eggs, 3 Tablespoons of graded orange rind 1 1/2 cups orange juice, 2 cups honey, 1 cup soft shortening, 2 cups whole bran cereal, 4 1/2 cups sifted flour, 1 1/2 Tablespoons baking powder and 1 teaspoon each of baking soda and salt.

Beat together the eggs, orange rind, orange juice, honey and shortening. Add whole bran cereal and let stand about 10 minutes.

Stir flour with baking powder, soda and salt. Add to whole bran mixture, stirring only until combined. Spread in greased 9 1/2 x 5 1/2 inch loaf pan. Bake in 325 degree F. oven for about 1 hour and 10 minutes.

Don't worry about having slices left over. "Tasty Toast" freezes well, too.

**Honey Tips:**  
 To Measure Honey: Measure shortening first and then measure honey in the same measuring cup—slides out with ease.  
 To Replace other Sweetening with Honey:  
 In a cake or cookie recipe that calls for other sweetening, the general rule is to reduce the amount of liquid one quarter cup for each cup of honey used.

To Liquify Honey That has Granulated or Solidified: Place the container in a bowl of warm water (not warmer than the hand can bear) until all crystals are melted and honey is liquid. Unless otherwise specified honey in recipes should be in liquid form. Granulated honey may be used with equal success in baked goods.

To Purchase Honey: Select the flavor you desire. The flavor depends upon the kind of flowers from which bees gather the nectar. If you have storage space, it is more economical to buy honey in large containers. A cup of honey weighs approximately 12 ounces, one-fifth of which is moisture.

Honey is Good for Growing Children:  
 Honey is a pleasant source of readily available energy for growing children. Since it is easily digested, honey is well suited to infant feeding. For instructions on the preparation of infant formulas using honey, it is best to follow the advice of your physician.

To Store Honey: Keep liquid honey in a dry place. Freezing does not injure the color or flavor but may hasten granulation. Avoid damp places for storing honey as it has the property of absorbing and retaining moisture. Do not put honey in the refrigerator. Crystallized honey is just as good as liquid honey.

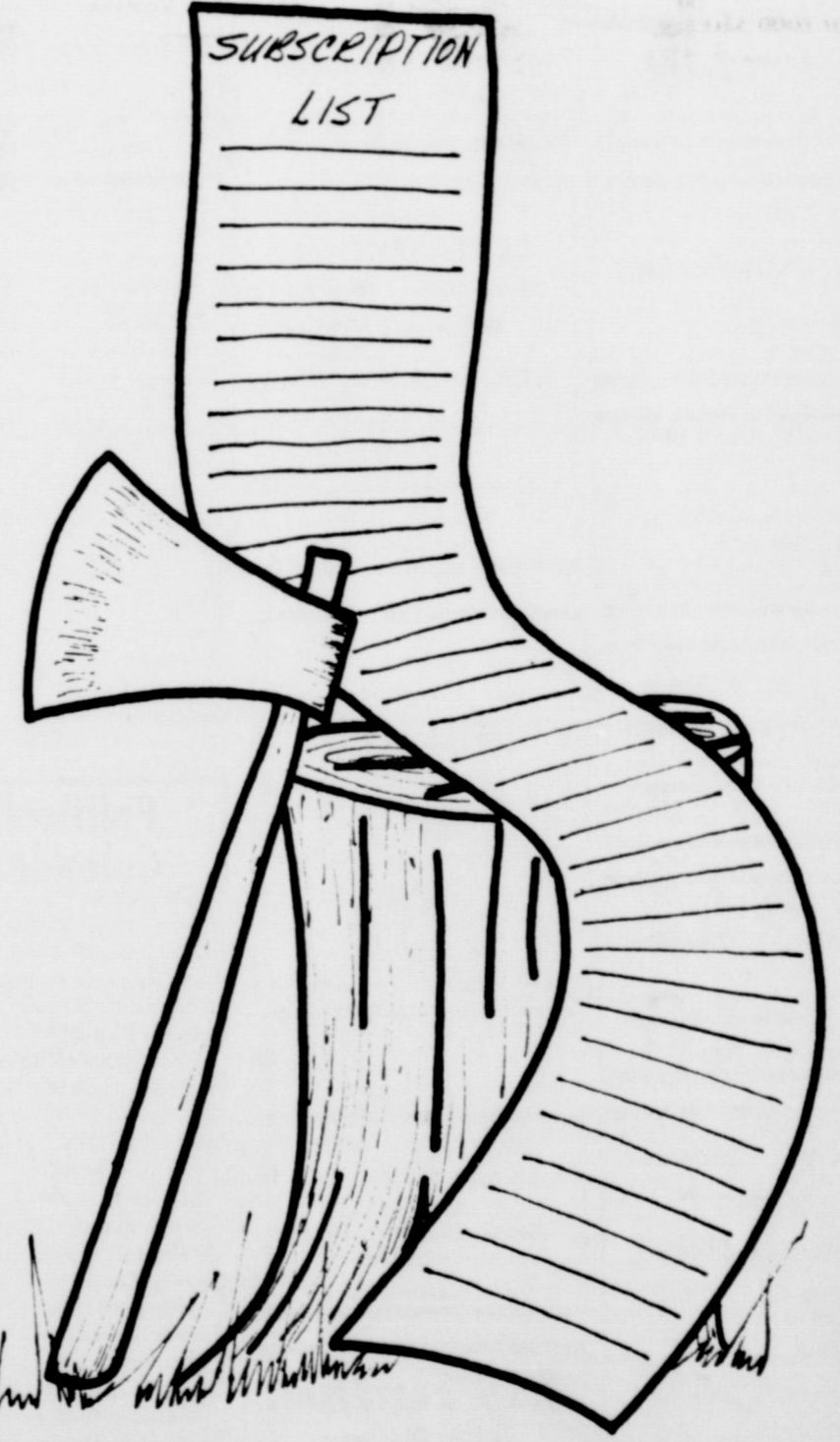

**RAINFALL LOWEST IN 6 YEARS**

by Charles David Jackson  
Wheeler and Amarillo both received the lowest rainfall in March that has been recorded in the past six years. The rainfall chart furnished by the United States Weather Bureau at Amarillo showed Amarillo receiving only 0.01 inches of rain during March of this year. By checking with Joe Rodgers, who is cashier at the First National Bank in Wheeler, I found that Wheeler only received 0.06 inches during March which was very little better. Joe has been keeping accurate rainfall records for quite a number of years. His records are used as the official monthly rainfall records that is published each year in the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration Handbook. He is called on to provide information that is used by many authorities for various publications.  
Joe and I decided that it certainly pays to live in Wheeler county after comparing his rainfall chart to the one that I receive monthly that is prepared by the U.S. Weather Bureau in Amarillo. This report is sent to my office each month by the Santa Fe Railway company. During the past six years Wheeler County has averaged 30 inches of rainfall annually where Amarillo averaged only 24 inches. A 6 inch advantage certainly means a lot in any year where an area depends on rainfall for its livelihood as we do in Wheeler County. The year receiving the most moisture locally during the past six years was 1960 when our annual rainfall was 42 inches. That same year was the wettest for Amarillo with 36.67 inches. Our driest year was 1963 when we received only 23 inches. That was also the driest year in Amarillo when they received 17 inches. Even though we get discouraged during dry spells, just remember that it is even dryer West of here.

use and are not damaging to most plants.  
Growers may find these materials under such trade names as Nematode Killer, Nema-X or Nema-Kill. A one pound can will usually treat about 120 linear feet of row space or 120 square feet in a block.  
In the vegetable garden, the material should be applied in a trench 6 to 8 inches deep and immediately covered with soil. Gardeners are reminded that these materials are toxic to plants of the onion family and should not be used on rows where these crops are to be planted. Label instructions should be carefully followed.  
When plants in the home landscape need treating, I suggest punching holes or digging a trench around the plant's base and applying the recommended dosage. Follow with a generous watering. Use the chemicals at the start of the growing season. For more detailed information, feel free to visit the county agents office and ask for bulletin number MP-356, "Nematodes, their Identification and Control."

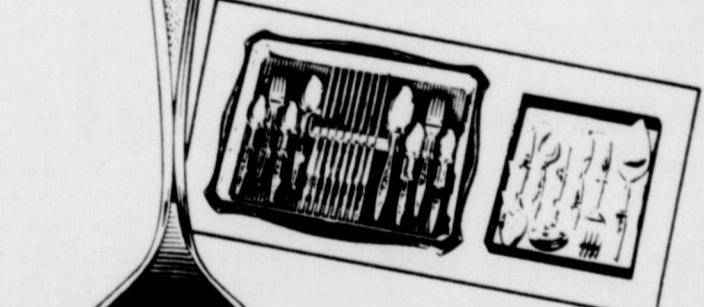

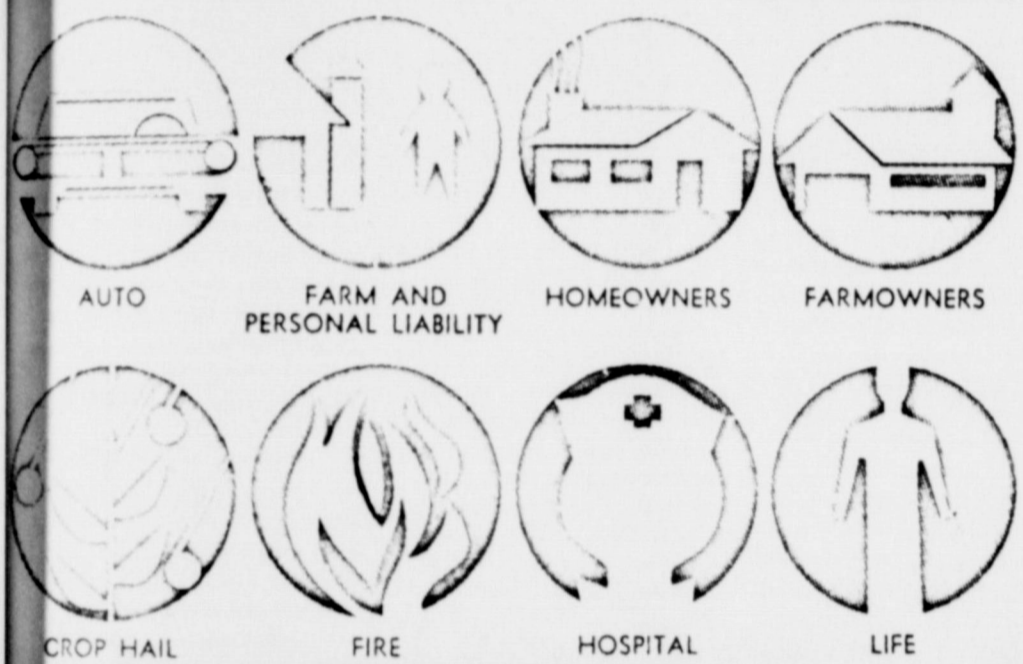

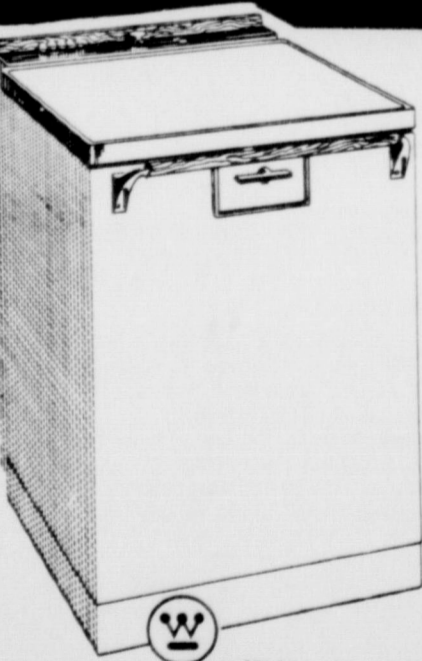

## SCREWWORM

By Charles David Jackson Mexico - U.S. Commission for Screwworm Eradication Explored:

Development of a program to eradicate screwworms from Mexico took a major step forward at a meeting in Mexico City, March 22 at which proposals were presented to extend the responsibilities of the present Mexican-United States Commission for prevention of foot- and mouth disease to cover screwworm activities.

U.S. government officials and livestock leaders met with counterparts from Mexico to discuss the future course of action for the eradication program. Heading the U.S. delegation was Dr. George Mehren, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture. The group included Dr. R. I. Anderson, deputy administrator of USDA's Agricultural Research Service, Dolph Briscoe, Jr., Evalde, president of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, and SWAHRF officers, C.G. Scruggs, Dallas, T.J. Richards, Paducah, and John Hays, Yarnell, Ariz.

Manuel Guzman Willis, Mexico's sub-Secretary of Agriculture for Livestock led the Mexican delegation, which included Octavio Ochoa y Ochoa, President of the Mexican National Livestock Confederation and a WHAHRF trustee. The group heard a preliminary report of conclusions drawn to date from the screwworm survey now underway in Mexico. Significant points revealed included: "As had been suspected, screwworms are found in virtually all of Mexico. "Cold weather will not be as much an aid to eradication efforts as it was in the United States, although dry season may be of great assistance by reducing screwworm populations. "Government experts from Mexico and the U.S. are confident that eradication in Mexico is technically feasible.

Details concerning financing, fly distribution patterns need for additional facilities in Mexico and other technical matters are being worked out and should be ready by September 1, 1966.

The Republic of Mexico offered to provide an initial sum of one million pesos (\$80,000) for the project. In addition, the Mexican National Livestock Confederation will spearhead a campaign to collect a specific amount for each head of livestock sold in Mexico.

The confederation also promised the assistance of stockmen in collecting larva specimens, treating wounds and infestations and providing information needed by eradication workers.

Formation of a U.S. - Mexico joint commission to supervise screwworm eradication activities was prompted by appeals made to the agriculture secretaries of both countries by livestock leaders from Mexico and the U.S. last summer.
