Gentlemen:

I wish to give you a progress report on the individual FHA borrowers that we visited last summer on our farm management tour.

**Mr. Rex Immel**  
Mr. Immel was a new dairy loan that had just been made and he started in a very dry year as you know. He was unable to raise enough roughage of his own and has been buying all of his hay and grain.

He is a DHIA (Dairy Herd Improvement Association) and keeps individual records on his cows and is doing remarkably well with his production. He is able to buy his own hay and grain now and is adding some more cows to his herd. He now has approximately 75 cows and is keeping most of them in the lot and feeding all their ration. He is using every good management practice available and should have a herd average of 12,000 pounds of milk this year.

**Mr. E. M. Rives**

Mr. Rives is a cotton and beef cattle man and naturally suffered a loss in 1964 due to low cattle prices and a short cotton crop. He still gained on his debt repayment over last year. He has had to make one adjustment this year. He is to purchase a good used 4-row tractor in order to do a better job of his farming. He has a Great Plains Conservation plan on his farm and is gradually getting each project completed.

**Mr. Jerry Abernethy**

We looked at Mr. Abernethy's cotton where he sprayed Johnson Grass with DSMA. He did the best job controlling Johnson Grass that I have ever seen. There was not any grass that grew in his cotton all year. He rented another farm with a good cotton allotment and has a better place to live. He should make good progress in 1965 with the added land and added equipment.

We plan to conduct another tour this year and hope to have more and better crops to show you emphasizing good management practices by Farmers Home Administration borrowers.

## MUSTANGS AT DISTRICT RELAYS

The Wheeler Mustangs qualified six individuals and two relay teams for the regional meet April 24 and 25 in winning the district 2-B meet Wednesday.

Misfortune hit the Mustangs in the sprint relay when anchor man Bobby Vanpool pulled a muscle just as he crossed the finish line. The tear was medium in severity, but it did slow the fleet footed sprinter tremendously as was seen when he came back to win the 100 yd dash in a slow 10.8. Coach J. T. Hill pulled Bobby off the anchor of the mile relay to save his leg from further injury. Also Villard Hunter was still slowed by an earlier injury but still placed 3rd in the half mile. He too was not allowed to run his usual 2nd leg of the mile relay.

Both of these boys are getting treated for their injuries and it is hoped they will be ready to go by Friday.

Event, placing and times for the Wheeler boys were: 440 relay, first 46.3; 880 dash, Smith first, 2:08.8; Hunter third, 2:14.6; 120 high hurdles, Rogers 2nd 17.5 and DeArment 6th; 180 low hurdles, Porter 1st 21.9 and Rogers 2nd 22.5; 440 dash, Robison 4th, 22.5; 100 yd Dash, Vanpool, 1st 10.8 and Hutchison 6th, 11.4; Mile Run, Moore 4th, 5:10.3; new school record. The old record held by Billy Overcast was 5:15.

Mile relay, second 3:42.2; Shot put, Porter 2nd and Dorman 3rd; Discus, Adams, 1st and Lanning 4th; Broad jump Smith 1st and Vanpool 4th; pole vault, Hardcastle 2nd and Hunter 5th; High Jump Hardcastle 5th.

Those qualifying for the regional meet and best times and distances are: 440 relay, Porter, Hardcastle, Smith and Vanpool. Alternate Richard Sechrist best time 45.5; 880 dash-Smith - 2:06.8; 120 high hurdles, Rogers - 17.4; 180 low hurdles Porter - 21.2; 440 dash-Vanpool - 9.87; Mile relay, Porter, Hunter, Smith and Vanpool. Robison - 3:40.8; broadjump, Smith 22'6"; pole vault, Hardcastle 10'6"; discus Adams, 111' shot put Porter, 39'.

Olton held a track meet April 15 for all regional AA, A, and B qualifiers and the patched up Wheeler Mustangs fared quite well despite being slowed considerably by the absence of Bobby Vanpool and Villard Hunter.

Two school records were broken-one in the high hurdles by Frankie Rogers who ran a 17.4 to break the old record of 17.5 set in 1961 by Bill Green. The other came in the broad jump as Tom Smith jumped 22'6" to break the old record set in 1964 held by Tom Smith. Tom's jump is one of the better jumps in the state at the present time.

Other results were: 780 dash Smith 4th 2:06.8; 180 low hurdles, Porter 21.4; Rogers 21.9; mile relay, Porter, Rogers, Robison, Smith 3:48.6; 120 high hurdles, Rogers 17.4; broadjump, Smith 1st 22'6"; discus Adams not available; shotput Porter not available; pole vault not available.

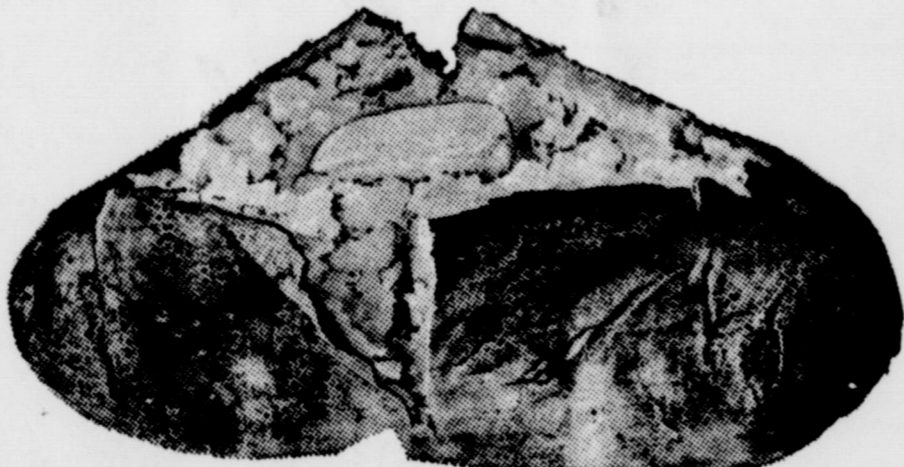

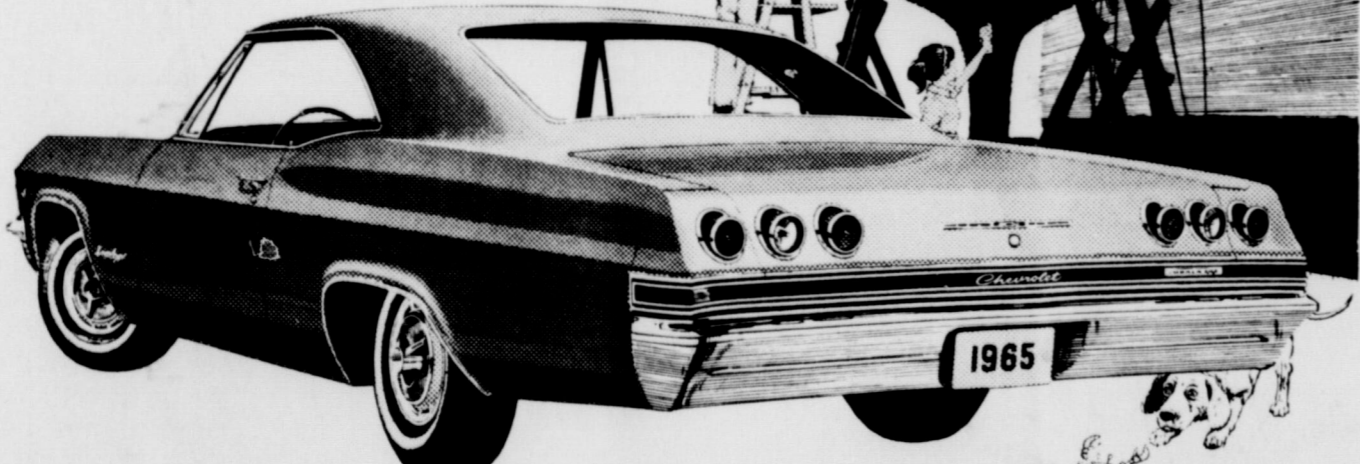

# County Agent Reports

## BY CHARLES JACKSON COUNTY AGENT

Weed control in crops, pastures, and ranges, timberlands and even ponds and lakes is becoming increasingly important in cutting the costs of production and increasing yields.  
 Chemicals are playing an increasingly important role in control methods and their use is widespread. In order to give those interested in the use of chemicals for controlling weeds and woody plants of Texas, a recent joint publication, B-1029, "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals" has been released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Agricultural Experiment Station.

The suggestions in the bulletin are based on the most valid information available. Consideration was given by the authors not only to the effectiveness of the chemicals but also to their safe use under existing laws and regulations. The authors point out and emphasize that the ultimate responsibility for safe use and agronomic results obtained from the use of chemicals rests with the user.

Because of the wide range of suggestions offered and chemicals listed, the publication has been prepared in abbreviated form. Other publications are available which give more detailed information and are cited in most sections of B-1029.  
 Persons interested in receiving a copy of the publication are invited to come by the county agents office and ask for a copy.  
**Spray Equipment**  
 Proper applications of pre- and post-emergence herbicides for cotton requires from 20 to 40 gallons of water per treated acre depending upon the herbicide used. Labels usually suggest the amount of carrier. Considerable agitation of the spray suspension is required to prevent settling in the spray tank. Adequate agitation for 4 to 6 row rigs can be accomplished with the return from a medium size pump having capacity of about 10 gallons per minute. Pre-emergence spray kits which are fastened to planters are available from most dealers. Rigs which operate independently of planters which will apply both pre and post-emergence applications will be available. Nozzles for post-emergence applications of herbicides and oils are carried on skids or wheels so that close nozzle adjustment is possible. Drop nozzles from booms are not satisfactory.

Tip size must be varied with various types of application. Tee jet tips, 8003E and 8004E, are suited for pre-emergence band application. For post-emergence directed application of herbicides, Tee jet tips 8001 spaced two on each side of the row or 8002 spaced one on each side of the row gives suitable delivery rates. The 8001 (Tee jet) tips are usually large enough for lateral application on herbicidal oils.  
 Tips sizes suggested are suitable for about 4 mph and 30 to 40 psi pressure. At different speeds other sized tips may be required. The only way to be sure of correct application is careful calibration.  
**Sprayer Calibration for Row Crops**  
 1. For 40-inch rows measure 100 feet. Then time the number of seconds it takes your tractor to travel 100 feet going the speed to be used on the sprayer.  
 2. Collect fluid and measure in ounces from all nozzles used per row for the number of seconds required to travel 100 feet. If the spray is broadcast, catch spray from the nozzles used to cover 40 inches (usually 2).  
 3. The number of ounces collected is equal to the number of gallons applied per acre of crop. If gallonage is not suitable, small

adjustments can be made by changing pressure. Larger adjustments in gallonage must be made by changing tips.

4. When treating bands, the amount of chemical to be mixed with the gallons required per acre is a function of the area treated. For example, To apply 0.2 of a pound of diuron per treated acre, with 10-inch bands in 40-inch rows, the chemical rate per acre is 10/40 or 1/4 x 0.2 = .05 pound of diuron per acre of crop. With 36-inch rows the fraction of acre treated will be 10/36.
