Playing their best game of the year to date, the undefeated Wheeler Mustangs continued their winning ways by romping over the host McLean Tigers 26-8 before a capacity crowd at McLean last Friday night.

This was the Mustangs 4th victory in a row and it concluded the non conference schedule. From now on the Mustangs will be at the task of defending their district championship with the first hurdle being Follett.

Perfect football weather was in store for the fans as the Tigers won the toss and chose to get their hands on the football. Their possession was short lived and they had to punt. The Mustangs cranked up and rammed right down to the Tiger 16 but the Tigers rose up and Jimmy Adams was called upon to try a field goal from the 22 but it was short and wide and the Tigers took over.
