Of course, as was the indication during the entire game, when there was no hole to run through, the Mustang running back corps just ran over and



through the Tiger defenders.

Aftertaking a commanding half time lead, the Mustangs relaxed a bit to much at times allowing the Tigers to score not only on our J.V. team who played superbly by the way, but also on the first squad. Regardless of the score, or who scored on what possession and who missed tackles, etc., the Mustangs were able to dominate the game in nearly every respect. The entire fourth quarter was played by the Mustang J.V. team who were able to move the ball effectively early on in the quarter but stalled a little during the end of the game.

## WHEELER SCHOOL RECEIVES TAAS CASH AWARD

Wheeler ISD will receive' a monetary award of \$2,026.07 as part of the Texas Successful Schools Awards Program. These awards are based on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test, which measures performance in reading, writing, and math. Performance standards for dropouts and attendance rates are also considered.

Schools in the "Recognized" category had to have at least 70 percent mastery of all students and of each student group in each TAAS subject area. Dropout rates had to be 3.5 per cent or less and attendance rates had to be 94 percent or higher.

Under law, a demographic index is developed which groups school districts based upon percentages of minority, economically disadvantaged, limited English proficient, and highly mobile students and the wealth of the school district. Twenty-four groups of roughly equal size are developed. Results are compared within each group.

Awards ranged from \$1000 to \$10,000 per school. Wheeler is among 1236 cash winning schools receiving awards for exemplary or recognized performance. **Glyndol Holland**

The school is being recognized for gains in student performance in indicators that are part of the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS), more commonly known as the state's school report card.

Fort Elliott CISD is among 1,236 cash-winning schools statewide receiving awards for exemplary or recognized performance and 401 schools receiving awards for recording gains

and those in each student group passing each section of the TAAS, a dropout rate of 3.5 percent or less for all students and each student group, and an attendance rate of at least 94 percent. The change in TAAS performance from 1994 to 1995 also had to be high enough so that the passing rate for all students and those in each student group would be at least 90 percent within five years. To be eligible for a significant gain award, schools had at least 25 percent of all students in each student group passing each section of the

groups.

TAAS. In addition, a school's gain in performance from spring 1994 to spring 1995 had to be in the top 20 percent of the school's demographic group on overall gain for all students and each student group and average at least 5 percent gain across all subject areas for all students and each student group.

Under law, the AEIS computes a demographic index on campuses' percentages of minority, economically disadvantaged, limited English proficient, and highly mobile students and the wealth of the school's district. The index is used to array campuses and form 24 groups roughly equal size. A school's performance is compared to other schools that are in its same demographic group.



It's so nice having Wilhelmenia Sherrell back home. She has been in Oklahoma taking care of her mother. Wilhelmenia and her sister from California take turns.




It's nice to know that even people in Wheeler read our column: Thanks Lola!! That's sweet! I'm glad your en-

Expanded Toll-Free Local Calling (ELC) Service will allow you to call and be called by the requested exchange(s) on a local call basis (no toll charges). All exchanges that pass the ballot will be added to your local calling area for a maximum monthly per line charge of no more than \$3.50 for residence, \$7.00 for business.

The fees associated with ELC are mandatory. If any exchanges pass the ballot, the fees will be paid by all subscribers in the petitioning exchange. The fees will be in addition to your local monthly telephone service charges, and will be in effect until your telephone company's next general rate case, at which time all rates are subject to change.

Within the next 15 days GTE will mail ballots to all customers in the Mobeetie exchange to determine whether support exists for expansion of the local calling area. After marking the ballot, customers should sign their name and return the ballot to the PUC. A stamped self-addressed envelope will be provided with the ballot. At least 70% of the subscribers who return their ballots must vote in favor of expanded local calling on a per exchange basis for it to be provided. If the ballot fails to all exchanges, your service will not change, and no fees will apply. Only exchanges that pass the ballot will be added to your local calling area. No fees will be charged until they are approved and service is provided according to the PUC Rules.
