## YOUTH SURVIVES 35' FALL



OUR COWBOYS - - Dan Trimble and Mike Good journeyed to Stinett Friday night to participate in the Rodeo there. A trophy was presented to Dan for placing first in the bull-riding event. Danny then assisted Mike in the ribbon-roping and Mike was awarded the 2nd place trophy for this event. Mike again competed in the Stinett Rodeo Sunday afternoon, winning a first place trophy in calf-roping. Dan entered the Adrian Rodeo Sunday afternoon but did not place there.

Larry Don Jackson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dwan Jackson took a 35' fall Thursday afternoon around 4:30 and will live to tell about it. Larry, and his cousin, Patricia Ann Castleberry, 5, went to hunt bird eggs in a tin building one block east of the Savage Hotel. Larry had climbed on a ladder and crossed a 2 x 4 support and tossed some bird eggs to Patricia. When he attempted to return, he lost his balance. After falling about 15 feet, he passed a support with a spike extending three inches. The spike caught him under the chin and tore his face open from his chin to the bridge of his nose. An imprint in a thin layer of dirt on the concrete floor where he fell showed that he landed on hands and knees. It is felt that the small patch of dirt, 3' x 4', lessened the injuries.



Larry asked Patricia to help him up. Her attempt to get him up to his feet was unsuccessful, so Larry crawled 15' and then got up and walked with Patricia's help to the front of the building. Dwan came out of Pagan Parts, one block west, and heard them crying. Dwan and Ann Jackson rushed the boy to Shamrock Hospital. Dr. Blacketter suggested that because of his condition, he should be taken to Amarillo, but since he was having trouble breathing, Dr. Walker of Wheeler was called to give the anesthetic.

### SWEETWATER CREEK WATERSHED

According to information furnished the Times by Gordon Stiles, Chairman of the Steering Committee for the Sweetwater Creek Watershed, the Texas State Soil Conservation Board has scheduled the public hearing for this particular watershed for Thursday, May 21st at 1:30 p.m. in the District Court Room in Wheeler. This is the most important meeting that we will have, according to Stiles. There will be six members of the State Board present for this meeting, and the amount of interest shown by the landowners in the flood plain area of the watershed as well as the interest shown by other groups in the area will determine the priority to be recommended by the Texas State Soil Conservation Board for planning the Sweetwater Creek Watershed Project. The Board will also take into consideration the number of people to be directly benefited including municipal or industrial water supply needed to meet existing deficiency. We strongly urge every landowner in the flood plain area of the Sweetwater Creek watershed to be present and express his or her views.

### REPUBLICAN ELECT. RETURNS

Wheeler County Republicans reported a total of 158 votes in their primary election held last Saturday. This was a gain of 19 over their first primary election held in 1962. Jack Cox was top runner in the Senate race, polling 71 votes. George Bush received 59, Robert Morris 23, and Dr. Milton Davis 3. Robert D. Price of Pampa out distanced Frank Hinkson of Lubbock, 128 to 22 in the county and won the GOP nomination for Representative from the 18th Congressional District. He will face Walter Rogers in November. Top vote for the county was polled by Senator Barry Goldwater in the Presidential preference poll. His total of 141 defied comparison to 3 votes for Harold Stassen, 1 for Senator Margaret Chase Smith and none for Governor Nelson Rockefeller. Henry Cabot Lodge picked up 7 write ins and one County Republican liked Richard Nixon. In the Senate contest, Houston oil man George Bush and attorney Jack Cox led the four man field of conservatives, and will have a runoff to decide which will face Ralph Yarborough in the General Election. The runoff election will be held Saturday, June 6th.

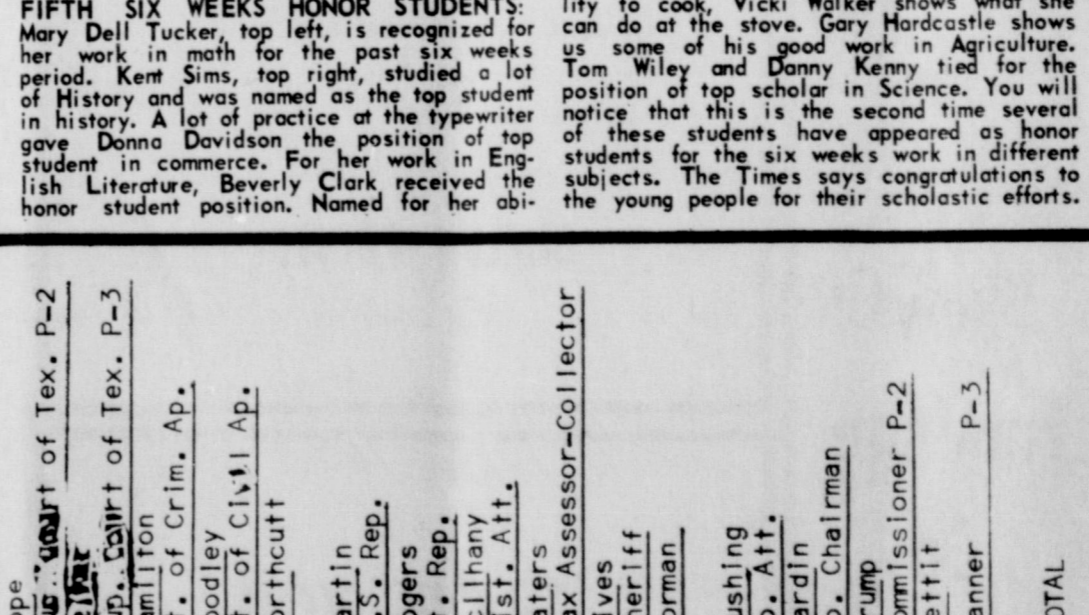
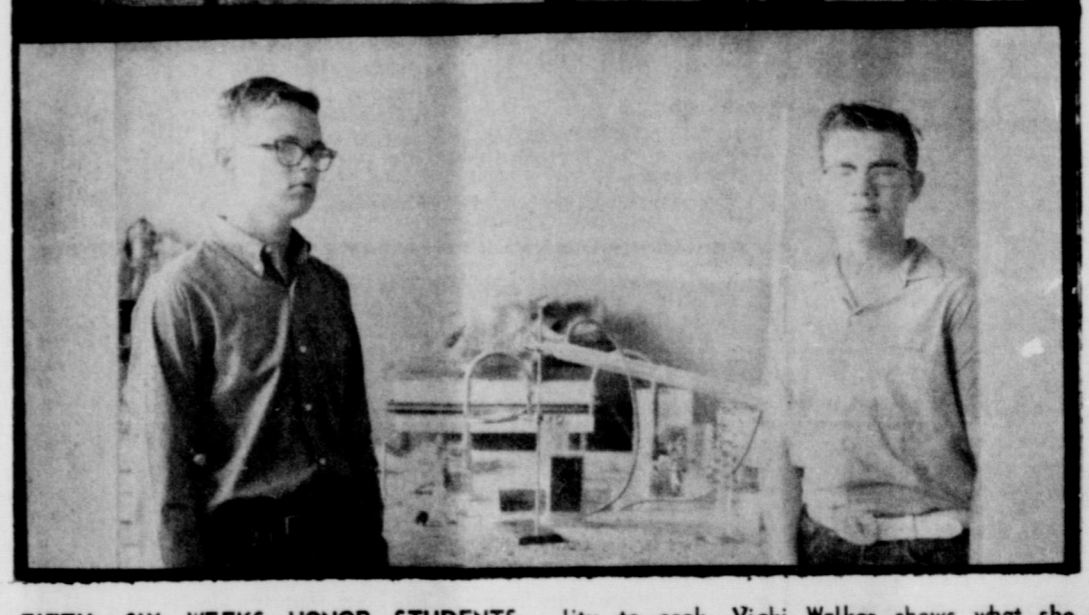
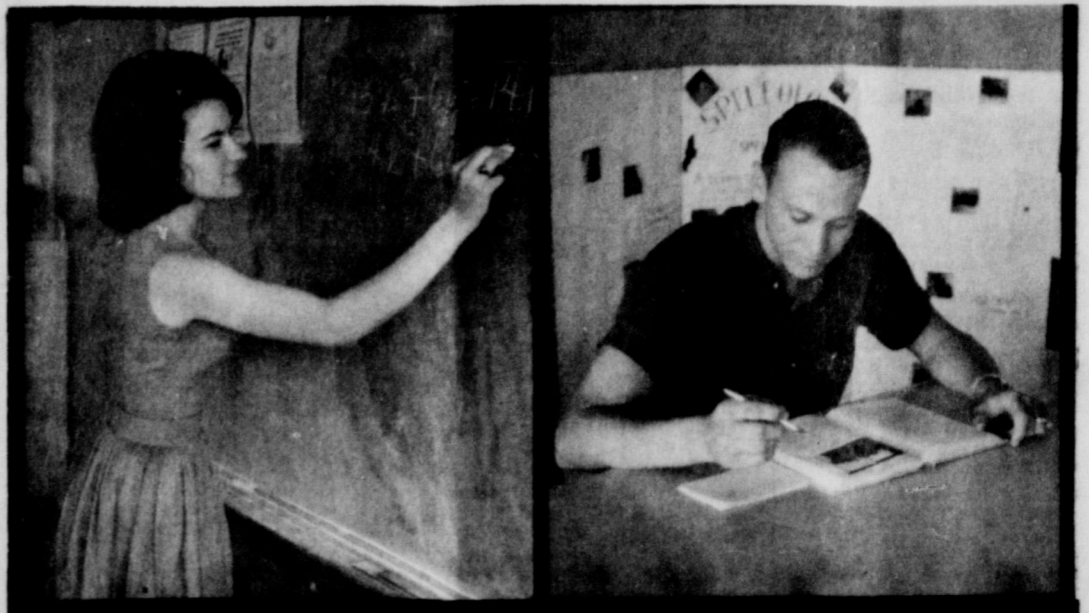
### POST OFFICE DEPT. CHANGES

The vast majority of the residents of Wheeler will not be affected by the recently announced adjustments in Parcel Post and Post Office Window services. Postmaster Jamison said today. Mr. Jamison stated that his statement was prompted by some misunderstanding about the scope of these changes. Recapping the local Postal situation, the Wheeler Postmaster pointed to these facts: Money Order Service will be available at the office on Saturdays and on the Rural Route on Saturdays but the office window will only be open until 12:00.

The doctors, nurses and hospital staff fed 18 one dollar bills to a branch and gave it to Larry. He will remain in the hospital for a week or two and will be released.

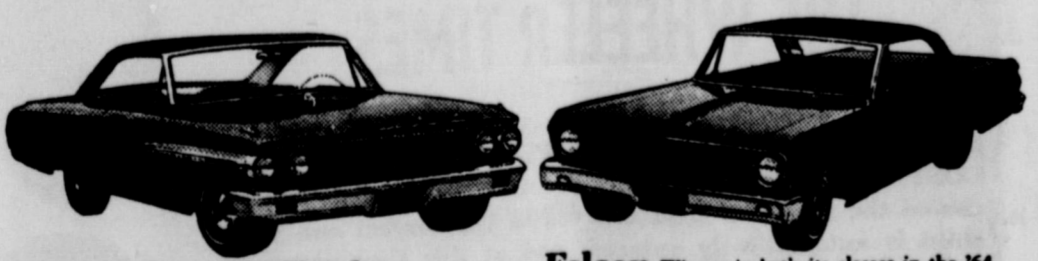
