



The white branding) is a new approach hair is legible from a distance

These brands were effective even with a flat-faced circle of iron of only one inch in diameter. A patch outgrowth of white hair was observed with 10 and 20 seconds of skin contact, but not when the iron was applied for only 5 seconds. Brands made by applying the iron for 60 seconds resulted in legible brands withwhite hair growth

but produced excessive loss of epithelium. This damage, however, was much less servere than the average hot brand technique.

At present round faced brands are used since they are more efficient in heat transfer when tested on experimental animals. It is expected that these rounded brands will shorten the time interval for branding cattle as well. Other cryco-genetic techniques now under investigation are also expected to shorten the time it takes to identify cattle.

The major variable inherent in the super-cold branding "iron" approach are associated with contact between the cold surface and the skin, short underfur, pressure of application, hydration of the animal, the amount of subcutaneous fat, and the anatomical site all play a part. Of major importance is the stage of hair growth. The

The most frequent question asked in regard to this technique is "will the color change be permanent?" "Cryco-branded cattle have replaced shed hairs in the brand area with new white hairs. Test Indicates Drylot Cows Produce Longer than Pasture

Cows living in the confinement of a drylot are staying productive longer than their pastured cousins in a scientific study at the Rolling Plains Livestock Research Station at Spur, Texas.

Only 26 head of the original 36 hear turned to pasture remain the herd, says Station Superintendent Paul Marion, while 32 head of the original 36 put in drylot are still productive.

Part of the difference between the two groups may be a result of pur chance, according to the Texas ASM University researcher.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards. USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions, concluded Mr. Jamison.

H.N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, in commenting on the torrential April rains.

Smith went on to point out that extremely heavy rains of dirt, mud and silt from fell over large areas of the state April 17-28. Rainfall ranged from 8 inches near Dublin to more than 25 inches in the Marshall-Gladewater

Heavy flood damage occurred in agricultural and urban areas alike. Damages to roads, bridges and utilities ran into hundreds of thousands of dollars. The Texas State Highway Department reported damages to highways totaled almost one million dollars. More than a dozen Texas counties were declared disaster areas because of flood damage. Total damage estimates, still incomplete, range upward of \$15,000,000

Only minor flooding was noted on watersheds where upstream watershed protection and flood prevention programs were substantially completed. All of the approximately 1100 completed floodwater retarding dams in Texas caught and held some floodwater.

About 820 completed dams are located in North Central and Northeast Texas where rains were heaviest. It is estimated these structures held back over 600,000 acrefeet of floodwater and released it downstream over a period of several days.
