W. Girls Capture Trophy, 4 Named All-Tourney

Wheeler teams won two games each in the play at the Canadian Tournament held last weekend. The boys played Morse for a win with the score 56-37. This win was followed by a loss to Briscoe 68-48. The girls met Morse and took a 38-19 win. Their match with Briscoe was lost 57-43.

Even though they did not win the tournament, the players did bring home the honors. The girls won the trophy for sportsmanship and two boys and two girls were named to the All-Tournament team.

Dunk Porter with 15 points and 4 rebounds was named to the All-Tournament along with Villard Hunter who racked up 8 points and 9 rebounds in the two games.

For the girls, Sherry Barnes and Linda Hall were named to the All-Tournament squad. Sherry had 13 points in the two games. Linda played outstanding

defensive ball and seized several rebounds.

The teams met Kelton Tuesday night for two wins to their credit.

BRISCOE TEAMS TAKE HONORS AT CANADIAN

The Briscoe Broncos won their second tournament this year by winning the Canadian Tournament. The boys defeated Higgins 91 to 59 in the opening game. Harvey Puryear and Tom Hays scored 21 points each to lead the Broncos.

In the second game Briscoe defeated a stubborn Wheeler crew 68 to 48. Tom Hays paced the Broncos with 25 points.

In the finals, Briscoe defeated Allison 61 to 45. This was a thriller as Briscoe beat Allison the second time this season.

Tom Hays again lead the scoring with 28 points. Tom Hays and Arville Atterton were named as All-Tournament players.

The Briscoe Broncoettes won first place in the Canadian tournament last weekend.

The girls defeated Higgins 55 to 29 in the opener with Micky Fulks scoring 26 points. In the second the girls coasted by Wheeler 57 to 43 as Micky Fulks scored 41 points.

Fallett was their opponent in the finals Saturday night. The Broncoettes jumped off to a quick lead and stayed for a 50 to 41 victory. Fulks scored 29 points. Judy Finsterwald, Micky Fulks and Patty Ann Hall were named to the All-Tournament team.

PORTER, WATSON NAMED TO ALL-STATE FOOTBALL

Two of Wheeler's Mustangs were named to the All-State team recently by the Sportswriters Association. This is the first year an All-State B team has been chosen and the squad is made up of 33 boys.

Wheeler was one of two Top O'Texas class B teams named on the squad.

Dunk Porter, Wheeler's 185 pound fullback was a first team choice on the Class B list and Gene Watson, a guard, made the second unit.

In the year's play, Dunk gained 1,549 yds. rushing; 53 yds. passing for a total of 1,602 yards gained. He scored 27 touchdowns and made 4 extra points and had a total of 170 points at the end of the season.

Dunk made the First Team All Top O'Texas as a Full Back and a Line backer. He was named on the All-District both Offense and Defense; this was his third year to be named on the All-District team.

In addition to these honors, Dunk has been nominated for the High School All-American.

Gene Watson was named on the first teams both offensive and defensive in all districts and made the first team in the All Top O'Texas as a guard.

During the season's play, he intercepted three passes and set up numerous touchdowns for his teammates.

The slick snow received Saturday was to blame for this mishap in the east edge of town on 152. James Williams was traveling east

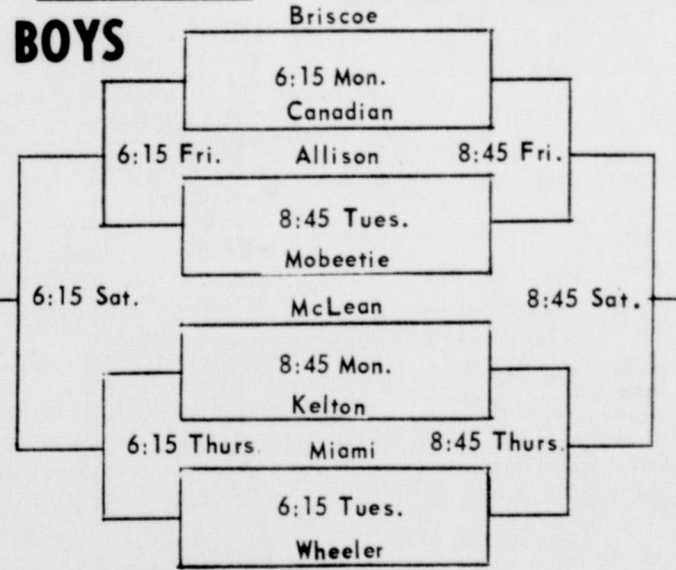
and slid on the ice. He was unable to regain control of his 1953 Buick and slid into the 1961 Ford belonging to S.L. Ivey which was parked

along side the pavement. Approximately \$300 damage was done to the Ivey car and \$350 damage to the Williams car.

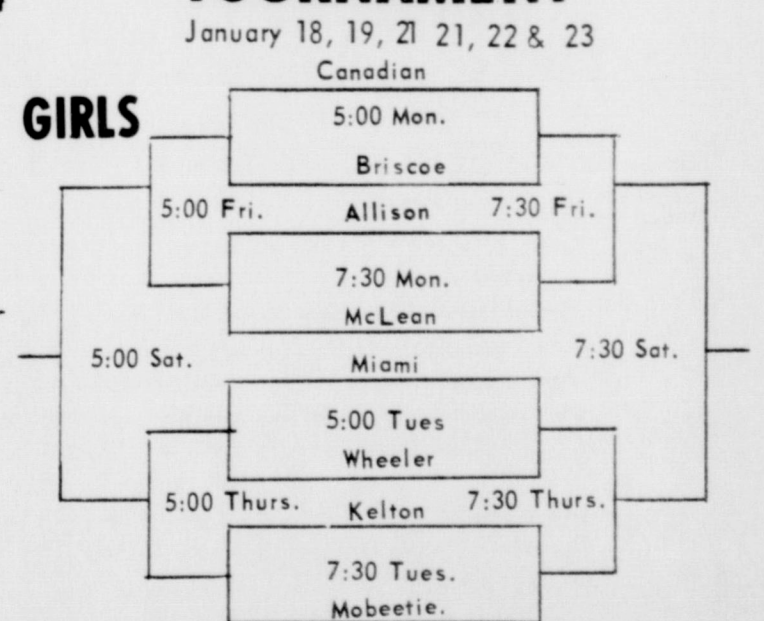

County Agent Reports

WEST TEXAS ELM TREES THREATENED

Recent surveys have shown the smaller European elm bark beetle to be widely distributed in North and West Texas. This beetle is the principle carrier of the fatal Dutch Elm Disease which attacks all species of native and European elms. This disease has almost completely destroyed all of the trees in some areas of the country.

Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Plant Pathologist at Lubbock and M.V. Mesich, Assistant Entomologist from College Station completed the survey this fall.

The beetles were found in Potter, Hutchinson, Gray, Wheeler, Collingsworth and Wilbarger counties, in addition to these counties the beetles had been found in El Paso county in 1958 and in Midland county in 1963.

Although the disease carrying beetles appear to be wide spread, Dr. Berry pointed out that the disease itself has not been found in Texas. However the disease is known to be as near as Oklahoma City.

The beetles attack elm trees for both breeding and feeding. The feeding attacks are made only in living elm trees, while the beetles prefer dead or dying wood in which to establish broods of young. Living trees are infested by fungal spores carried on it in the body of the feeding beetles.

With the beetles established in the area and the disease present in Oklahoma the elms in this part of Texas are definitely in danger.

The only known way to combat Dutch Elm Disease is through control of its insect carrier. Regular applications of DDT or Sevin to healthy elm trees is effective in protecting them from feeding beetles which may carry the disease.

All dead or dying elms which serve as breeding sites for the beetles should be destroyed. Susceptible elm trees should not be planted in areas threatened by Dutch Elm Disease. Resistant trees such as the Christine Buisman Elm or other nut or shade tree species should be considered when choosing new plants.

"Closing time," as it refers to 1964 farm records, is close at hand. This means totaling the balance sheets on all farm and enterprises and taking a look at what happened during the year.

A close look should point up problems that must be met in planning for 1965 and on into the future. A good set of farm records will record problems that are of vital concern to every member of the family. Records often reflect whether a management change cuts costs and raised profits or whether a minor farm enterprise should be dropped or expanded.

Furthermore, a complete set of records is a must at income tax figuring time. Regularly kept records can save dollars at tax paying time, for deductible expenses are often overlooked, especially if paid in cash. With tax rates as they are now, failure to claim \$25.00 deductible expenses adds about \$3.50 to the tax bill and even more in the case of

higher tax brackets. Complete farm records are an asset when money must be borrowed for production or operating expenses. Knowing what the business is doing makes a strong talking point in effecting credit arrangements. Too, farm families need facts on which to base their decisions, and none are more reliable than those obtained from well-kept records.

Feel free to contact the county agents office if assistance is needed on record keeping. Get into the habit of keeping up-to-date records, and you'll come out ahead in 1965.

Properly fertilized lawns and gardens get off to a good start in the spring, and a soil test is just the thing to determine what fertilizer to use.

Soils must be fertile to keep lawn grasses green and growing and to keep gardens producing good quality fresh vegetables. Soil fertility and the right kind and amount of fertilizer to add can be determined by laboratory tests, with due consideration being given to the plant or crop soil properties and past treatment.

It's a simple process to take a soil sample for testing. To take a lawn sample, scrape off the surface litter and dig up a small slice of

the top two or three inches of soil. Repeat at 10 different places, mix the portions together in a clean bucket and remove about a pint to be used for testing.

Use the same procedure in a garden, but remove a slice to plow depth, or about the top six inches of soil. Normally, one sample is enough for each lawn or garden area. However, if a problem exists, separate composite samples from good and bad areas may supply information that will help in the diagnosis.

A soil test will not determine the presence of plant diseases, soil insects or causes for poor growth not due to a lack of fertility. When samples are taken, however, to help determine if plant growth is poor, a complete description of appearance of the plants and disease symptoms should be included on an information sheet submitted with the samples.

This information sheet, which includes instructions for sampling, is available along with a soil cartons at the county extension office. It should be completed and sent with the sample to the Soil Testing Laboratory at Texas A&M University along with the \$2 per sample testing fee. Results from the test will usually be available in about two weeks.

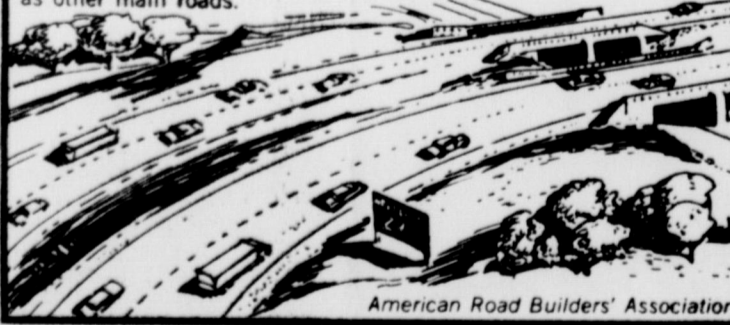

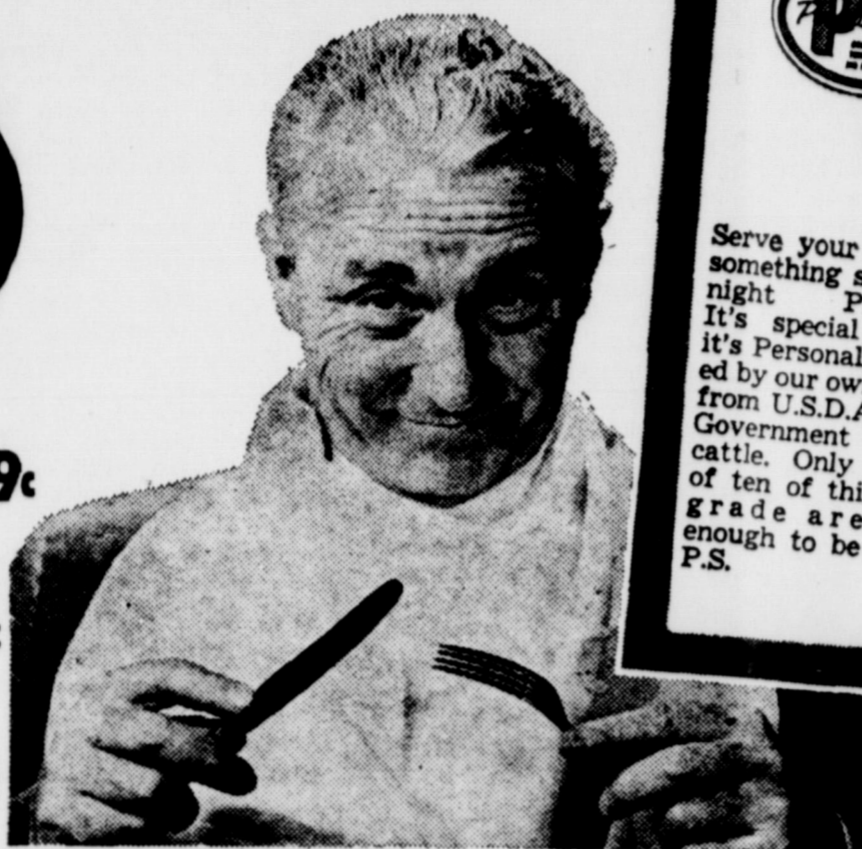

SCD NEWS

A soil survey is being made of Wheeler County. The end result will be a published map of every acre of Wheeler County land.

The same information will be contained in this soils map as is now furnished each cooperator of the Wheeler County SCD. Recommendations are based on an accurate soils map. In turn these recommendations are based on research and experience on a soil with the characteristics. A farmer or rancher can take this information and combine it with his practical experience on his own land. He is then better able to prepare a conservation plan that will best meet his particular management system.

The standard soil survey gives a common language that can be used in talking about soils. Without it, sandy loam may mean one thing to one person and something else to another.

Besides conservation plans there are many other uses of the standard soils map. The Extension Service fertilizer recommendations are related to soil types as they are mapped by this survey. As new crop and grass varieties come out, they may be recommended for a particular group of soils as they have been mapped. Soil maps are needed before an irrigation system can be designed.

Runoff from a watershed is affected by the soils on that watershed. Some soils hold more water than others and they have different intake rates. These characteristics can be closely estimated for each soil type and then calculated along with the number of acres of each soil. In this way the design of a small farm and a big river dam or a highway bridge will depend on the soils above it.

These are just a few of the uses that can be made of a standard soils map. The standard soil survey now being made in Wheeler County is an attempt to map these soils as accurately as possible.

Range seeding has become one of the most beneficial conservation practices in our country. It has many beneficial returns both from a short and a long-term point of view. Good gains can be made from grass under proper management. This involves proper range use, deferred grazing as needed, and reseeding to improve the composition present.

Research has proven that better stands can be obtained by seeding into a protective cover. This cover will usually consist of rye, sorghum stubble, or Johnson-grass. The cover must be prevented from maturing to avoid annual competition. This usually calls for two mowings or light grazing. This cover should be maintained at a height of about 6-12 inches for the best results.

Several hundred acres were seeded to grass in 1962 and many more acres are planned for seeding this spring. Most of the cropland converted back to grass is either very steep or subject to wind erosion for farming. Proper soil conservation is proving to be more economically feasible than incorrect farming methods.

For information concerning seeding rates and cost share, contact your local Soil Conservation Service. It will soon be seeding time.
