Details concerning financing, fly distribution patterns need for additional facilities in Mexico and other technical matters are being worked out and should be ready by September 1, 1966

The Republic of Mexico offered to provide an initial sum of one million pesos (\$80,000) for the project. In addition, the Mexican National Livestock Confederation will spearhead a campaign to Briscoe H. Dem. collect a specific amount for each head of livestock sold in Mexico.

> The confederation also promised the assistance of stockmen in collecting larve specimens, treating wounds and infestations and providing information needed by eradication workers.

Formation of a U.S. - Mexico joint commission to supervise screwworm eradication activities was prompted by appeals made to the agriculture secretaries of both counties by livestock leaders from Mexico and the U.S. last summer.
