BY CHARLES D. JACKSON Salt Analysis of Irrigation Water Advised

It's poor business to guess at the quality of your irrigation water. Rather than to be in doubt as to possible No. 6180 Thomas W Bailey harmful effects of the water on future soil productivity, irrigated farmers should have their water evaluated by a chemical analysis. The ideal time to collect samples is during the highest period of water use.

This need is particularly acute with new wells and in instances where wells are deeper than average for the area. It is known that common salt in high concentrations may exist below the red bed formation. If wells extend into this strata. there is a greater possibility of dangerous salt lev-
