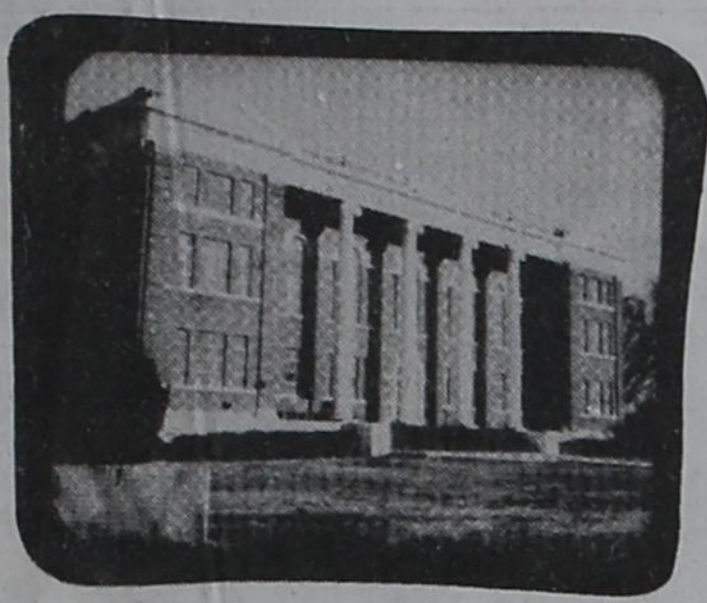

# FLAG TO BE POSTED AT OLD JAIL SAT.

## CHUCK WAGON FEED TO RAISE FUNDS

The Old Mobeetie Association in cooperation with the 4th Cavalry O.F.G.M.R. (Old Fort Griffin Memorial Regiment) announced a special event today. The event will be the donation and posting of a brand new regulation garrison flag measuring 10'x20' appropriate for the period of 1875, the year Fort Elliott was established in the Panhandle.

The event will be held on Saturday, October 21, at 10:00 a.m. at the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum located 14 miles west of Wheeler.

The Old Mobeetie Jail and Museum has some of the few existing pieces of Old Ft. Elliott remaining. The original

80' tall flag pole from Ft. Elliott is now at the Old Mobeetie Jail. Ft. Elliott was located one mile northwest of Old Mobeetie Jail.

The 4th Cavalry will appear mounted and in period uniform for the event. The flag will be raised in grand military fashion to the sounds of bugle played by Ed Benz, who is director of the Hutchinson Museum in Borger. After the ceremony, a chuckwagon feed will be held to raise funds for the Museum. Adults may eat for \$6.00 each.

The flag project is a two phased preservation project of the 4th Cavalry unit to create interest in the Mobeetie Museum and Old Ft. Elliott. The Cav-

alry unit is the official interpretive unit for the Old Mobeetie Association. Phase II will be the stabilization of the cedar flag pole, repair and painting. The project is being sponsored by the 4th Cavalry unit. They are one of three volunteer cavalry units in the Panhandle actively interpreting the cavalry story of the Red River Wars here in 1874.

Special guests for the event include Walt Davis, Director of the Panhandle Plains Museum and Dr. Jack Hughes, Archeologist. Ada Lester is the President of the Old Mobeetie Texas Association. Bob Izzard will be a guest speaker.

## MUSTANGS LOSE FIRST DISTRICT GAME

Events did not transpire last Friday night in Sunray as was predicted and hoped for by the Wheeler Mustangs. The Mustangs never got on track offensively and were soundly defeated by the Sunray Wildcats 13 to 0 for the district opener. Of course, when you only run 30 some odd offensive plays it is extremely difficult to get a track to go on, much less improve and score.

Sunray scored twice in the first half taking a quick lead that the Mustangs never recovered from. The Mustangs appeared to be able to move the football early on, but Sunray used an effective ground control type offense that kept the football out of the Mustang hands. Literally, the Mustangs only had 11 possessions in the first

half. Even while allowing Sunray to score, the Mustang defense held the Bobcats the rest of the night without another touchdown. The Mustang defensive front 7 bent but did not break. It appeared that the Sunray offensive line and their size put the smaller Mustangs to a disadvantage early on and continued to capitalize on this. However, again for four solid quarters the Mustangs played hard and were always just within reach of winning the game or getting the momentum back that would be needed to mount a successful offensive drive. It just never materialized.

Bryan Judd rushed for 10 yards, Jeremy Davis for 6, Andy Francis for 33 yards and Travis Stevens rushed for 41 yards. In the passing category the Mustangs completed 3 out of 11 passes for 34 yards with T.A. Taylor and Jason Porton pulling down the three Mustang passes. The Mustangs also fumbled twice and lost the

ball each time, while also throwing two interceptions.

Defensively, Mustang tackle statistics were not available at press time and will be in next weeks edition.

Now, we all know what this weeks game against Shamrock means to the Mustang playoff hopes. The Mustangs must defeat Shamrock to remain in the play off picture and again bring home the county championship. A good week of practice and dedication by all will be needed and will be attained this week by the boys in black. While, this is still just a game, we all know deep down in our hearts how important football is to these fine boys and the town. The Mustangs will give their all and be triumphant no matter what the score of any game might be or what anyone else may think or feel. The Mustangs are our team, yours and mine, so continue to support them next Friday night as they take on the Irish of Shamrock.

A special exhibit is currently on display inside the Mobeetie Museum of a U.S. Cavalry saddle, outfitted uniformed mannequin, barracks room, and equipment of the type used at the Fort. Weapons, insignia and artifacts pertaining to the Fort are also on display as well as a 6'x10' diorama of the Old Fort. The exhibits were prepared by the members of the unit.

The Old Mobeetie Association has become well known for its museum and annual bluegrass festival music weekend. They are now bringing attention to Fort Elliott and hope to become an information center for it. They are seeking to form a registry of parts and pieces of the buildings, furniture, photographs and equipment from the Fort. H. J. "Cotton" Ridgway, 72, of Mobeetie, died Friday, Oct. 13, 1995, in Amarillo. Services were at 2:30 p.m. Sunday in the First United Methodist Church at Mobeetie with the Rev. Thacker Haynes, pastor of First United Methodist Church of McLean, and the Rev. Gary Jahnel, pastor of the First United Methodist Church at Mobeetie, officiating. Burial was in the Mobeetie Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler.

Mr. Ridgway was born Nov. 17, 1922, at Roby, Texas. He moved to Wheeler County in 1929 from Roby. He married Clara Corcoran on Oct. 5, 1946, in Pampa. He was employed as a rural letter carrier for the U.S. Postal Service for 25 years, retiring in 1991. He was a veteran, serving in the U.S. Army during World War II.

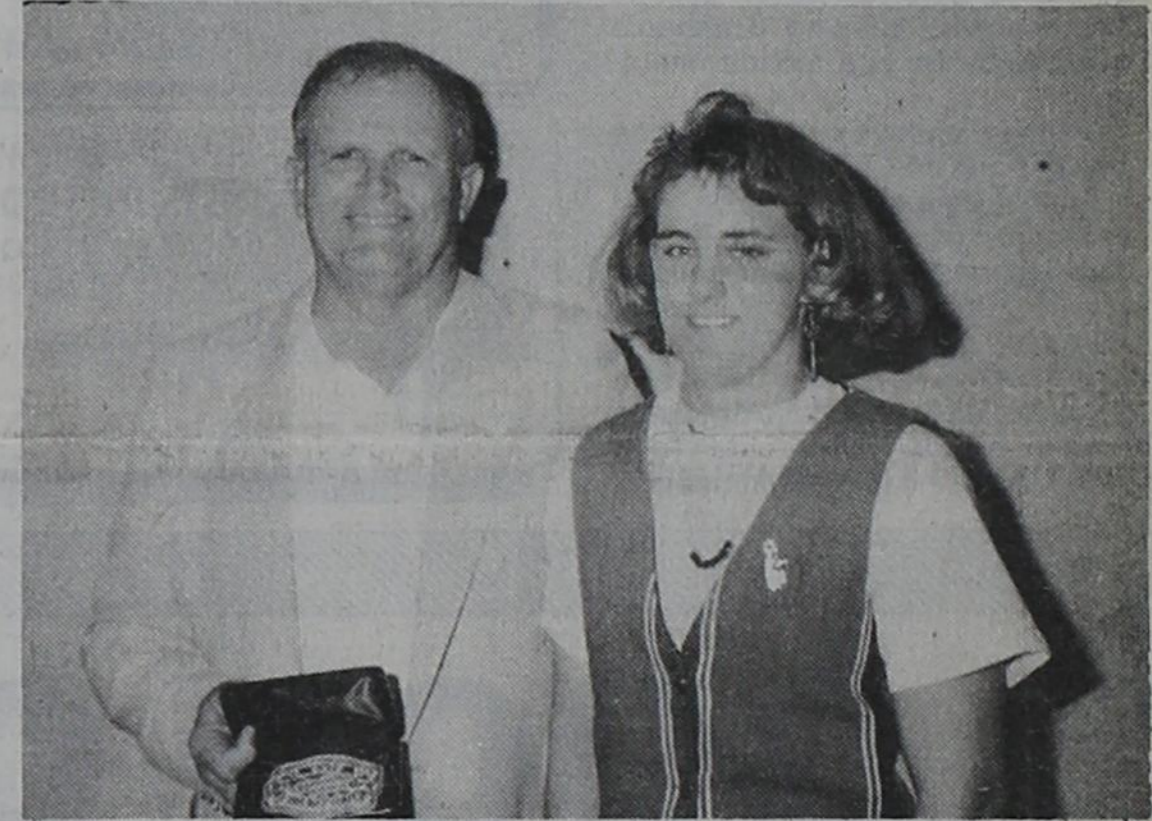
The health fair is held in cooperation with the American Legion, Post 68. It is open to all veterans and their families.

Lambs will be validated at the Wheeler County show Barn on Monday, October 23, from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. and on Sunday, October 29, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. Lambs must be brought in to one of these validation sessions.

County show lambs will be ear tagged with a county tag and major show lambs will be nose printed, tattooed and tagged with a state validation tag. Exhibitors should also remember that entries for steers, heifers and lambs are due in the County Extension Office by November 1.

Hogs will be validated in November, and the hog entries are due December 1.

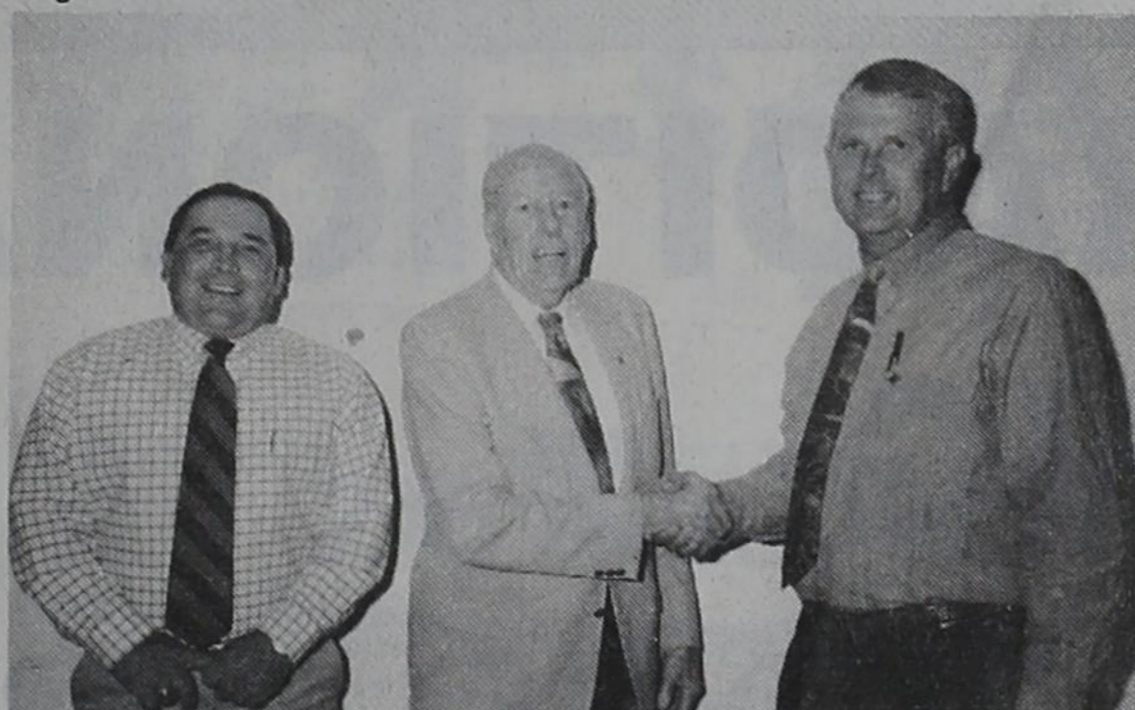

**Extension Update**

**HAVE A SAFE HALLOWEEN**  
There is something new out this Halloween to help with spotting those ghosts and goblins. It makes costumes glow in the dark — a perfect special effect for this ghoulish holiday. They are called "glow in the dark trims" and are made to absorb light and glow in the dark for 15 to 20 minutes after lights are turned off. Extension clothing specialists Alma Fonseca says the trims can be washed in cold water and dried on a low setting. They can even be ironed over. For safety, she also recommends costumes of light colors to help motorists see trick or treaters better. And make sure the fabric is flame resistant. Avoid costumes with baggy sleeves or billowing skirts because they are more likely to come in contact with an exposed flame or candle. Keep the costume short enough so the child doesn't trip going up stairs or curbs. Children should also wear well-fitting shoes and not carry props like swords unless they are very soft and flexible. Taking precautions will ensure everyone has a fun, safe Halloween.

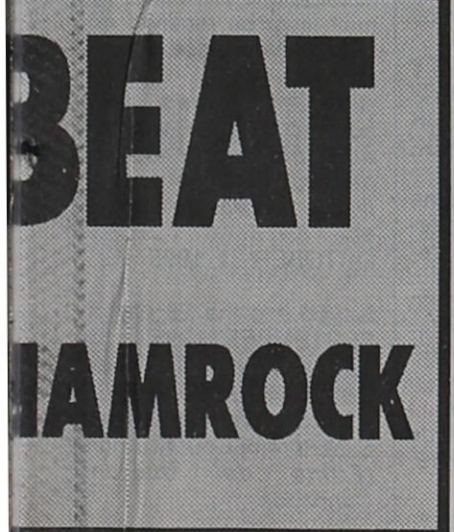

**Six Counties To Benefit From Agri. Assistance**

Six Texas counties will benefit from an agriculture assistance request which the Consolidated Farm Service Agency (CFSA) granted for the State of Oklahoma. That request came on the heels of damages and losses caused by hail during the month of April. The Texas counties are Clay, Collingsworth, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Wheeler and Wichita. Twenty two Oklahoma counties are also eligible for assistance through this designation. The Consolidated Farm and Rural Development Act allows that contiguous counties in adjacent states can be included for assistance where eligible family farmers may qualify for emergency loan assistance for physical and production losses. The designation allows family-size farm operators in the designated counties in all five states to be considered for low-interest emergency loans from CFSA. CFSA will receive and process emergency loan applications through May 1, 1996, for physical and production losses related to this designation. CFSA has a variety of farm-loan programs available, in addition to the emergency loan program, to assist eligible farmers to recover from periods of adversity. Additional information and assistance is available through local CFSA county offices.
