New Method of Branding

Charles David Jackson, a veterinarian from Houston, Texas, has been receiving a number of inquiries about the method of branding cattle with cold instead of hot branding irons. This process

was developed by Washington State University and the following is a progress report received from them on this process.

Cryo-branding (super cold branding) is a new approach

to animal identification. This painless marking technique utilizes cold instead of a hot branding iron. The major advantages of this technique over the hot brand are lack of pain, less hide damage and the growth of white hair at the brand site. The white hair is legible from a distance

Cattle may be branded by a variety of cryogenic techniques, but most of the preliminary work has been done on clipped animals with copper branding "irons." Heavy copper branding irons were selected because they are most efficient (as compared with steel and aluminum) for heat transfer.

The experimental copper irons were 1/4 of 1/2 inch thick with a depth from the contact face of at least 1 inch. Cattle were clipped and the skin wetted with 95% ethyl alcohol. They were then branded with copper irons chilled in dry-ice alcohol with 40 seconds of skin contact. These brands were effective even with a flat-faced circle of iron of only one inch in diameter. A patch outgrowth of white hair was observed with 10 and 20 seconds of skin contact, but not when the iron was applied for only 5 seconds. Brands made by applying the iron for 60 seconds resulted in legible brands with white hair growth but produced excessive loss of epithelium. This damage, however, was much less severe than the average hot brand technique.

At present round faced brands are used since they are more efficient in heat transfer when tested on experimental animals. It is expected that these rounded brands will shorten the time interval for branding cattle as well. Other cryo-genetic techniques now under investigation are also expected to shorten the time it takes to identify cattle.

The major variable inherent in the super-cold branding "iron" approach are associated with contact between the cold surface and the skin, short underfur, pressure of application, hydration of the animal, the amount of subcutaneous fat, and the anatomical site all play a part. Of major importance is the stage of hair growth. The

melanocytes (pigment producing cells) are more easily destroyed when the hair is growing rapidly.

The most frequent question asked in regard to this technique is "will the color change be permanent?" "Cryo-branded cattle have replaced shed hairs in the brand area with new white hairs. Cryo-branded cattle have not been observed over a long period of time and we are unable to make a positive statement of the permanency of the brand. However, it is our belief that the change is permanent in the hair follicle. This is based on the apparent inability of the pigment producing cells to migrate into a hair follicle lacking this cell.

Test Indicates Drylot Cows Produce Longer than Pasture Cows:

Cows living in the confinement of a drylot are staying productive longer than their pastured cousins in a scientific study at the polling Plains Livestock Research Station at Spur, Texas. Only 26 head of the original 36 heifer turned to pasture remain the herd, says Station Superintendent Paul Marion, while 32 head of the original 36 put in drylot are still productive.

Part of the difference between the two groups may be a result of pur chance, according to the Texas A&M University researcher.

Both herds are part of 80 Hereford heifers purchased from the Waggoner Ranch at Vernon, Texas. They went

into the drylot versus pasture experiment in May 1959.

Since then, five of the pasture cows have died, three have been sold because of cancer eye and two were sold because they were barren, Marion said.

Only one of the drylot cows has died. Marion said three have been sold—one with a cancer eye, one with a hip injury and one which was barren.

"Apparently more things happened to cows in pasture," Marion said. "For instance, eye irritation is greater on pasture and this may have caused two cows to get cancer eye while only one got it in the lot."

The pioneering drylot-pasture comparison first started as a project to learn more about the nutritional requirement of beef cows, Marion said.

Limited range forced the scientist to put one of the herds in drylot and the comparison between the two management systems has gotten more attention than the findings on beef-cow nutrition, Marions said.

Without considering low-gravity of production, the pasture cows have made a higher profit per head than the drylot cows, under the experimental conditions at the Texas A&M station, Marion said.

But he believes modifica-

tions in the drylot system would make it highly competitive with traditional beef production systems.

Fifteen Percent Increase in Wheat Acreage Allotment

The USDA announced a 15 percent increase in national acreage allotment for wheat for 1967 crop. This re-

presents regular allotment of 55 million acres plus small farm increases to make an effective allotment of 59.3 million acres. The Secretary of Agriculture said this means U.S. farmers will be permitted to plant an additional 7.7 million acres wheat this fall and next spring for harvest in 1967.

Mail Carrier To Deliver Cards

Postmaster reminds rural patrons of the Wheeler Post Office to be one the look-out for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Jamison explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings."

The carrier assisting with the survey is William A. Goad, Jr. Route 1.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions, concluded Mr. Jamison.







"Never before has the upstream watershed protection and flood prevention programs in Texas been tested so extensively and thoroughly and never before has proof of adequacy been so evident," says H.N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, in commenting on the torrential April rains.
Smith went on to point out that extremely heavy rains fell over large areas of the state April 17-28. Rainfall ranged from 8 inches near Dublin to more than 25 inches in the Marshall-Gladewater area.
Heavy flood damage occurred in agricultural and urban areas alike. Damages to roads, bridges and utilities ran into hundreds of thousands of dollars. The Texas State Highway Department reported damages to highways totaled almost one million dollars. More than a dozen Texas counties were declared disaster areas because of flood damage. Total damage estimates, still incomplete, range upward of \$15,000,000.
Only minor flooding was noted on watersheds where upstream watershed protection and flood prevention programs were substantially completed. All of the approximately 1100 completed floodwater retarding dams in Texas caught and held some floodwater.
About 820 completed dams are located in North Central and Northeast Texas where rains were heaviest. It is estimated these structures held back over 600,000 acre-feet of floodwater and released it downstream over a period of several days. The holding back of this much water in watersheds where the dams are located prevented damages being several times heavier than they actually were to crops, livestock, fences, roads, bridges and urban areas.
An outstanding example of the benefits of a completely installed watershed pro-

tection program was on Cow Bayou which runs through McLennan and Falls Counties. This project, in addition to land treatment, includes 29 floodwater retarding dams and 11 critical sediment areas. All measures in the watershed are completed. No flooding and no damages occurred. Without the program on this watershed it is estimated damages would have totaled \$104,000 during April alone.
Even partially completed watershed construction on the Tehuacana Creek watershed east of Waco was effective. The work plan calls for 30 floodwater retarding dams and about 12 miles of stream channel improvement. Thirteen dams have been completed; no channel work has been done. During the heaviest rains, 11,000 acres were flooded with damages estimated at \$412,000. It is estimated without any dams completed, 15,000 acres would have been flooded with damages in excess of \$620,000. The partly completed project reduced damages by about 35 percent or approximately \$208,000. If all floodwater retarding structures and channel work had been completed, damages would have been reduced another 35 percent and would have totaled only about \$211,000 instead of \$620,000.
"Land treatment such as terraces, waterways, cover crops and good grass in pastures reduced land damage and kept thousands of tons of dirt, mud and silt from moving on to fertile bottomland and into downstream reservoirs. These benefits were in addition to over five million dollars additional flood damage that would have occurred had the 1100 floodwater retarding dams had not been built," Smith concluded.

How much does a gully cost? A total of \$603 for each acre lost, according to an Economic Research Service Study. Part of the damage is the net loss in market value and the reduction in what economists call the "social productivity of capital"--\$340. The rest of the cost is made up of the loss in local government tax base (\$57) and income lost from unemployed capital, labor and management (\$116).
Thus the total loss to the farmer and the community--\$603 for every acre eroded out of existence. (The above is quoted from Tuesday letter printed by the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.)
A grassed waterway is often the answer to a gully problem. Many times a gully can be shaped to a design which will control water and cause it to run slow enough to not "wash." This in turn makes an opportunity to establish grass and get production from an area that was once waste land.
Federal cost share is available for the construction and seeding of waterways through the ASCS office and the Great Plains Conservation program.
For further information see your local Soil Conservation Service office.
