It is time to start making plans for the Wheeler County Fair which is scheduled for August 27, 28, and 29 in the American Legion Building. Prior to the opening of the fair, the annual Miss Fruitbasket of Wheeler County will be selected August 22 to reign over the Fair Activities. The Queen contest will be held in the Wheeler Gym.

Several special features have been planned by the Fair Board to make this year's show the "best yet." Two exhibits to be added to the Fair will be an animated wild life exhibit by Texas Fish, Game and Oyster Commission and a mobile civil defense exhibit sponsored by the Wheeler County 4-H Council.

A new show added this year is the Apollonia Horse

Show which will be held at 12:30 p.m. Saturday, August 29 at the rodeo arena. This show will be divided into 4 divisions: Halter, Senior Cutting, Senior Reining, and Dinner Bell Race. Trophies will be presented to all first place winners and ribbons for 2nd through 5th place winners.

Any girl enrolled in a Wheeler County school as a freshman through senior during the 1964-65 school year is eligible to be entered in the Queen contest.

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau announced that it will hold a beauty contest Aug. 15, 1964 at the Wheeler School Gymnasium. The purpose of this contest is to give recognition to the Farm and Ranch girls of Texas. The basic principles of the contest are as follows:

RULES AND AWARDS 1964

1. This is an honest-to-goodness Queen Contest. The girls are to be judged on grace, poise, charm, vivaciousness, and all the other qualities that go to make up winsome Texas Future Homemakers. There are three main points on which they will be judged; namely: (1) appearance, (2) poise, (3) personality.
2. This contest is to give our beautiful farm and ranch girls recognition.
3. There is nothing personal in the project. It is anticipated that through the institution of this contest that more farm and ranch girls, and other young people may become better acquainted with the principles of the Farm Bureau organization.
4. Question outline will be prepared to be used by the masters of ceremonies in the county and district contests. The same questions will also be used in the state contest.
5. Each contestant will be required to speak approximately one minute on, "Why Are You Glad Your Family Belongs to Farm Bureau?"
6. This project offers a contest that is glamorous, attractive, gains attention, and is worthy of sponsorship by County Farm Bureaus.

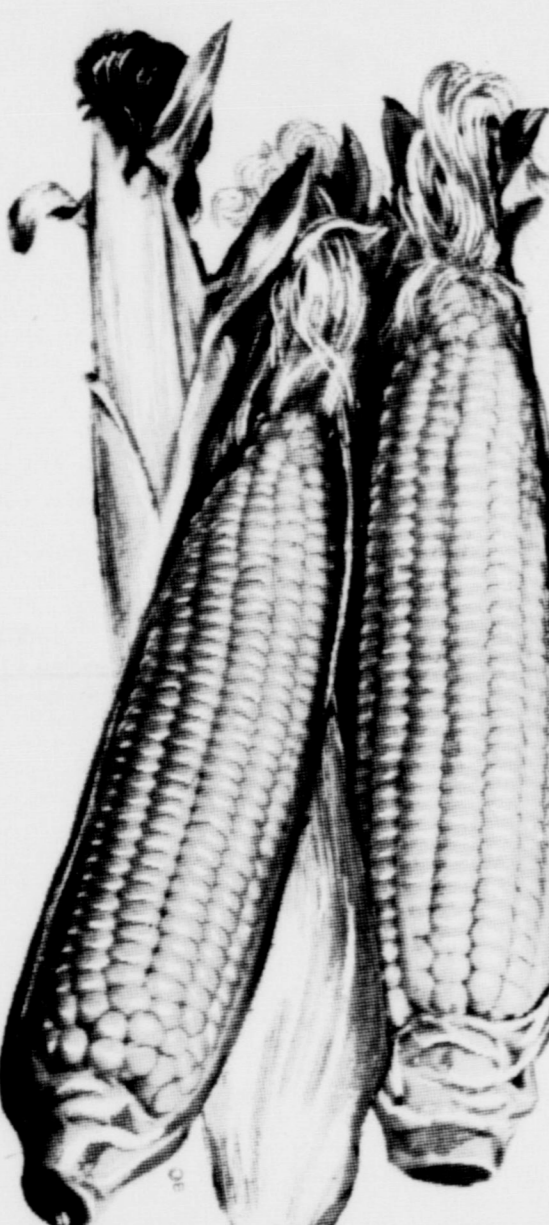

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

Co. Agent Reports

BY CHARLES D. JACKSON

Through July of this year the total rainfall received in the County has been 14.98 inches. In 1963 the total at the end of July was 14.72 inches, but 2.16 inches was received in July of 1963 and only 0.20 inches was received in July of this

year. In 1962 the total rainfall through July was 22.91 inches and 6.04 inches was received in July alone. Two dry years has been detrimental to range conditions in many areas of the county and the hay crop is considerable less this year. In fact, all crops are suffering from lack of moisture. There will be very little grazing or hay from temporary pastures or meadows planted this summer.

Requests were received

from livestock producers from all sections of the county for the drought disaster committee to apply to the state drought disaster committee for a permit to graze or bale soil bank land and feed grain diverted acres. The committee is composed of John O'Gorman A.S.C.S., committee chairman; John Manning, F.H.A. Supervisor; and the County Agent. This committee met August 4th and sent a request to the state disaster committee for permission to use this acreage. If this request is approved, then persons having acreage will be able to graze this land at the rate of a minimum of one dollar per acre per month with the maximum charge being fifty percent of the annual payment.

If the land is baled for hay then the charge is fifty percent of the annual payment on the soil bank land or the feed grain diverted acres. Of course, the payment of a minimum of one-dollar per acre per month on the feed grain diverted acres will cease when the secretary of agriculture releases this land for grazing which is November 1st. The Wheeler County ASCS office will administer the program if the request is approved. Twelve counties in the Panhandle have already been approved for the program.

Several persons have asked about the possibility of obtaining Commodity Credit Corporation grain at a reduced price. So far no counties in the state have been approved for the grain there have been no plans made in the state for the grain program at the present time. Any member of this committee will be glad to answer any question that anyone may have concerning this program.

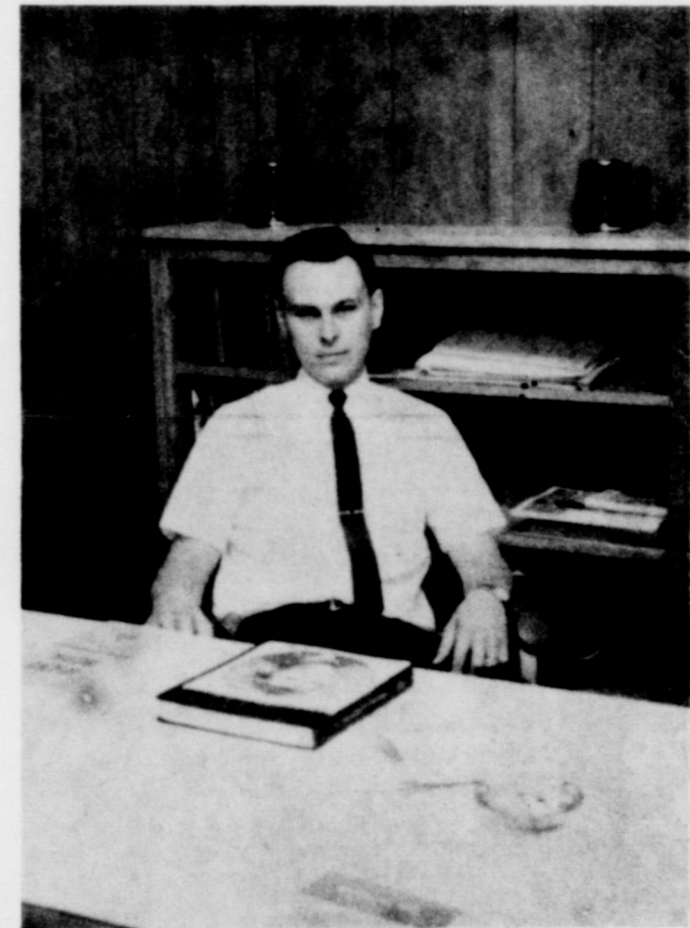

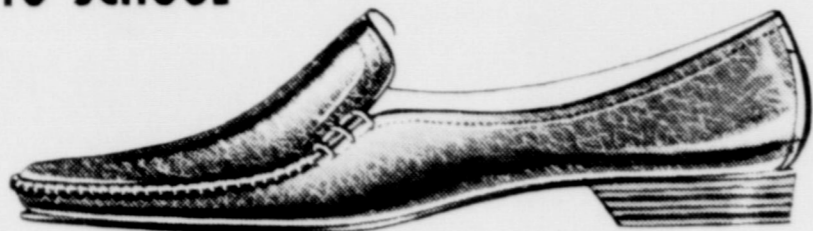
