The Presidential citation has been awarded for his service as board member on the draft board serving Gray, Roberts, Wheeler, and Donley Counties.

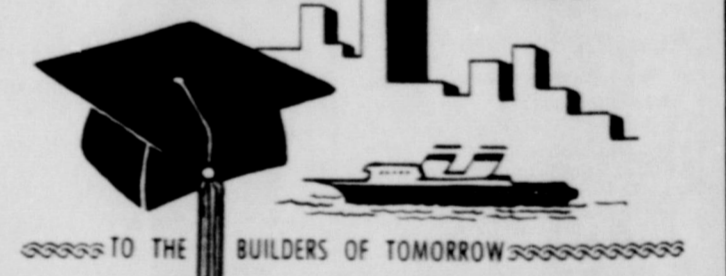

TEXAS 4-H GOODWILL PEOPLE-TO-PEOPLE PROGRAM

Richard Kiker, former member of the Allison 4-H Club in Wheeler County, will be a member of Texas' first overseas 4-H Goodwill delegation.

The delegation will depart from New York by air on June 23 for the Northern European tour. Prior to leaving New York, the group will visit the World's Fair, United Nations headquarters and other points of interest.

# CO. AGENT'S REPORT

BY CHARLES D. JACKSON

Plant grain sorghum early and beat the midge. This tiny insect has greatly reduced grain sorghum yields on many Plains farms for the past four years. Estimates of yield reduction in late-planted grain sorghum in 1963 ranged from 0 to 100%.

Greatest yield losses consistently occur in sorghum which blooms after the first week in August. Getting the seed in the ground early is the best insurance against midge damage.

The sorghum midge did not cut yields of grain sorghum hybrids planted on or before May 15, according to research data from Shelby Newman, Agronomist, South Plains Research and Extension Center, Lubbock.

But when planting dates were delayed past June 1, significant and usually severe yield reductions resulted.

Bloom dates for the three year test period revealed grain sorghum blooming after the first week in August was subject to midge populations large enough to cut yields. Grain sorghum hybrids planted after June 1 bloomed after the first week in August. Newman also emphasized that should periods of extended cold, wet weather prevail, growth of grain sorghum planted as late as June 1 could be slowed and might bloom after the second week in August. In short, getting the seed in the ground by May 15 is considered best. If not possible, don't delay planting past June 1.

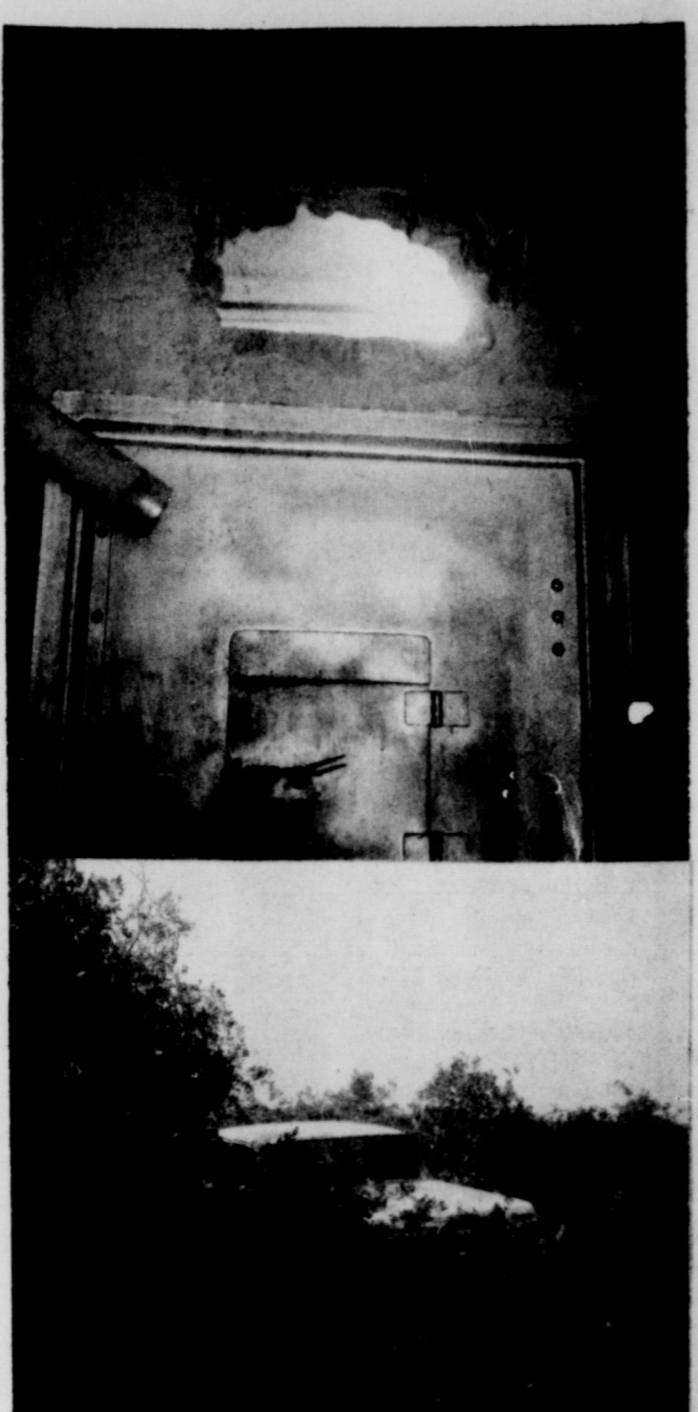

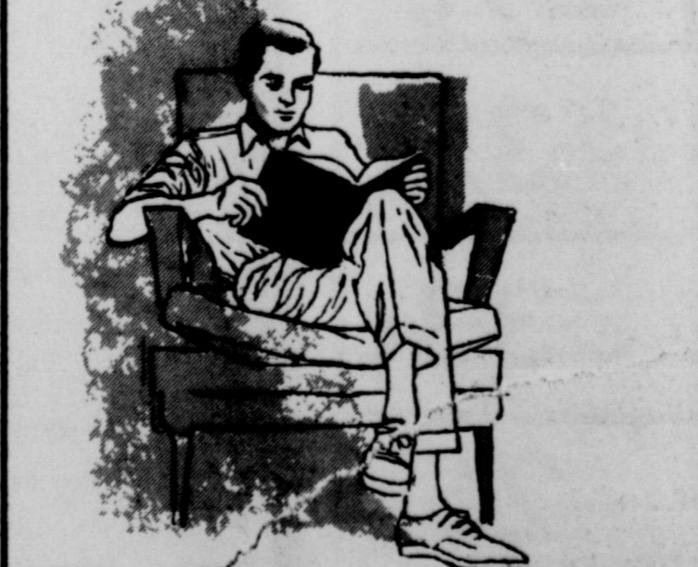

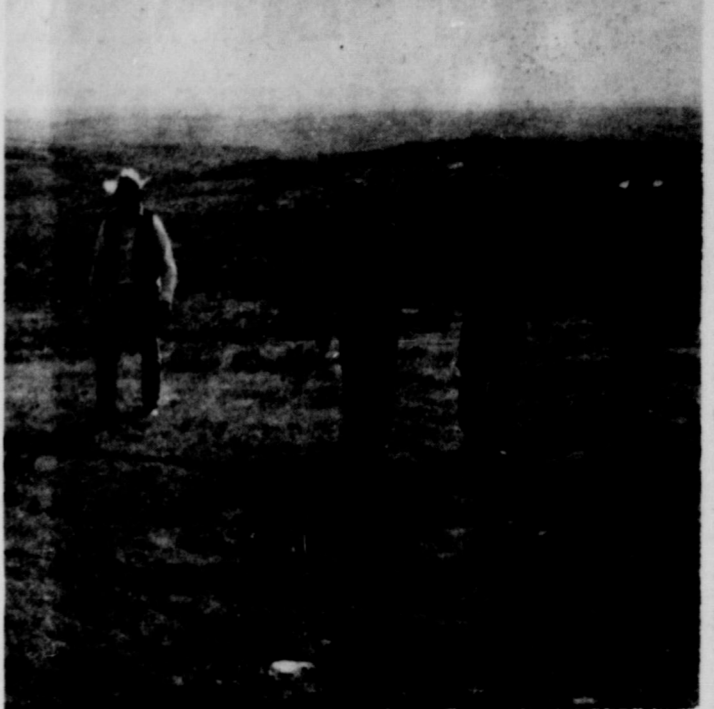
