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
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Lydia McWhorter Funeral Held Mon.

GRAZING AND HAYING RIGHTS

A telegram was sent from U.S. Representative Walter Rogers in answer to a request by Wheeler and area farmers for permission to use diverted crop land for haying and grazing purposes. The Telegram read:

"Agriculture Department offers Haying and grazing privileges on diverted crop land through October 31 to farmers and ranchers in Potter, Gray and Wheeler Counties. Arrangements , made through ASC County

Committee. Walter Rogers. This means persons having soil bank land and feed grain diverted acres will be able to graze this land at the rate of a minimum of one dollar per acre per month with the maximum charge being fifty percent of the annual

payment.
If the land is baled for hay then the charge is fifty percent of the annual payment on the soil bank land or the feed grain diverted acres. Of course, the payment of a minimum of one dollar per acre per month on the feed grain diverted acres will cease when the secretary of agriculture releases this land for grazing which is November 1st The Wheeler County ASCS program if the request is



IRRIGATION SYSTEM INTSTALLED ON GRADY DODD PLACE NEAR BRISCOE

Grady Dodd of the Briscoe community is shown beside his newly installed Irrigation system. Dodds have a 320 acre farm and plan to irrigate 250 acres of wheat and

row crops. The 400' well was completed July 22 and irrigation was started July 31 A Tri-Matic System is one of the many systems available Mr. Dodd reports that he can irrigate 22 out of 24 hours. The system

moves itself at the rate of 300 feet each 12 hours and through the 126 sprinkler heads leaves moisture equivilent to 4" of rain.

The well is pumped with butane and has an estimated capacity of 800 gallons per minute.

At the present time, Mr. Dodd is irrigating 34 acres cotton, 25 acres, millet and some maze. He is in the process of planting 200 acres of wheat.





On one Wheeler County Ranch heavy cattle losses resulted recently from nitrate poisoning on Midland Burmuda Grass. Although nitrate poisoning in burmuda is very rare according to Extension Agronomist and Livestock Specialist, 1 think that livestock producers will agree that any losses would be considered excessive. The Wheeler County nitrate losses were caused by nitrate accumulation during drouth where the leaves wilted ar rolled during the day, but take up suficient water during the night to regain turgor. Grazing of

plants that are in stress due

to drouth should therefore

proceed with caution since

the plants are consumed

before the nitrates can be

converted into protein. Following the application of fertilizer materials to pasture grasses and forage sorghums, several precautions should be observed to avoid possibilities of nitrate poisoning of livestock. The cattle should first be removed from the grea to be fertilized. If spillage occurs in filling a rig, the material should be picked up to prevent spots unusually high concentration. Bags should be removed from the field since cattle will sometimes be attracted by them. Livestock should be kept off the area for a week after the area

If the forage is particularly succulent it is a good idea to not graze before 10:00 a.m. since nitrates accumulate in the plants at night and are not changed to the protein forms until sufficient light has been received.

The possibility of nitrate toxicity should not discourage farmers from using nitrogen fertilizers at economically practical rates recommended by the Extension Service since nitrate accumulation in plants may occur under certain conditions on soils that have not been recently fertilized. A veterinarian should be called at once when nitrate poisoning is

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
