



When water is applied be certain that it penetrates to

a depth of at least 15 to 20 inches. When the roses are grown in light, well drained they can be watered soil, they can be watered at weekly or 10-day intervals in this manner. When the soil is clay or a heavy clay-loam, waterings at 20 to 30-day intervals will be sufficient if the water is applied so that it penetrates the entire root zone of the plants. When roses have passed the peak of the June blooming period and the new growth begins to show after flowering, they should be fed with a good complete an awith a good complete an a-lysis rose fertilizer. Mulching is a highly recom-

mended garden practice that really begins to pay off from early June through the remainder of the summer months A mulch is any coering that is placed on the soil to conserve moisture, keep soil temperatures lower, discourage weeds and to protect the plant roots from ex-

There are many good materials that are satisfactory as a mulch, including dry grass dippings, straw, leaves, pine needles, peat moss, shredded bank, tobacco stems, ground com cobs, peanut hulls, spent hops, bagasse, cottonseed hulls, sawdust, gravel, aluminum foil, and hack polyethylene film. The best material to use is usually dependent upon tremes of heat or cold. usually dependent upon what material is most readily available. The factors that must also be considered are the appearance, possible odors, fire hazards and the amount of work and cost in-

Some precautions must be taken with some materials used for mulching. The inorganic materials such as polyethylene film and aluminum foil must be weighted down to keep in place. Fresh organic materials such as organic materials such as sawdust, wood chips, freshly crushed or ground bank, and others will require additional applications of nitrogen to aid decomposition and to starvation conditions

Many tall plants will require staking before they become so tall they will fall over from their weight Stake them early to prevent most damage. When plants are staked, support the plant securely and in a natural position as possible and try to hide the stake and lost ties from view as well

plant ties from view as well as possible with the stem of the plant. Use material to tie the plants to the stakes that is flexible and that will stretch as the plant grows and will not cut into the stem of the plant. Ties made of thin polyethylene strips are now available commercially and are ideal for this purpose.





4... Pole bending is a time event. Each contestant will begin from a running start.

A clearly visible starting line shall be provided. An electric timer will be the official time.

5... In the event of a tie, the horse declared the win-ner in the runoff must run the pattern within two seconds of its original time or the runoff must be held again.

6. Western type equipment must be used. Use of a hackamore or other types of bridles is the optional choice of the contestant. however, the timer or judge may prohibit the use of bits of equipment that he may consider severe.

Flag Race

Three flags used in the contest are about 6 x 8 inches in size, of different colors and should be on flag sticks about 14 inches long. The two buckets used should be conventional three gallon buckets, filled nearly to the top with sand. They should be about 20 and for the be about 30 yards from the

be about 30 yards from the starting finishing line.

To complete the pattern a barrel should be placed in in the center of the arena and about 30 yards from, and slightly beyond the buckets. As each contestant enters the arena he is handed the first flag. His time starts as his horse reaches the starting line. He plants the flag he was given in the first busket, grabs the flag already there, then rides across the finish line. Time ends as the horse reaches the finish line. The rider can make the circle from either left to right or right to left. If he drops the flag on the ground he must dismount and retrieve the flag in order to continue the race. He must be mounted as the flag exchanges are made. If the flag falls over, but stays in the bucket, the contestant's time counts. But if it falls out of the bucket and the rider does not replace it, then his time does not count.

The Keyhole Race tests the ability of a horse to run a straight line, stop and run back. It is a timed event. It requires speed, of course, but it also takes good action and control to win this event.

The Keyhole Race is run in a pattern marked on the ground, usually with white lime. The pattern is in the shape of a big keyhole, with a lane 40 feet long and four feet wide leading to a circle 20 feet in diameter. Starting 20 feet in diameter. Starting from a line 20 feet back, you run your horse up the narrow lane, do a fast rollback inside the circle, then ride back out the lane to the finish line. The entrance of the lane is the starting and finish line.

lane is the starting and finish line. Time is measured as the horse's muzzle crosses the line, going and coming. THE CONTESTANT IS DISQUALIBED IF HIS HORSE STEPS ON THE LINE AT ANY TIME DURING THE RUN.

He will also have another 20 feet behind the first 20 foot line to steady or quiet his horse but cannot use this 20 foot area for a running start.
