

be provided. The Mustang defense played superbly the first half only allowing White Deer two first downs the entire half. The Mustang offense moved the ball effectively and drove down into scoring position several times the first half but kicked themselves in the rear by committing to many penalties, fumbles, and again, mental errors that kept them from scoring any offensive points. The Mustangs other score of the half was provided by punt return specialist Keith Rose who ran a "Buck" punt back 65 yards for the other Mustang score of the half. As with any score, Keith provided the burst of speed needed to score. The two point extra points was provided when Stevens completed a pass to Jason Porton in the end zone. The Mustangs went in at half time with a slim 14 to 0 lead and this was without the offense scoring a single point.

The third quarter provided a different story as the Mustangs came out from half time rejuvenated and fired up. It should also be mentioned that not only were we winning the game on the field but as one casual observer remarked about our band, "When our band played the 'Hokey-Pokey' song even White Deer's fans and band were dancing to it." This was typical of how the night went for the Bucks as all they could do was try to follow Wheeler, there was no way they could ever catch us. The Mustangs were able to add two more touchdowns in the second half of play, again holding White Deer to the big goose egg. Bryan Judd and Jeremy Davis both added touchdown runs in the second half. The Mustang offensive line caved in the Buck defense and drove them back opening up lanes that allowed the Wheeler backs that glimmer of light needed to turn a four yard gain into twenty and thirty yard runs. The Mustang offensive ground game rushed for 363 total yards with no yardage received in the passing department. Travis Stevens was 0 to 4 for the night in the passing category. Judd ran the ball for 111 yards, Davis 144 yards, Case 13, Ware 14, Dunnam 5, Porton 29 and Travis Stevens adding 47 yards of rushing. As stated before the Mustang defense held White Deer to only 99 total yards of offense, 44 on the ground and 55 in the air. White Deer had only six first downs compared to 22 from Wheeler. Coaching kudos went out to all the Mustangs and received good play from young players such as Andy Paul Bradstreet and Ramon Meraz.

The Mustangs travel to Groom this Friday night in what should be a "WET" contest at Tiger stadium. Go Mustangs because when "It rains, it pours."

The Wheeler Colts once again manhandled their opponents last Thursday evening. The newest victim, the White Deer Bucks. The Colts, now 5-1 on the season, came away with an easy 37-6 victory.

The Colts 1st possession started out like so many have in the past. Wheeler marched the ball right down the field and took the lead on a 15 yd TD pass to Casey Childress from Colt QB Brooks Brown. Childress added the 2 pt play for an 8-0 1st quarter

lead. The responsibility of stopping the Bucks now was in the hands of the stingy Colt defense. At first the young spikes were able to move the ball down the field. The Bucks drove the ball all the way to the 4 yard line where they had 1st and goal. After a time out the Colt defense came alive and put up a great goal line stand. On 4th and goal from the 2, a host of black and white defenders led by Bret Goad stopped White Deer for a loss.

The Colts then got their offense back on the field and in 4 plays they once again found the end zone. Kyle Masters raced 85 yards down the sideline to paydirt. Brooks Brown added the 2 point for a quick 16-0 lead. Masters run was made possible by great blocking up front by Don Hudgins, Caleb Finsterwald, Bret Goad, Ben Dollar, Matt Sullivan and Kelby Ledbetter.

The Colts were not through scoring the 1st half. Brooks Brown threw his 2nd TD pass of the night to TE Caleb Finsterwald. The Colts then completed their 1st successful PAT of the year for a 23-0 lead. The crowd went wild as Colt Kicker Ben Dollar split the uprights. Many spectators thought that Steve Boniol's son was now booting for the Colts.

Brown added to his Big night as in the 3rd Quarter he raced 49 yards to increase the lead to 29-0. Satisfaction with that lead produced a slight let



The purpose of the Wheeler County SWCD, with headquarters in Wheeler is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agriculture lands within the district. In addition the district serves as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinate the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purpose.

The five members serving on the board of directors are responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

Macina is active in Texas Farm Bureau and other local organizations. Mr. Macina was recently presented a certificate for 20 years service to the Wheeler County SWCD. This was presented at the State meeting of Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board at Galveston.

From The Minister's Desk:

Throughout the history of the military judicial system, there have been several highly publicized courtmartials. One of these court-martials occurred in 1975 when a naval chaplain, Andrew F. Jensen, was accused of adultery by two women. After a long and highly publicized trial, the jury acquitted Chaplain Jensen, stating that he had been victimized by two sick and conspiring women.

At the time of the trial, I closely followed its progress and I was pleased with its verdict. To me, it was absurd for the Navy to court- domake such a distinction, demandmartial a chaplain for having an "affair" when sexual misconduct is often practiced by other naval personnel. Why should the Navy have such high standards for other Navy personnel? The Navy probably believed that Chaplain Jensen should be "different" from other naval personnel.

Such an attitude is not limited to the Navy. Many disciples of Jesus often demand a measure of devotion and dedication from a minister which they themselves do not possess. For example, a religious periodical recently published the criteria that some church leaders had used to hire a minister. One of the characteristics of this criteria was that the minister had to "-display the qualities of New Testament Christianity."

Why should it be any more neces-

sary for a minister to "-display the qualities of New Testament Christianity" than any other disciples of Jesus? These church leaders apparently had the same attitude about a preacher that the Navy had about Chaplain Jensen. They believed that a minister is "different" from other disciples of Jesus; therefore, he had to "-display the qualities of New Testament Christianity."

But the Bible does not teach a clergy and laity distinction between a minister and other disciples of Jesus. Yet many disciples of Jesus ing extraordinary devotion and dedication from a minister. It is interesting to think about the reaction of these disciples of Jesus if a minister demanded the same extraordinary devotion and dedication from them.

Please do not misunderstand. I realize that a minister is a very "visual person" who should be an example to other disciples of Jesus. For this reason, I am not suggesting that less devotion and dedication be required of a minister, but I am suggesting that disciples of Jesus require of themselves the same devotion and dedication that they expect of a minister.

was taught. There is one thing I believe with all my heart, that man that is born of woman is but a few days and can not make biscuits. The thing is I can cook to some degree; make toast, scramble eggs, make muffins that I have been asked for the recipe. But to make biscuits I shall never try again. You see the other morning the sun came up beautiful. Nice and clear, I just knew this was going to be my day. Wife is in bed, drinking her coffee and watching T.V. Everything is near perfect. I thought that I would treat her to a superb, fantastic breakfast by making a big pan of fluffy light biscuits for breakfast. Everything went fine for a while. I put the flour in the mixing bowl, salt, baking powder. Stirred the ingredients all together, added milk. And then I remembered I needed some cooking oil. So I got the bottle from the pantry, poured a little in the bowl and stirred some more. Everything right on track. I had watched her for years, can't miss. Poured the dough out on the counter on a sprinkling of flour with some on the top, just like she does. These will be so light I'll have to put something on top or they will float out of the pan. I have never put my hand in a bucket of tar, but now I know what it would be like. This so called dough got stuck between my fingers, on my hands and half way to my elbows. There was hardly none left on the dough board. I tried to scrape it off with one finger, it only stuck to the same finger I used to scrape with. The law of gravity must be the answer, so I slung my hands. To my very sorrow my elbow bumped the cooking oil bottle with the top lid off that I had sit on my right side of the whole mess. Now we are not talking about a small bottle or one half used, one we are talking about jumbo size nearly full. 
