FLAG TO BE POSTED AT OLD JAIL SI

CHUCK WAGON FEED TO RAISE FUNDS

The Old Mobeetie Association in cooperation with the 4th Cavalry O.F.G.M.R. (Old Fort Griffin Memorial Regiment) announced a special event today. The event will be the donation and posting of a brand new regulation garrison flag measuring 10'x20' appropriate for the period of 1875, the year Fort Elliott was established in the Panhandle.

The event will be held on Saturday, October 21, at 10:00 a.m. at the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum located 14 miles west of Wheeler.

The Old Mobeetie Jail and Museum has some of the few existing pieces of Old Ft. Elliott remaining. The original

80' tall flag pole from Ft. Elliott is now at the Old Mobeetie Jail. Ft. Elliott was located one mile northwest of Old Mobeetie Jail.

The 4th Cavalry will appear mounted and in period uniform for the event. The flag will be raised in grand military fashion to the sounds of bugle played by Ed Benz, who is director of the Hutchinson Museum in Borger. After the ceremony, a chuckwagon feed will be held to raise funds for the Museum. Adults may eat for \$6.00 each.

The flag project is a two phased preservation project of the 4th Cavalry unit to create interest in the Mobeetie Museum and Old Ft. Elliott. The Cav-

alry unit is the official interpretive unit for the Old Mobeetie Association. Phase II will be the stabilization of the cedar flag pole, repair and painting. The project is being sponsored by the 4th Cavalry unit. They are one of three volunteer cavalry units in the Panhandle actively interpreting the cavalry story of the Red River Wars here in 1874.

Special guests for the event include Walt Davis, Director of the Panhandle Plains Museum and Dr. Jack Hughes, Archeologist. Ada Lester is the President of the Old Mobeetie Texas Association. Bob Izzard will be a guest

A special exhibit is currently on display inside the Mobeetie Museum of a U.S. Cavalry saddle, outfitted uniformed mannequin, barracks room, and equipment of the type used at the Fort. Weapons, insignia and artifacts pertaining to the Fort are also on display as well as a 6'x10' diorama of the Old Fort. The exhibits were prepared by the members of the unit.

The Old Mobeetie Association has become well known for its museum and annual bluegrass festival music weekend. They are now bringing attention to Fort Elliott and hope to become an information centerfor it. They are seeking to form a registry of parts and pieces of the buildings, furniture, photographs and equipment from the Fort. half. Even while allowing Sunray to score, the Mustang defense held the Bobcats the rest of the night without another touchdown. The Mustang defensive front 7 bent but did not break. H. J. "Cotton" Ridgway, 72, of Mobeetie, died Friday, Oct. 13, 1995, in Amarillo. Services were at 2:30 p.m. Sunday in the First United Methodist Church at Mobeetie with the Rev. Thacker Haynes, pastor of First United Methodist Church of McLean, and the Rev. Gary Jahnel, pastor of the First United Methodist Church at Mobeetie, officiating. Burial was in the Mobeetie Cemetery under the direction of Wright Funeral Home of Wheeler.

Mr. Ridgway was born Nov. 17, 1922, at Roby, Texas. He moved to Wheeler County in 1929 from Roby. He married Clara Corcoran on Oct. 5, 1946, in Pampa. He was employed as a rural letter carrier for the U.S. Postal Service for 25 years, retiring in 1991. He was a veteran, serving in the U.S. Army during World War II




County show lambs will be ear tagged with a county tag and major show lambs will be nose printed, tattooed and tagged with a state valida-





Extension Update By Joan Gray, CEA-HE

HAVE A SAFE HALLOWEEN

There is something new out this Halloween to help with spotting those ghosts and goblins. It makes costumes glow in the dark - a perfect special effect for this ghoulish holiday. They are called "glow in the dark trims" and are made to absorb light and glow in the dark for 15 to 20 minutes after lights are turned off. Extension clothing specialists Alma Fonseca says the trims can be washed in cold water and dried on a low setting. They can even be ironed over. For safety, she also recommends costumes of light colors to help motorists see trick or treaters better. And make sure the fabric is flame resistant. Avoid costumes with baggy sleeves or billowing skirts because they are more likely to come in contact with an exposed flame or candle. 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
