



Why is it necessary to make a soil survey? A soil DT--Henry L Hise to Jess and water conservation pro-Moore 12-10-64 Surface Sec gram must begin with the soils. The soils determine to a large extent, the potential productivity of different tracts of land. Most of our water problems are also related to the soils.

There are over 40 soil types in Wheeler County-Most of these soil types occur on several different slopes with varrying amounts of erosion. Each hillside or landscape is different in that the soil types, slopes and erosion occur in different patterns.

Some soils are suited to only one use, such as rangeland cropland, pasture or hayland. One of the important jobs of the Soil Conservationest assisting the district is to explain the uses of each soil.






