Briscoe Rural Patrons --Notice

Douthit today appealed to po stal customers on Rural Route 1 to help rural carrier Bertha Steen make deliveries during bad winter weather.

The Briscoe Post Office has one rural route, covering Lewis Lancaster, Board the general area of 2 miles south, 8 miles east and 7 miles north of Briscoe.

Mrs. Douthit said that at the same time she hopes all authorities concerned with the rural route where snow and other bad weather hampers the carrier will continue to cooperate to help the mailman get through.

The Postmaster listed these points of particular concern: 1. Approaches to rural mail boxes must be kept open by customers. 2. Obstructions to delivery of mail on rural routes should be removed or minimized to the fullest extent possible.

Where rural boxes pose a problem, the carrier may leave form 4056, "Your Mailbox Needs Attention," a notice to keep hox approaches clear by promptly removing all obstructions, including snow, which may make mail delivery difficult or impos-

Unless approaches are cleared, it may be necessary to temporarily withhold delivery of mail, the Postmaster minted out.

Rural carriers are not required to perform service on foot when roads cannot be traveled with the vehicles normally used, but they are expected to make every reasonable effort to serve as many of the patrons as possible without physical exertion or added financial cost

she explained. If excession detours are necessary to effect delivery of mail, customers should temporarily relocate their boxes on the new line of travel, arrange to receive their mail through other patrons boxes, or make other arrange ments for their mail until travel on the roads affected can be resumed.

The Postmaster and the Rural Carrier wish to take this opportunity to thank all of the rural patrons of this area for their splendid cooperation in the past and with the sincere hope that we can continue to work together for the good of the com-






