MUSTANGS ROMP ERICK

For the second straight week, a visiting team from Oklahoma went back home after absorbing a lopsided defeat at the hands of the Wheeler Mustangs.

This past Friday night saw the Erick Bearcats take a 44-0 shellacking from the home crew. The outcome of the game was never in doubt, only the score.

Bobby Vanpool set the pattern of the victory less than three minutes deep in the contest when he took a pitchout and sped 19 yards around right end for the tally. This drive covered 43 yards in only three plays with Vanpool picking up 40 of the yards in two carries.

So complete was the rout of the outmanned Bearcats, they were unable to make a first down in the first half of play and only against the Mustangs second unit were they able to make a first down.

Dunk Porter and Bobby

Vanpool vied for the high scoring honors with Porter coming out on top with 4 TD's and Vanpool adding 3 to the final score. Porter got into the scoring act with 5:21 to go in the first quarter when he capped an 8 play 63 yard drive with a 5 yard dash off his right tackle.

A partially blocked punt set the Mustangs up on the Erick 27 early in the second period and they were quick to capitalize on the opportunity. Porter got the final two yards to paydirt when he hit off the left side. Jimmy Adams tied the pigskin true and the Mustangs had 19 points. Wheeler's defense never let the Bearcats get anything started and forced them to punt 8 times during the game.

The Mustangs had one touchdown called back but were not to be denied and came right back on the next play and scored again. This drive started on the Erick 41 following a punt return and five plays later, Burks

cleared the double stripe from the 7 but the Mustangs were fined 15 for clipping back to the 18. Vanpool was quick to get it back on the next play as he whipped around the Bearcat left side for the 4th TD of the half. Adams

attempted to add another conversion but the kick was no good.

Erick's poor kicking game gave the Mustangs another golden opportunity with a short punt that carried only three yards and

left the Bearcats defending their goal only 16 steps to their backs. Vanpool fumbled but recovered for a yard gain and then got the final 15 with an end sweep. Again the try for the extra point

MUSTANGS TO SCRAP WITH WILDCATS FRI.

Wheeler will meet their rivals, the Canadian Wildcats Friday night at Canadian. This will be Wheeler's first game away from Nicholson.

Last year, Wheeler led in the contest with a 12 to 0 and in 1962 the score was in Canadian's favor, 14-0.

Canadian is running from unbalanced line left with split end. The team is without a win in the three games played.

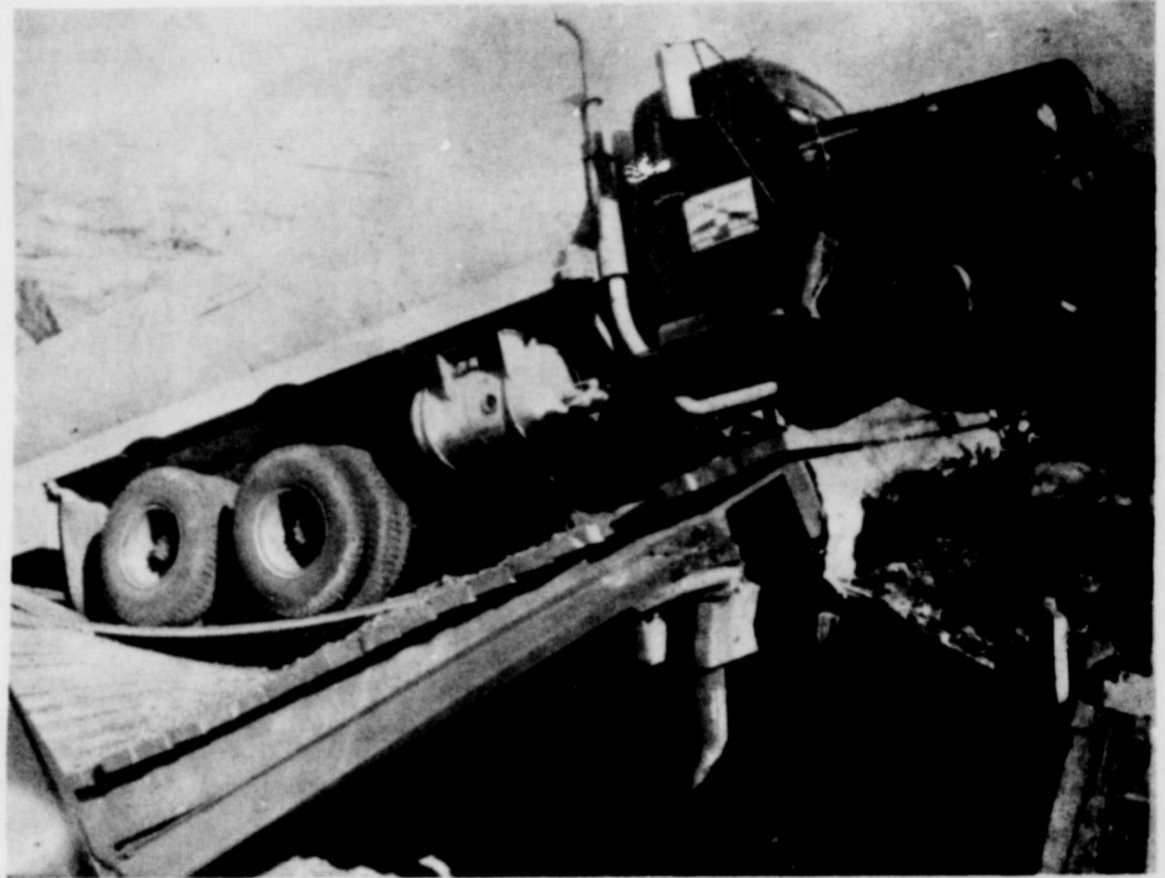
They like to throw the ball and have a real good set of backs with a lot of speed. Canadian's Yarnold is one of the top backs in the country; he is an all state candidate.

Wheeler will be without Lanning, a guard, because of a broken finger, and may be out for the next 2 games. It is doubtful if Sechrist, a guard and Hardcastle, a halfback, will see action.

Canadian has been defeated by two AA teams, Stinett and Sanford-Fritch. They met Sunday last week and were defeated by that Class A team.

This game is extremely

important to Coach Hill as Canadian is his home town. He stated that they are a tough team and are likely to make several points but we can outplay them if we will watch for passes.

CHAMBER KICKS OFF NEW PROGRAM

Forty members and guests were in attendance at the Chamber of Commerce meeting held Sept. 15 at Nora's Cafe. Those present were given a first hand look at the Community Development Program which is being organized at the present time.

Betty Risner, in the absence of president, Leon Moore, introduced speakers on the different phases of the project and explained the purpose of the Executive Committee.

James Verden explained the purpose and work involved in Beautification and Recreation. First on his list was the City Park. For several years it has been the project of the Thursday Review Club to furnish the needed facilities at the City Park. Each of their projects has met with the same fate, vandalism. A committee will be set up to decide what needs to be done in order to make the City park a place of beauty instead of an eyesore.

This committee will study what can be done to stop vandalism and repair damage already at the park.

Hyland Weaver presented his views on the Civic Improvement Committee. This committee would work toward acquiring professional personnel for the community. The possibility of acquiring another lawyer in Wheeler was announced. Two of the most needed professions absent are a veterinarian and an optometrist.

Public Relations and Publicity was the topic of Walter Dunn's talk. It would be up to this committee to publicize our town and its possibilities in an effort to better our town. This committee will sell the program to Wheeler residents and surrounding communities.

Harold Kenady pointed out the importance of youth in a growing community as he presented his view of the Youth Activities Committee. It will be the purpose of this committee to see what can be done to attract young people after they have completed their education. Young business and professional men are a necessity for any community to grow.

The Commercial Committee's objectives was presented by Mr. Arling Cordell. This committee will work to bring more people to our community to trade and receive professional attention.

Thomas Daughtry stated that all of the above committees must be well under way before the Industrial development committee can achieve their goal of obtaining an industry for Wheeler.

The Executive Committee will be composed of chairmen of each of the active working committees. This committee will tie the whole program together and will be responsible for the survey of town and trade area. The survey will enable them to make a complete listing of the town's assets and liabilities. This committee will point out the specific goals the town might hope to realize. Obviously all towns can't expect a large assembly plant or a gasoline refinery. In actual practice, the rewards may appear to be small in many respects but each small accomplishment helps pave the way for something larger and better. We must not set our sights too low but it would be foolish to establish goals that are impossibly high.

Tom Puryear and Herbert Finsterwald, members of the Hospital Board were on hand to bring the group up to date on the hospital. They ask that the Chamber set up a committee to receive any donations to the hospital. The hospital board is not asking donations, but is merely making it possible for someone to dedicate a room or piece of equipment if they so desire.

Paula Britt and the Federated Clubs of the community will handle this project. The very informative meeting was brought to a close with each member present stating his choice of two committees. The members of these committees will be announced later.

MEMORIALS TO BE ACCEPTED FOR PARK VIEW HOSPITAL

The County Hospital board reported at the Chamber of Commerce Meeting Sept. 15, 1964, that memorials and gifts would be accepted to be used in furnishing hospital rooms for Parkview Hospital. Tom Puryear, board chairman, emphasized that these contributions are not a necessity. The rooms will be furnished regardless of the monetary response to this project; however, if enough people respond to this opportunity it may be possible to finance an area for paved, off-street parking which is at present not included in the contract.

The cost of furnishing each room has been set at approximately \$750.00. Any organization, family, or community desiring to furnish a complete room would be recognized by placing a metal

plaque on the hospital room door they furnished, listing the donors or to whom it is to be dedicated. The furnishings will all be standard equipment selected by the Hospital Board. Those wanting to make smaller contributions will be recognized by placing their names, amount contributed, and to whom it will be dedicated in a "Memorial Book". These contributions along with the others will be listed in the Wheeler Times unless otherwise requested.

There will be no concerted drive to raise this money. Certainly no one should feel it is obligatory to donate; yet we feel that an opportunity should be given those people who want to go "the second mile" in order to show their faith and pride in a worthwhile project.

These donations will be gifts from the heart. This is the American way.

FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION PROGRAMS TOURED FRIDAY MORN.

County Judge, George Hefley, O.W. Pendleton, County Commissioner, precinct 1 and 2 and Louis C. Stas, editor, was taken on a tour of the Farmers Home Administration's projects in the county by John Manning, County Supervisor, Friday morning.

The group was taken to

the farm of Jerry Abernathy in the Twitty Area. This farm is being brought back into productivity with the aid of Farmers Home Administration. The farm, at the time Jerry leased it, was totally covered with Johnson grass. The cropland had been sprayed twice at a cost of \$3.00 per acre and the cotton crop was chopped for \$1.50 per acre. These two procedures are soon to pay off in big dividends for Jerry as he has some of the prettiest dryland crops in the county.

John Manning pointed out to the group that all cooperators in the Farmers Home Administration's Farm Loans were required to have their soil tested and the needed fertilizer was added to the land.

The group was then shown a dairy owned by Mr. and Mrs. Tex Immel. For some time the Immels have wanted to own a dairy. Rex was raised on a dairy in the Kellerville Community and for the past several years has stayed as close to the dairy

The Mustang first group got into play with 1:13 to play in the game with Erick owing the ball on the Wheeler 19 with a first down. Three plays lost 11 yards and Erick tried a desperation pass on 4th down that fell incomplete. Less than a half minute remained as Vanpool broke free and was finally brought down 40 yards later on the Erick 30. Wallace tried a pass which was too tall with just seconds remaining after losing 8 yards attempting to pass. Porter headed around his left side and literally walked a tight-rope down the sideline as the gun went off ending the game, but not the scoring. Porter made the 38 yards to the end zone unhampered and Gary Hardcastle came into the game and booted the extra point giving the Mustangs their 44-0 victory.

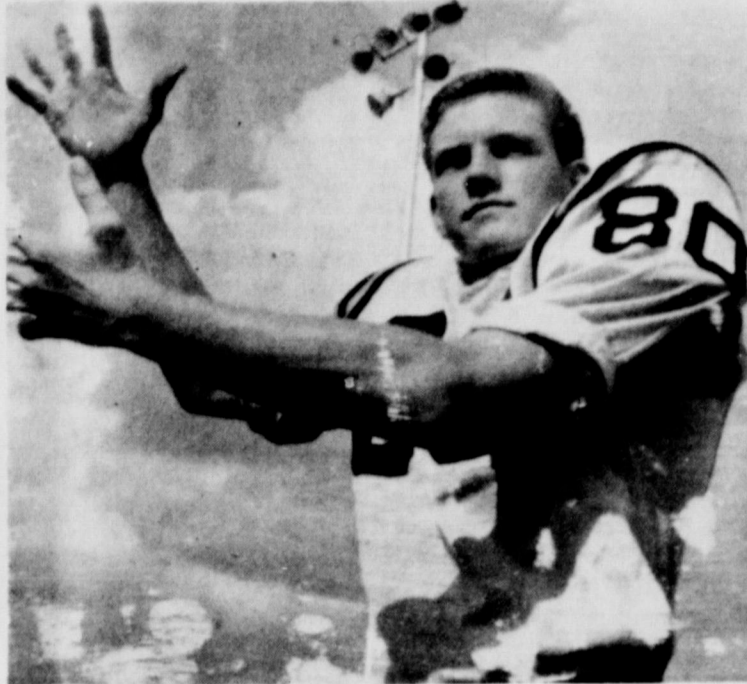

Water will be metered and billed at a rate set up by the participants. A meeting has been called for this evening, Thursday at 2:00 in the Kelton Baptist Church. The details of this project will be explained and a steering committee will be elected if there is enough interest shown. There are about 150 possible users in this area that could be reached by the water line.

This meeting will be of interest to all persons living between the Farm-to-Market Roads 592 and 1906 and west of Twitty.

The County Supervisor advised that this financial assistance is available to young farm families who are unable to obtain adequate credit from private sources, meet all other eligibility requirements, and have the ability and desire to become successfully established in farming and ranching operations.
