Water will be metered and billed at a rate set up by the participants. A meeting has been called for this evening, Thursday at 2:00 in the Kelton Bap-tist Church. The details of this project will be explained and a steering committee will be elected if there is enough interest shown. There are about 150 possible users in this area that could be reached by the water line. 


