Riding the pounding feet of Dunk Porter, the Wheeler Mustangs won the Regional title by whipping the Robert Lee Steers last Saturday night 26-18.

The contest was the last in a 12 game season for the victorious Mustangs and brought the Regional trophy back to Wheeler for the second time in history, the first time being in 1956.

The game also was the final contest for 11 boys who have led Wheeler to the football heights wearing the black and gold.

Not enough can be said for the gallant band of Mustangs who, trailing at half-time 12-6, came back with spirit and determination and scored three times in the second half to ice down the victory.

A shivering crowd estimated at 2000 watched the ball game played in Shamrock and the fans got even colder on the first play of the game when Terry Thet-

ford, the fine Steer quarterback, rolled out around his left end and went untouched 76 yards for a touchdown behind blocking that completely wiped out the Mustang defenders. Don Burks tipped away the pass for the extrapoint try and the Steers put the Mustangs behind on the scoreboard for the first time during the year.

Villard Hunter returned the kickoff five yards to the Mustang and the Mustangs methodically began to grind out the 71 yards to get back in the ball game. Dunk Porter got the march underway with a fifteen yard smash. The Dunker lugged the leather seven times in this thirteen play drive and Bobby Vanpool capped it with a 12 yard scamper around his right end. The little speedster bounced off a teammate at the line of scrimmage and dashed for the flag and Wheeler partisans were feeling like old once more. A bad snap from center caused Jimmy Adams to rush his kick and the

kick sailed wide to the right and it was a new ball game with only half of the first quarter gone.

The Mustangs held the Steers and took over on their nine yard line following a 50 yard punt by Dodson and put another ground eating drive in motion. Porter tackled on 22 yards in one run and Vanpool added another 38 to put the ball on the Steer 25. Four cracks were

Explanations and examples of provisions of the tax law applicable to farmers are presented in everyday language to illustrate proper tax treatment. An attempt has been made by the Internal Revenue Service to cover tax treatment of all matters normally arising in the conduct of a farming business. If a person should need additional assistance, he should contact a tax consultant or the Internal Revenue Service office.  
 The keeping of accurate records is stressed in this 1965 edition as it has been in the past. Accurate records is a must in order to file an accurate return. It will save much time, if a person has accurate records, in filing a return and the amount of the tax that the farmer must pay can accurately be determined. Accurate records are also very helpful if a return is selected for audit. For these reasons, while no particular system of record keeping is required, it is advisable to keep some type of current record of all transactions including income, expenditures, exchanges, etc., and to retain sales slips, receipts, invoices, cancelled checks and other documents providing evidence of the nature and dollar amount of the transactions.  
 TRI STATE FAIR TO HAVE JUNIOR BREEDING SHOW  
 For the first time in the history of the Tri State Fair, a Junior Breeding Show will be added beginning with the 1965 fair to be held in Amarillo. Any bona fide 4-H or F.F.A. member from any state will be eligible to enter. The purpose of the Junior Breeding Show is to encourage 4-H Club and F.F.A. members to participate in a practical breeding program.  
 For an animal to be eligible to enter the show, it must be registered in the owners name. If it is an animal that has been transferred to a 4-H or F.F.A. member, the transfer must be dated by June 1st of the calendar year in which the animal will be judged. These transfer papers must be available for inspection at the fair. Registration papers from the respective breed association must be presented to the Superintendent upon arrival at the show. All arrival and release dates will coincide with the steer show.  
 Only animals that would be a credit to the show will be accepted and they must first be approved by the county agent or vocational agriculture instructor. A health certificate from a veterinarian must accompany the animal when it is entered in the show.  
 The entry fee is \$3.00 per head and the first and second place animals in each class will be eligible to enter the open show without paying any additional entry fee. Such an entry in the open show must be made not later than 10:00 a.m. on the day following the judging at the Tri State Fair office.  
 CLASSES:  
 There will be separate classes for Angus and Hereford entries. An exhibitor may enter a maximum of four animals, either breed, but not more than 2 animals in a class.  
 The following classes will be used for the 1965 Tri State Fair:  
 1. Junior Yearling Heifers-calved Jan. 1-April 30, '64  
 2. Summer Yearling Heifers-calved May 1-Aug 31, 1964  
 3. Senior calves - calved Sept. 1-Dec. 31, 1964  
 4. Junior calves - calved after Jan. 1, 1965  
 Premium Money - \$2,040.00  
 The Breed Associations will pay their portions of the premium money direct from their headquarters.  
 The following premiums will be offered to each class: 1, \$50; 2, \$45; 3, \$40; 4, \$35; 5, \$30; 6, \$25; 7, \$20; 8, \$10.

**SCD NEWS**

The Great Plains Conservation Program is based on a complete conservation plan for an entire operating unit. A complete conservation plan includes all needed conservation or erosion control treatment.  
 Cost share ranges from 50 to 80 per cent of the cost of applying certain practices. Many practices under this program are well suited to much of the Wheeler County land. Some examples of cost share items are: range seeding, 80 per cent; terracing, 70 per cent and brush control, 50 per cent.  
 The length of the contract may vary from 3 to 10 years. The length is tailored to fit the needs of the individual plan. The program has built in flexibility which allows the plan to be modified from year to year.  
 A farmer or rancher may submit an application for a Great Plains Contract to the SCS office. The producer must then work out a conservation plan and submit it to the SCS. When the plan is approved as meeting the needs of the land, money will be set aside for use by the producer on the years requested. SCS personnel will be glad to help the farmer or rancher in preparing a conservation plan.  
 The Grand and Reserve Champion of each breed will be awarded a trophy.

Just four plays were needed to cover the 77 yards to paydirt.
