

Wheeler Group Receives Grant to Develop Architectural Plans

The Wheeler Area Activities and Improvement Council received a grant for \$5000.00 from The David and Nona Payne Foundation in Pampa, Texas. The money is to be used to hire an architect to develop plans for a new library and community center.

The Wheeler Area Activities and Improvements Council, Inc. (WAAIC) was incorporated on June 14, 1993 by nine individuals. The objectives are:
A. Foster and maintain this Christian community.
B. Provide jobs and economic de-

velopment for the Wheeler area.

C. Improve on the educational, historical and recreational facilities in this area.

D. Develop an independent living facility which will offer many services and amenities and eliminate many of the responsibilities of home maintenance for the senior citizens.

E. Establish and maintain a 501 (c) (3) not for profit corporation to accept donations, grants, gifts and awards to be distributed as directed by this board.

The purposes of the WAAIC are as follows:

1. Securing funding for area development of nonprofit retirement

center for aging and physically impaired. Retirement center is to provide limited care to its residents including, but not limited to providing shelter, nutrition, social activities and recreation. This facility will provide jobs and economic growth for the area. The retirement center will be managed on a daily basis by another organization.

2. Securing funding for public library, park and playground equipment and youth oriented sports activities.

3. Securing funding for other area 501 (c) organizations as requests are received.

4. Manage area development and activities as directed by this board.

MUSTANG BAND ADVANCES TO AREA BAND RECEIVES THREE SUPERIOR RATINGS IN REGIONAL MARCHING COMPETITION

On Saturday, October 21, the Wheeler High School Band competed at Regional Marching Contest in Borger. The Mustang Band earned ratings of Superior from all three judges.

Bands receiving a superior rating at Regional Marching Contest qualify to attend the next level of competition in U.I.L. Marching. This year's Area Marching Contest will be held in Lubbock on Saturday, October 28.

The Wheeler Band was the only band in this region receiving a superior rating. The Groom Band will advance with Wheeler to Area competition, even though they did not receive a rating higher than a 2.

Ten Bands in Class "A", eleven bands in class "AA", seven bands in class "AAA" and seven bands in "AAAA" presented their final marching show for this season. Wheeler and Groom will represent Region I in the

area competition against bands from three other regions; Lubbock, Odessa, and El Paso. The area competition will be held for bands in classes "A", "AA", and "AAAA" this year in Lubbock at Jones Stadium on the campus of Texas Tech on Saturday October 28th.

The time for Wheeler's performance at Lubbock had not been announced at press time Wednesday.

MUSTANGS LOSE GAME TO SHAMROCK IRISH FRI., 28-14

The Wheeler Mustangs lost a heart-breaker last Friday night against the Irish of Shamrock 28 to 14. This loss

knocked the boys in black out of any playoff picture for the 1995 football year. For only the third time in 18 years the Wheeler team fell to Shamrock and fell hard.

The Mustangs began the contest aggressively and inent upon winning, but due to adversity and mental errors (that plagued the Mustangs all year long), the Mustangs were unable to stop Shamrock from putting up 14 quick points in the first half. The Mustang defense appeared to slow down, if not stop, the Irish running attack but was unable to stop the Irish air attack which was responsible for a great deal of the offensive yardage gained by the Irish. The Mustangs, again, were unable to mount much of offensive threat by running the ball inside against a stingy Irish defense.

In the second half of play the Mustangs came out attacking and scored on a 10 yard run by Travis Stevens, the extra point attempt failed and Wheeler seemed to be back on track and at least could see a way to get ahead only trailing 14 to 6 in the third quarter. However, the Irish scored quickly again twice in the second half, with the Mustangs only able to produce one more late score in the fourth quarter with a great catch by T. A. Taylor and the extra point attempt good by another reception from Jason Porton, both thrown by Travis Stevens.

It was just one of those nights for the Mustangs. Several penalties kept the Mustangs out of scoring position in the first and second halves of play, and more penalties aided the Irish in obtaining excellent field position. This was one area the Mustangs could not afford to let up on, but ultimately did. The Mustangs were penalized for a total of 97 yards, compared to the Irish only having 65 yards in penalties. Mustang rushers combined for a total of 157 yards, with Bryan Judd carrying the ball for 81 yards, Jeremy Davis with 5 yards, Andy Francis with 29, Aaron Dunnam with 10 and Stevens with 32 yards. In the receiving category Stevens completed 7 out of 16 passes for 79 yards. Keith Rose had 37 yards receiving, Jason Porton with 12, T. A. Taylor with 17 and Jeremy Davis with 12 yards of receiving yard-

age. Outstanding blocks from the Mustang line were provided by Darby Dorman, Josh Lee, and Charlie Flanagan throughout the night.

Defensively the Mustangs received outstanding effort from it's Linebackers, and Defensive front four, as well as big plays made by the secondary.

Even though the game was lost, the Mustangs played hard for four solid quarters and only defeated themselves. Nothing at all is meant to take away from a good Shamrock team, but the Mustangs had the opportunities to win or stay in the game, but failed to capitalize on them at the right moments.

The Mustangs travel to White Deer this Friday night to play a tough team and a wide open air attack provided by the White Deer Bucks. The Mustang coaching staff and players would also like to extend their appreciation for all the fans and support last Friday night during the pep rally and during the game.

Juanita Bradstreet Levitt Graveside Rites Are Mon.

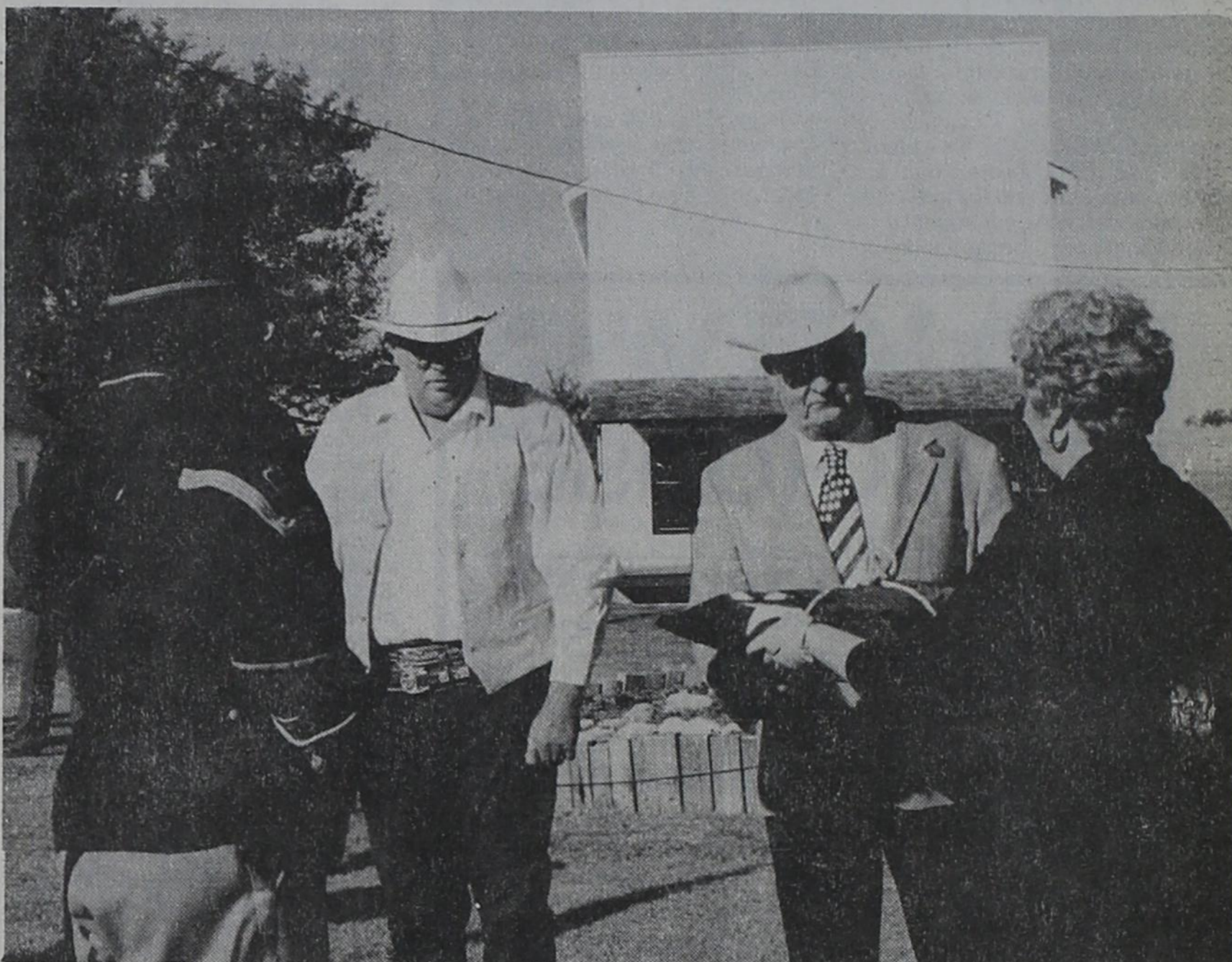
Juanita Bradstreet Levitt, 84, died Friday, Oct. 20, 1995.

JERRY HEFLEY ANNOUNCES AS CANDIDATE FOR OFFICE

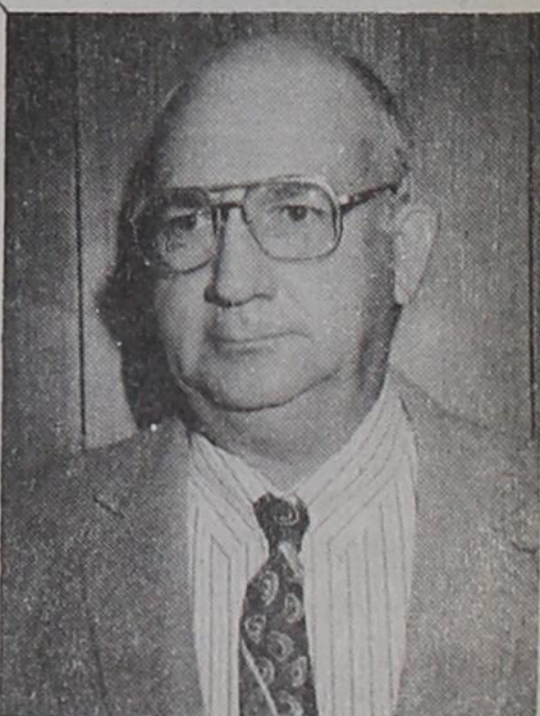
Jerry Dan Hefley announces this week he will be a candidate for reelection to the office of Tax Assessor-Collector of Wheeler County.

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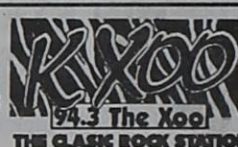

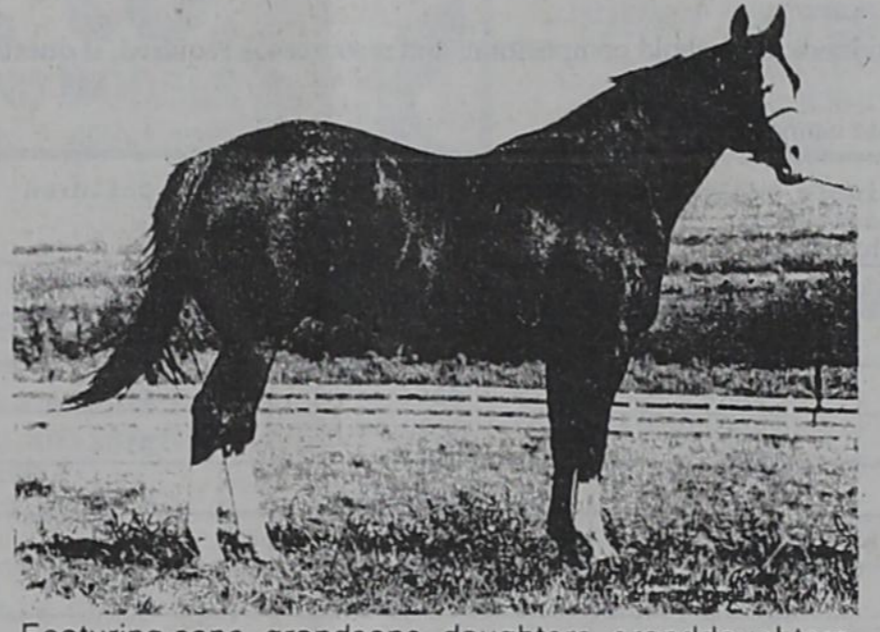

4. Liquid resources assets cannot exceed \$1000. The equity value of a car greater than \$1500 is counted against the \$1000 limit. Personal property and homestead are exempt assets.
5. Eligible persons must be a resident of North Wheeler County Hospital District.
6. Applicants must provide all requested information and documentation requested.
7. Applicants must apply for any other program for which they are potentially eligible. The county program is payor of last resort.
8. Applicants have the right to appeal adverse decisions.

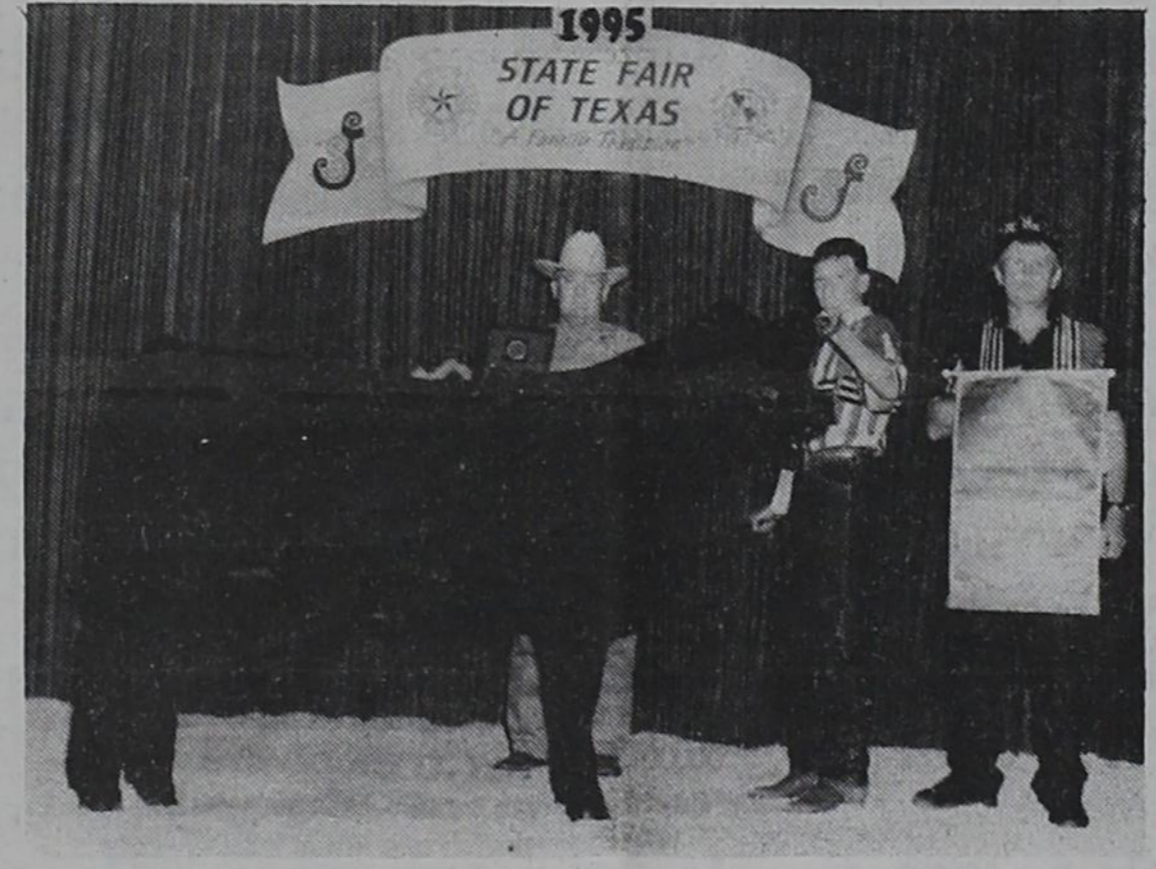

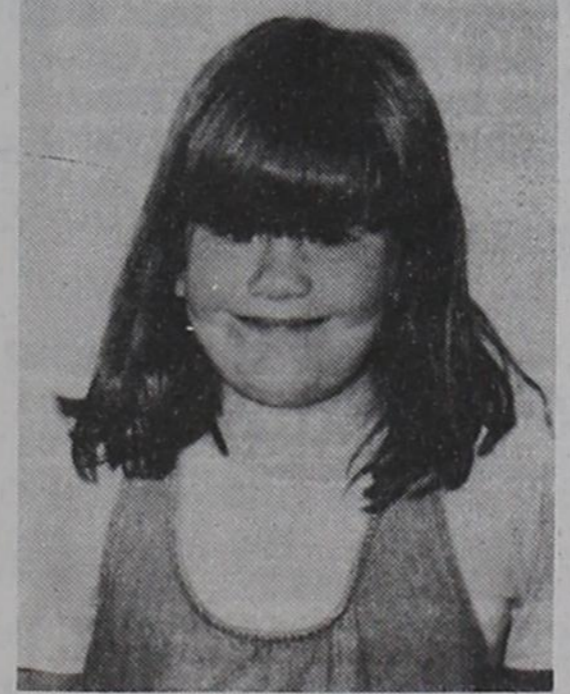
The Varsity Boys division was won by the White Deer team. Second place went to Claude.

From the Minister's Desk:

Generation Y is the title of the supplement that is carried in the Friday edition of the Amarillo Daily News. This supplement is designed for young people and it usually contains some perceptive articles that have been written by young people.

For example, a recent issue of Generation Y contained a perceptive article that was entitled, "Why Does Everyone Want To Play The Blame Game". This article was written by Micah Green, a sophomore at Borger High School, and it said . . .

"In the last couple of years, many legal cases have ended with the defendant going unpunished because of one little phrase: 'It's not my fault.' This often-used excuse, although usually attributed to small children seeking to get out of trouble, has become the universal fix-all for anyone convicted of wrong-doing. Refusal to accept responsibility has reached epidemic proportions in our society. Almost everyone is shouting in unison, 'It's not my fault. I'm a victim of abuse. I didn't know what I was doing and everyone else is doing it anyway.'"

"The trial of the Menendez brothers is an example of this kind of rationale. The two brothers were clearly guilty, but they managed to escape conviction (at least temporarily) for their actions by stating that years of abuse had driven them to murder. Lorena Bobbitt's lawyer also used this argument in saying she could not be held responsible for mutilating her husband. Countless defendants have used this same strategy to gain the sympathy of the jury and to establish the idea that the accused shouldn't be responsible for their actions."

"This extends beyond the criminal justice system, however. Almost anything can be rationalized through the excuse of victimization. From chronic drunkenness to eating disorders to failure to keep a job, our society will accept almost any excuse for poor behavior. Often, the perpetrator even fools himself into believing that he is a victim of circumstances beyond his control. Cheers went up en masse when medical researchers hinted at a genetic predisposition toward things like obesity and alcoholism; groups such as homosexuals and pedophiles constantly behavior to their DNA. If any medical evidence supporting these claims were found, these

groups would be relieved of all accountability for their actions."

"Now you may say, 'Wait a minute. Some of these people really were abused and really do have some-what good reasons for their actions.' Perhaps so, but despite what others have done to us, we still have control over what we do. We can accept the consequences of our actions and accomplish great things in spite of our limitations or we can rationalize our behavior and place the blame for our failures on circumstances or other people."

"It may be argued that, 'Everyone does that; everyone tries to justify their actions.' That may be true, but by no means should we allow our government and justice system to accept this philosophy that no one is truly at fault for his or her conduct. Although the key to stopping this lack of responsibility lies in changing the mind-set of American people, our judicial system must lead not only in stopping criminals from using the 'I'm a victim; it's not my fault' rationale, but also in holding them accountable for any mistakes they have committed."

"Teen-agers in particular have begun to buy into this philosophy. Rarely will any teen admit he or she was wrong. Although we are just following the lead of the adult generation, I believe this generation can make a dramatic turn in the right direction for our society."

"Doug Erlandson, a former professor at the University of Nebraska, phrased it best when he said, 'Responsible behavior means that I change what I can about my situation. Once I accept responsibility, I will want to change and will discover practical steps I can take to bring about change.'"

"If someone truly has suffered or really does come from a disadvantaged situation, the best thing he or she can do is try to change the situation for the better instead of doing wrong and blaming others. When we do make mistakes, the best thing to do is admit, 'It's my fault', accept the consequences, and learn from them. If our society, government and especially we teen-agers would do that, I think we would see a much better, more responsible nation."

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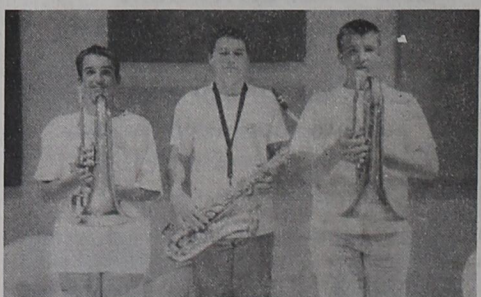
