SEASONS OPENER FRIDAY MUSTANGS VERSUS MANGUM

Wheeler Mustangs will meet their first opponent of the football season with the Mangum game scheduled Friday night at Nicholson Field. Game time is 8:00.

This game should be a rerun of last year's game as neither team suffered any serious loss of players in spring graduation and practically the same players will meet on the field this year. Wheeler downed Mangum last year 28 to 6.

Wheeler Mustangs are coached this year by J.T. Hill, Bill Harle and Richard Gaines are serving as assistant coaches and list the following as their starting line-up; McCasland, 161 lb. center; Watson, 159 lb. guard; Overcast, 160 lb. guard; Adams, 204 lb. tackle; Jimmie Jamison, 202 lb. tackle; Jamie Moore, 168 lb. end; Hunter, 155 lb. end; Wallace, 157 lb. back; Porter, 180 lb. back; Burks, 160 lb. back and Vanpool, 132 lb. back.

The Mangum Tigers are coached by John Buck and W.D. Bogan. Their line-up shows 8 players at 170 or over. They will be particularly interested in this game for two reasons. It is their first game of the season also and Wheeler was the only team to defeat them last year.

Wheeler was undefeated last year until the bi-district game at which time they were put down by the Matador Matadors 12-6.

One lineman will not be able to participate in this game due to a turned ankle and will not see action possibly next week against Erick. At the time of writing it was still questioned as to whether or not Bobby Vanpool would see action this week.

Concerning the game, Coach Hill said, "We can win, but it will be a tough game." The coaching staff feels that the boys will be in excellent condition for the season opener.

The Wheeler Mustangs are loaded. Even Coach J.T. Hill, in his first year at the eastern Panhandle school can't think up a good excuse to get him out from under the favorite's tag.

He has 18 lettermen back from the team that won the district 5-B Championship under Grady Burnett last year, eight of them starters. He has 11 seniors to give his team a steady influence and an outstanding all-state candidate in Dunk Porter, the big fullback who scored 88 points and averaged 5.8 yards per carry last season.

He also has two other backs who averaged over five yards per carry and two backs who scored four or more touchdowns last year.

His starting team averages 170 pounds. A number of teams in this area do not have a half dozen men on the entire squad weighing that much.

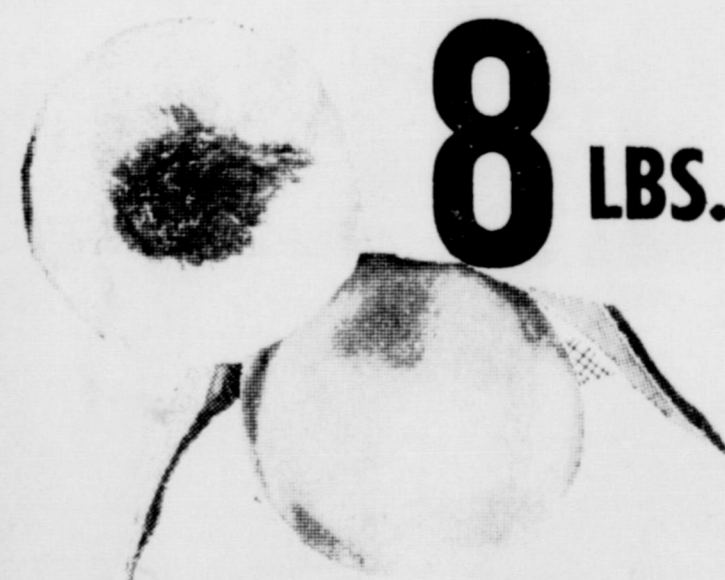

PRESENTATION OF PLAQUES FOR HISTORICAL LANDMARKS IN CO.

At Old Settlers Picnic at Mobeetie Labor Day Invocation - Br. Charles Uzzle, Introduction of distinguished guests - Mrs. Grady W. Harris (Sallie) Mrs. Harris introduced the Judge, George W. Hefley and Commissioners, Shelby Pettit, O.W. Pendleton, Ernest Henderson and Clois Hanner and commended them for the \$300 they had allocated for the historical committee to use for markers and medallions and other needs.

Representative Granger McIlhany was introduced and he very ably discussed the Historical program of the state and stressed the fact that Wheeler County was one of the leading historical spots in the Panhandle of Texas and to make the dedication of the buildings in the shadow of the old rock jail, which was the first in the Panhandle of Texas, was indeed an inspiration to him on this Labor Day in 1964.

The first Medallion plate was presented to Grady W. Harris, the owner of The Old Rock House, which was the first in the Panhandle of Texas. The plate reads: Old Rock House First Substantial Home in Wheeler County, Built Across Creek From Hidetown, Buffalo Hunters' Post, about 1870 by Henry Fleming, First Sheriff, Rock Quarried Nearby. All of Four 14 foot Square Rooms. Was Considered A Mansion. Served the County Until a Courthouse Could Be Built.

The second plate was presented to Tom Puryear, the grandson of Henry Frye who settled in Wheeler County in 1877 and the family has continuously ranched on the same land where he built his home and lived.

This house is nine miles east on highway 152 then north 3 miles and west 2 miles from the town of Wheeler. The plate reads: Frye Puryear home, Built 1884. Native Stone. Windows and Lumber Hauled 200 Miles South From Dodge City, By Henry Frye, 1877 Settler Who had bought land of Buffalo Hunter and Dugout Dweller Dick Bussell. Had First Wood Floors in County. Mail came From Mobeetie to Frye Post-office here, 1897 - 1909.

The third and fourth presentation was received by David Britt, the grandson of the Mr. Britt who bought the ranch land in 1913 where the two famous rock houses now stand. David expressed appreciation and pride for the County Committee having selected two buildings on their ranch to be preserved for future grandchildren who would wonder about how the early settlers lived so many years ago.

The Britt Rock House reads: Britt Rock House, 1884. Built by T.A. Baley, On North Bank of Sweetwater Creek. One of the Best Early Houses in Wheeler County. Native Red Stone was Quarried in "Rock Hollow" on nearby Stiles Ranch. Owned by Fred Rathjen 1899-1913, and since by the Britt Family. (1964) The Rock School House Plate reads "Rock School"

"My Cherished Friend," was presented by Ruby Blackburn of Wheeler Chapter.

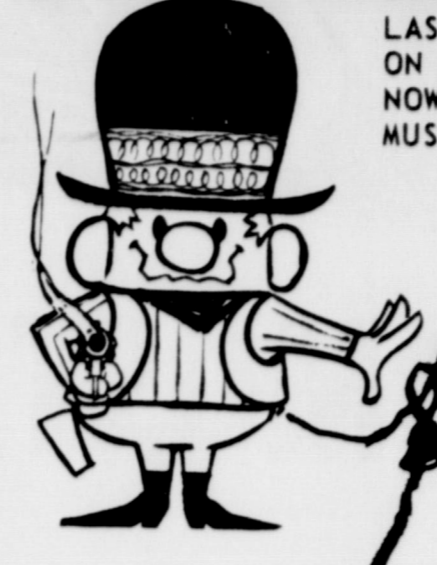
Juanita Matthews, of Mobeetie Chapter presented the Annual Protest, "I Don't Want to Go to School."

 several of them able to negotiate 100 yards in 10.5 or better.
 His depth is enough to make most Class B coaches turn green.

In short, the number two ranking in the state given by a Dallas rating service may not be wrong.
 Heading up the team, of course is Porter, the 185 pound senior. He will be a starter for the fourth straight year. Last year, he scored 14 touchdowns despite sitting out a good part of most game because the Hosses didn't want to completely humiliate the opposition. He has ankle trouble but should be able to rest quite frequently this year, also.

Bobby Vanpool, a swift halfback who scored seven touchdowns and averaged 5.3 yards on 70 carries last year as a freshman, returns to diversify Hill's attack and dismay opposing coaches.

Johnny Hutchison and Gary Hardcastle, two more freshman whizzes last year, return to strengthen the halfback picture but will have trouble beating out Tom Smith, who will not be eligible until the next - to - last game of the season, and Don Burks, a senior who reported for practice late but may wark into a starting position.

Hill finds little difference in the quality of these men and has four other halfbacks to back them up.
 The situation at quarterback is equally pleasant with Richard Wallace, who will be a starter for the third year, heading up a crop of four. Wallace scored four touchdowns and passed for six more last year.

Mike Good, a junior letterman, and David Jamison, a sophomore letterman, will also see plenty of action. Freshman Bobby Ware is promising but is an unknown quantity due to his youth.

Senior starter, Terry McCasland and sophomore Ricky DeArment will handle the center position in more than adequate fashion.
 Two more seniors, Gene Watson and Bill Overcast, add experience to the guard position as starters. Backing them up are a senior, Larry Garrison, and two freshmen, Dwight Ford and Mike Holt. Only Garrison and Holt weigh less than 156 pounds.

The starting tackles are hefty and experienced. Jimmy Adams, a regular on defense last year who will likely go both ways this year, weighs 209 and is a senior. Jimmy Jamison is 205 and a senior.

COUNTY AGENT'S REPORT

Salt Analysis of Irrigation Water Advised

It's poor business to guess at the quality of your irrigation water. Rather than to be in doubt as to possible harmful effects of the water on future soil productivity, irrigated farmers should have their water evaluated by a chemical analysis.

The ideal time to collect samples is during the highest period of water use. This need is particularly acute with new wells and in instances where wells are deeper than average for the area. It is known that common salt in high concentrations may exist below the red bed formation. If wells extend into this strata, there is a greater possibility of dangerous salt levels in the water.

Soils vary widely in their ability to tolerate salt without being harmed, and some crops are more tolerant than others. Clays, where the water intake rate is already slow, can be made even less porous by a water high in sodium accumulation that "seals" or crusts the surface.

Water samples may be submitted to the Soil Testing Laboratory at Texas

They teach the straight T with a few wing variations.

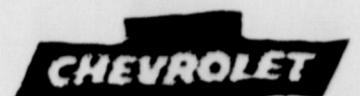
WHEELER HIRES SCHOOL NURSE

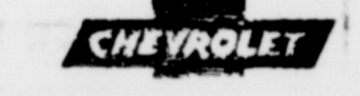
