April is not only one of the busiest months for gardeners but is also one of the most

delightful. In many Texas areas weather conditions are rapidly reaching their best planting shrubs, vines, ground covers and lawns, as well as perennials, warm season annuals, and summer flowering bulbs. This time of year is also the showiest season for many spring flowering shrubs and trees. The woody plants that finished flowering in late February and March have started the new season's growth. Shade and ornamental trees are also beginning to break into active growth.

Beginning gardeners get the urge to plant and garden in April more than at any other time. Care should be exercised not to plant more plants than are needed or that can be properly cared for throughout the entire growing season. Experienced amateur gardeners have learned to beware of the April spring planting fever

that results in severe June backaches, and spare enough time from their planting activities to do the more practical spring maintenance chores that are required for successful gardening.

Watering - Recent weather conditions have resulted in less than average rainfall. The windy weather that has prevailed has also brought about exceptionally low soil moisture conditions for this time of year.

Gardeners should carefully analyze the soil moisture conditions in their own garden and if the supply of moisture in the soil is low care should be taken to provide enough water to support the normal development of plants, especially when they are starting new growth. There are several methods that can be used to insure that a proper amount of moisture is supplied to the plants. First when water is applied to the soil, let it run into the soil slowly and be sure it soaks in deep. This is much more satisfactory than applying small amounts of water at frequent intervals.

Second: shape some shallow water holding basins from the soil around newly planted trees. Add mulching material such as pine bark or peat moss around older trees and shrubs and on flower and shrub beds after they have been well watered, to conserve the moisture and to keep the roots on newly planted plants cool during the increasing number of warm days that will soon begin to occur.

This is an ideal time of the year to check all the equipment used to supply water to the garden plants to be sure it is in excellent working order before the watering season sets in permanently. Check all the sprinklers, nozzles and garden hoses to be sure they are in working order and repair or replace those that are no longer of use.

In scheduling your watering operations, list the water requirements of your various trees, shrubs and other plants and plan your watering procedures so that you apply water to your garden in a systematic manner so that some plants will not have "wet feet" from overwatering while others suffer from excessive dryness.

specific pesticides or other poisonous materials. The poison control centers in this area are located at Amarillo, Lubbock, and Wichita Falls and the addresses are: Amarillo Poison Control Center, Northwest Texas Hospital, Emergency Room; Wichita Falls Poison Control Center, Emergency Room Entrance, General Hospital.

I strongly urge anyone to supply the attending physician, in case of a poisoning accident, with the entire label from the package of poison material so he will know the exact nature of the chemical when asking for antidotal and treatment information.

In case of an accident involving poisonous material recovery of the person will depend upon immediate attention and treatment. Prevention, as is the case with all accidents, should be the major concern but just for insurance it's well to know that certain centers have been established where the latest information is available in emergency situations.

Wheeler County ranchers should be glad to know that research is being conducted to learn new ways to control range fires. Several of the materials that are being demonstrated are discussed in this article.

Range fires are reported to be controlled by the use of diammonium phosphate, liquid fertilizers and gelled water. The Forest Service people in the Southeast have done work in cooperation with the TVA with liquid fertilizers. The liquid fertilizer used was 11-37-0 mixed with water to produce a phosphate concentration of about 8 per cent. When the fire is put out and the fertilizer solution washed off the plants to the ground, it appeared to stimulate new plant growth following the burn.

The mixture is applied with an airplane flying 50-150 feet above the fire along the edge of the burning area. Tests in the southeast indicated that 1200 gallons of fertilizer mixture would treat a strip 50 feet wide and 700 feet long. The cost of the mixture is about 7 cents per gallon.

Tests in California with fertilizer and a galling agent indicated that 600 gallons would treat 12 acres. There

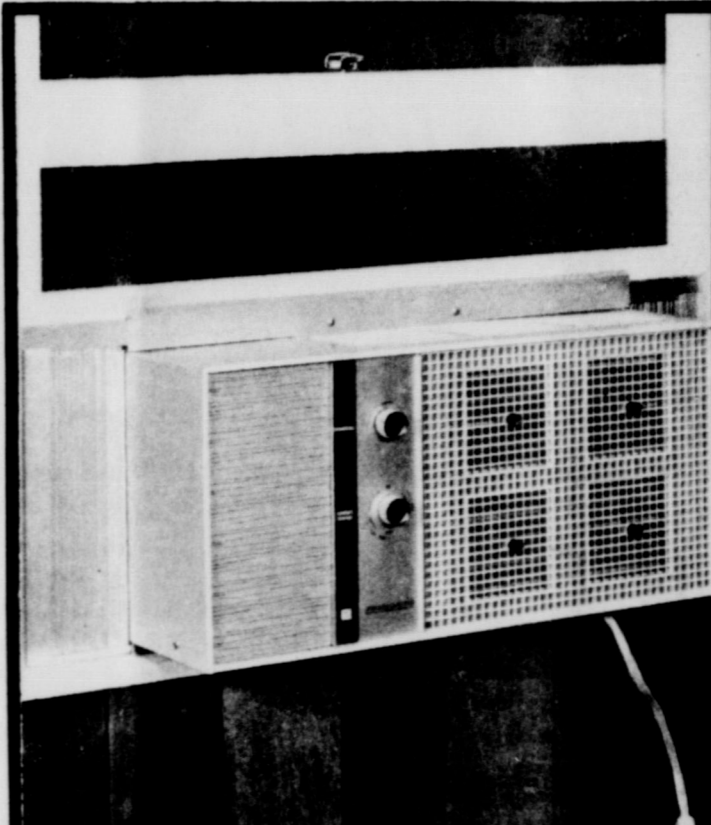
