Latest research in the field of human nutrition was presented last week to key home demonstration agents and assistants from throughout Texas during the third Human Nutrition Workshop at Texas A&M University.

Sixteen speakers from medicine, dental science, the state department of health, nutrition and biochemistry, biology, and education fields were featured.

"Nutrition Over the Life Span" was the theme for the conference. Home Demonstration Agents occupy a keymale in human put stion education.

stration Agents occupy a keyrole in human nutrition education in the county, in
which Extension Service Director, John E. Hutchison,
told the participating agents
in the welcoming address.
"In a nation that enjoys the
highest standards of living,
and where food is abundant,
we are plagued by many nutritionally-related diseases,"
he said.

Thanks to research scientists, more nutrition infor-mation is available every day, and one must study constantly to keep up to date, Mrs. Flowrence W. Low, assistant director for home economics, said in her address, 'Obtaining Excellence in Nutrition Education,' She urged the Extension edu-She urged the Extension educators to study informal courses, in service training and self-directed studies. Basic nutrition information was presented during the first year of the workshop. Nutrition for the various age groups was studied Monday, and the physiology of nutrition and carbohydrates and proteins in the diet came up for study Tuesday. Fats and minerals in the diet were studied Wednesday, and vitamins were discussed Thursday. Methods of teaching nutrition were in the spotlight Friday, when Dr. Eugenia Whitehead, professor and chairman of the Department of Home Economics at the University of lowa, spoke. spoke.
