MUSTANGS UNSADDLE MATADORS 28-0

MEMPHIS—Little Bobby Vanpool broke open a scoreless battle with a 93 yard touchdown run in the third quarter and sparked the Mustangs to a 28-0 victory over the Matador Matadors Thanksgiving Day.

An overflow crowd of 3,000 sat in bright, sunny weather to watch the Herd roll to their 11th straight victory and eighth shutout of the year to win the bi-district title. The tremendous defensive showing by Wheeler which held on the one-yard line and then set up 3 last quarter touchdowns handed the Matadors their first defeat of the year, their fourth shutout in history and their most lopsided defeat since 1961.

It was eleven men against one as every one of the Wheeler starters came in for a piece of credit. Richard Campbell, the Matadors' great fullback, who won last year's encounter single handed, tried to do it all over again, but failed. Campbell was all over the field on defense and outshined the entire Wheeler team, picking up 85 yards in 22 carries, but time and again he was pulled down by gang tackles.

Leading the smashing defense were Villard Hunter, Dunk Porter and Terry McCasland. Hunter, the red-headed end, played the finest game of his career as he was in on 10 tackles, broke up passes and caught a touchdown heave of his own. The Dunk at middle linebacker piled in on 11 tackles and made the key yardage at fullback time and again. McCasland smashed in on nine tackles, backed by Overcast and Danny Dorman as they kept the middle of the line like the Marne.

MUSTANGS MEET ROBERT LEE

The final game of the Football season for the Bi-District Champs will be played at Shamrock Saturday night.

The Mustangs take on Robert Lee Steers in the contest for regional honors in Class B play.

Game time at Shamrock, December 5 will be 7:30 with Wheeler as the home team and fans will be seated on the west side.

Lee beat Throckmorton, 18-6 in bi-district play last Thursday night. Officials for the district 8-B champions met with the Wheeler officials after the game and agreed on Shamrock as a neutral site.

Wheeler will close early Saturday night in order to attend the game. The stores will close at 6:30. The Theatre will not have a first show Saturday night, but will open for the preview after the game.

To correct our error in Chapman Truck Stop's add of last week, 5 Goodyear tires to fit the winner's car plus the regular drawing for three winners of \$10, 15, & 25

was the pass defense of Hunter, Tommy Smith, Don Burks and Gene Watson, as they allowed the Mats only eight yards in the air and intercepted two passes to set up touchdowns.

Offensively, it was Vanpool's two touchdowns, the running of Porter, the blocking of Burks, Hunter, Jimmy Jamison and Overcast, and the all-around play of quarterback Richard Wallace. Picking up key yardage with his running, Wallace would not miss on flat passes to his ends, completing seven of eleven passes for 38 yards and a touchdown.

Wheeler "jave" Matador two scoring chances to open the game before settling down. On the first play from scrimmage the Mats lost a fumble on their 39. With Hunter and Jamison leading the way, four plays later the Mats were on the 42 and punted out. On the next play, Wheeler again fumbled away the ball on their 18. Two plays later, Charles Ezzell ran wide right to a first down on the seven. Porter, Dorman, Sleepy Adams, McCasland and Hunter took

turns hitting the ball carrier and Wheeler held on the one-yard line.

It was Matador's last threat of the game, although no one knew it then. The Mats made one more stab when Porter punted out to the Matador 45 and Ezzell returned it to the Wheeler 38. The mighty Wheeler line rose up again and Vanpool made the final tackle to stop Campbell on the fourth down on the 29.

Wheeler moved yard by yard on their only threat of the first half, going through most of the second quarter before losing the ball on downs on the Matador 38. Neither team moved inside the other's 40 until a bad punt by Campbell late in the half gave Wheeler the ball on the Mat 44. Matador put on a tight pass defense and held as time ran out.

Matador moved inside the 50 with the opening kickoff, but again the Mustangs held and Campbell punted high to the Wheeler seven. Vanpool grabbed the ball on the run, swivelled back and forth looking for an exit,

got a clearing block from Red Watson and sprinted up the right sidelines and right past the Matadors for 93 yards and a touchdown with 8:49 to go in the period. Adams then kicked the first of four perfect extra point attempts.

A Porter punt to the Matador six and a five-yard penalty as the fourth quarter opened put the Mats in deep trouble, and Burks snatched a pass on the 15 and ran it back to the seven yard line. Porter smashed twice to inside the one and Wallace then spun between Jamison and Jamie Moore for the touchdown with 10:37 left in the game.

Minutes later, Watson snatched a Matador pass on

his 49 and returned it to the Mat 33. Porter, Vanpool and Wallace ground out yardage to the 16, the key play a successful fourth-down keeper by Wallace, and Vanpool ran right, got a block from Overcast and trotted untouched over the goal line with 5:37 left.

Matador, still fighting, tried to run the ball on fourth down and McCasland stopped Kenneth Pitts on downs on the Matador 36. Short runs by Burks and Vanpool and short passes to Porter and Moore made a first down on the 24 and Wallace then fired the ball to Hunter, all alone on the five, Villard stepping over the final tally.

1964 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE BRINGS FARM AND RANCH STATISTICS UP TO DATE FOR CO.

The 1964 Census of Agriculture, now being conducted by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce, in Wheeler Co., will bring up to date the farm and ranch statistics last collected in 1959.

Here are a few of the many facts recorded in the 1959 agriculture census for this County:

There were 719 farms and ranches in 1959, compared with 853 in 1964. The average size of farm and ranch was 735.8 acres in 1959, compared with 579.7 acres in 1964.

The value of products sold by the County's farmers and ranchers in 1959 was \$5,092,509. The value of all crops sold was \$2,414,353. The value of all livestock products sold was \$2,678,156.

The 1964 national Census of Agriculture is the 18th in a series which began in 1840. Because of the rapid changes American agriculture has been undergoing in recent years, Census Bureau officials regard the current census as one of the most significant ever taken. They ask every farmer and rancher to cooperate in compiling an accurate record of these changes by filling out the census form he receives in the mail and holding the completed questionnaire until a census taker calls for it.
