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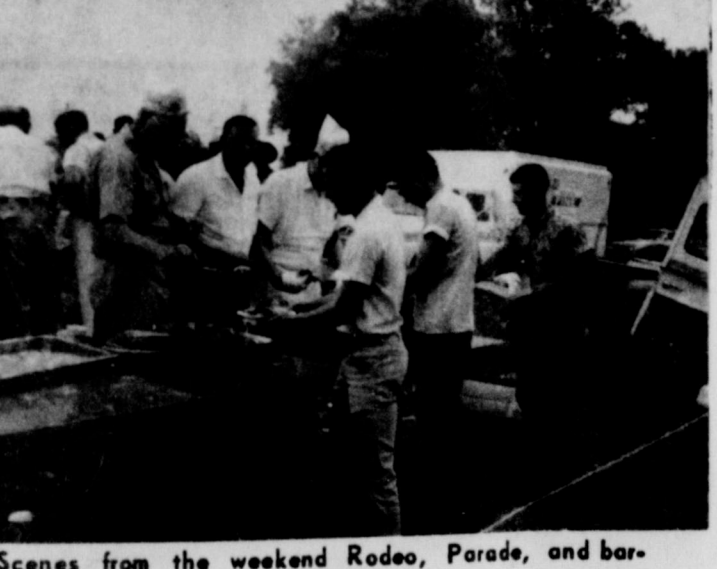

The annual Rodeo of The Wheeler Riding and Roping Club was held July 9, 10, and 11 at the rodeo arena in Wheeler.

Thursday evening before the rodeo, merchants of Wheeler and a few local farmers and ranchers served up a western style meal of barbecue, beans, pickles, onions, apple sauce and buns. This barbecue held before the rodeo has become an annual event. Mr. Loyd Davidson and Mr. John Hodges were in charge of having the balance of the meal prepared. Mr. John Barr of Wheeler prepared the 1500 pounds of barbecue that was consumed. 1600 plates were served.

Good crowds attended Thursday's and Friday's performances and there was an especially large turnout for Saturday's show.

The celebration started Thursday afternoon with a street parade. The parade included six riding clubs and three wagons. The wagons were part of the trail ride which came from Pampa especially for the rodeo. The riding clubs were from Wheeler, Sayre, Oklahoma, Tulia, Berlin, Oklahoma, Shamrock and Mobeetie. Trophies given the last night of the rodeo to the outstanding riding clubs went to Beckham County Wranglers, Sayre, Oklahoma - 1st Berlin, Riding Club - 2nd, Swisher County Sheriff's Possee Tulia.

Melton Liles, President of the Wheeler Riding Club made this statement: "In behalf of the Wheeler Riding Club, I appreciate all that the town, riding clubs and county as a whole did to make our Rodeo a success." The Wheeler Riding Club will be leaving Friday morning at 8:00 to attend the Rodeo Celebration in Tulia.

There will be a F.F.A. meeting this Thursday at 8:00 p.m. in the Agricultural classroom. It is important for all members to be present.

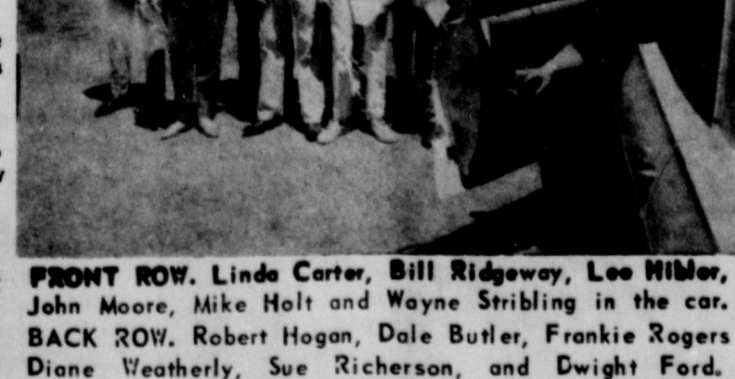
STU COMPLETE DRIVING COURSE

B.F. Westmoreland, who operates a 1/2 section of rangeland 4 miles south of Wheeler, has reshaped an old blowout area. "We are going to have to make the best use we can of each acre," Westmoreland stated.

After shaping, sorghums were planted to form a dead cover.

Native grasses or Weeping Lovegrass will be seeded into the dead litter next year according to West-

moreland.

Brush spraying was carried out on the place this year. More brush control is planned for next year.

Westmoreland is a Wheeler SCD cooperator. He receives technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service. Cost share assistance is provided by the A.S.C. and the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Seep ponds usually should be constructed so as to have a minimum of six feet of water. However, eight to ten feet of water is much better due to the fluctuation of the water table.

There are many places in the district where the water table is within four feet or less of the surface. Such sites usually are well suited for seep type ponds.

Seep ponds are cost shared through the ACP and Great Plains Conservation Program. For more information see your local Soil Conservation Service office.



DAIRY COWS graze contentedly outside the entrance to an underground livestock shelter near Elkhorn, Neb., which was built by J. Gordon Roberts, president of Roberts Dairy of Omaha, to protect 200 Guernsey cows and three bulls from a nuclear attack. His dairy farm is only about 25 miles from Strategic Air Command headquarters near Omaha. In peacetime, the \$35,000 shelter is used as a "loading shed" for the cows to get out of the sun. Roberts, who has also built shelters for his family and employees, says he built the livestock shelter because "the American dairy cow is one of the best in the world. It took 300 years to produce this type of animal. It makes sense to preserve it if we can."

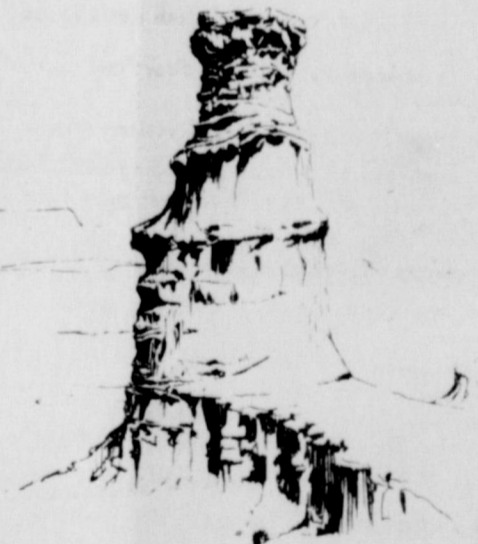

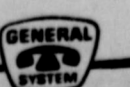


Palo Duro Canyon State Park

Etched deeply in the high plains of the Panhandle, just south of Amarillo, lies a spectacular gorge, widely renowned for its scenic beauty. In the first game Thursday night the Wheeler team stomped a team from Shamrock 15 to 5. A 3 run homer run by Keith Wood high lighted this game.

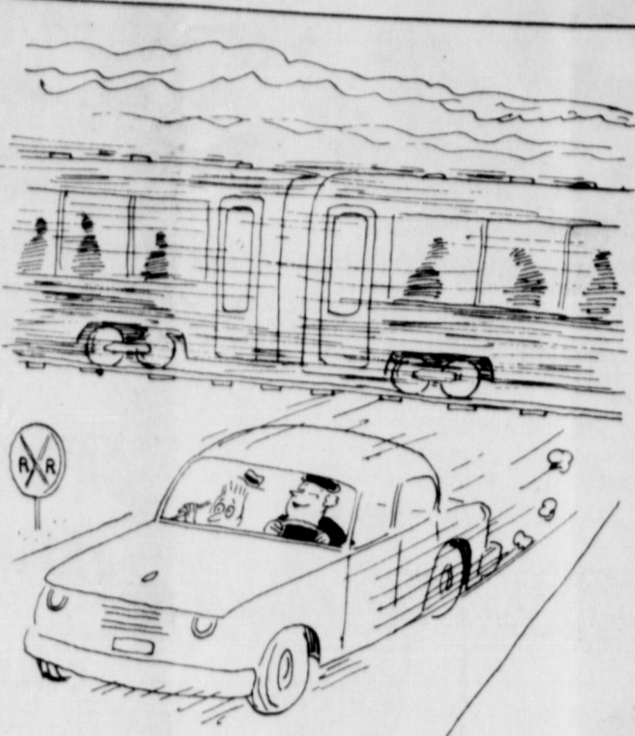
In the 2nd game Friday night, the Wheeler boys nipped a good team from Le-fors 6 to 4.

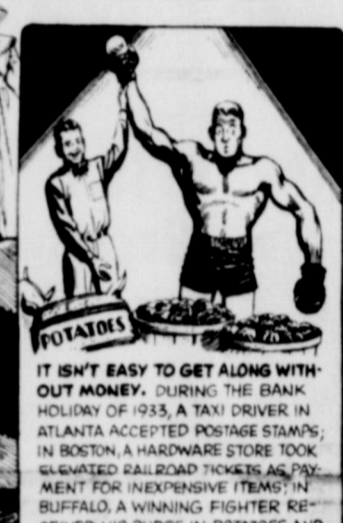

BRUCELLOSIS PROGRAM

Brucellosis testing will officially begin in Wheeler County Monday, July 20. The mobile laboratory that is used for testing the blood samples will move into Wheeler Thursday, July 16th and begin making preparations for testing each herd in the county. Wheeler County was declared a Type II Brucellosis Control Area beginning July 1st as the result of a petition submitted by over 75 percent of the livestock producers in the county owning over 51% of the cattle, asking that the county be declared a Type II Brucellosis free area.
 Dr. Virgil Patrick, area veterinarian will move to Wheeler and supervise the lab and testing crews. A lab technician has been assigned to Wheeler County to take blood samples for the individual herds.
 The testing in Wheeler County will be conducted on a volunteer basis and livestock producers should contact Dr. Patrick or the County Agent's office as to when it would be convenient to test. The mobile lab will be located on the north side of the courthouse under the surrounding trees.
 Replacement heifers will be vaccinated free of charge, neither will there be a charge to the livestock producer for Brucellosis test.

IRRIGATION SCHEDULE FOR COTTON

Don't start irrigating cotton too soon, says Charles D. Jackson, County Agricultural Agent. "Cotton that received a good pre-plant irrigation or has benefited from recent rains should have enough moisture in the ground to last until the first white blooms appear. Cotton at this stage of growth should be about 60 days of age."

Watering cotton prior to this time can lead to trouble. 1. If watered too early (before white blooms appear) cotton tends to keep growing in a vegetative manner and doesn't start fruiting early.

2. Early irrigation can lower soil temperatures in the root zone of cotton plants. This encourages blights, wilts and seedling diseases. Above all, irrigation shouldn't be practiced

when fields of young cotton are disease-ridden, as this tends to compound the problem.

3. Watering too early can also keep mites from penetrating deep in the soil. Especially in the tighter soils, this can create hazards. If mites haven't penetrated deep in the soil, the normally hot dry weather of August will cause plants to become moisture-stressed. An inadequate root system means farmers won't be able to irrigate their cotton fields often enough at this time to keep plants adequately supplied with water.

If irrigation water is short, it might be necessary to start watering before the first white blooms appear. Irrigation should be timed as closely as possible to appearance of the first white blooms.

Highest water requirement of cotton plants occurs at peak bloom stage. At this stage, cotton will use one-fourth to four-tenths inches per day. This compares to less than one-tenth inch per day for cotton plants from emergence to squaring stages. From white bloom to peak blooming stage, cotton plants will utilize one-tenth to one-fourth acre-inches water daily.
