In addition, hogs must be validated in the Texas Hog Validation Program during the month of November. Validation involves having the hog ear tagged, tattooed and ear notched by the County Validation Committee.

Any exhibitor who has not made arrangements to have his hog tagged should contact their Agricultural Science Teacher or Don King, County Extension Agent, as soon as possible.

Entries and entry fees for hogs for the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show are due in the County Extension Office on or before Friday, December 1.

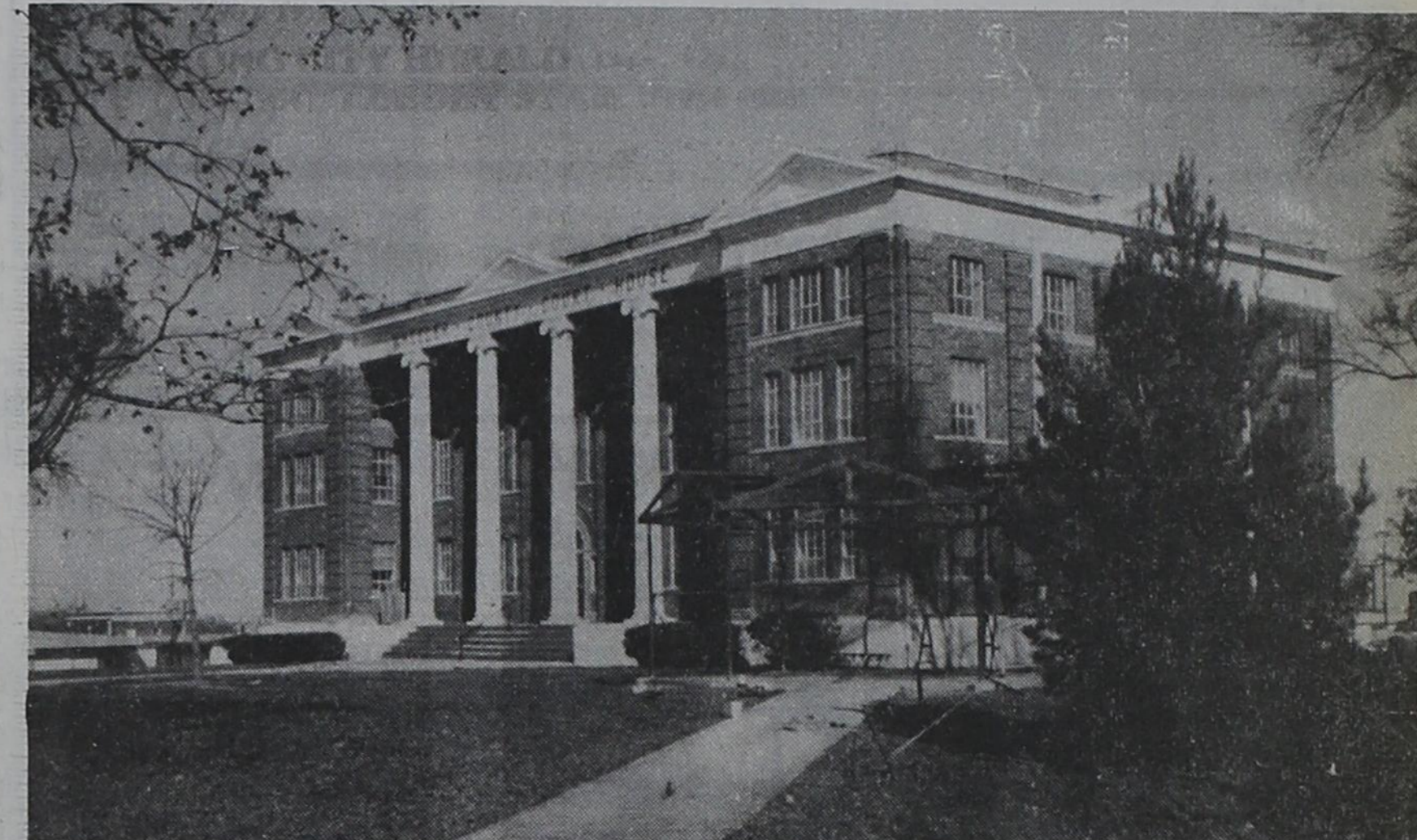

BOOKER DEFEAT, 20-13, CAPS THREE GAME WINNING STREAK

The Wheeler Mustangs capped off a three game win streak by defeating a stubborn Booker team as well as mother nature last Friday night 20 to 13. Wheeler, who was picked as a 14 point favorite going into Friday night's contest struggled early on in the game, but came out after halftime and took control of the contest scoring two needed touchdowns early in the third quarter. Of course, this victory and this contest was the last game for the boys in black this year and Booker proved to be a more than worthy opponent.

The Mustangs scored with 1:50 left in the first quarter on a Jeremy Davis three yard run and the extra point failed. The Mustang offensive line, which was anchored by seniors Dustin

Weatherly, Charlie Flanagan and Darby Dorman opened up huge holes. These linemen did a good job throughout the night and were assisted by super blocks from Layne McCasland, Andy Bradstreet, Shane Sparlin and Will Woollard. These offensive linemen have improved throughout the season and even though they usually revive no headlines or credit, the game is tough being played without them. Anyway, good job linemen!!

The Mustang backfield also put forth valiant effort last Friday night in the cold and wind and holding onto the football proved to be a little bit difficult for both teams. The Mustangs fumbled the ball three times losing the ball only once, while the Kiowas fumbled the ball seven times, losing the pigskin a total of six times. This really proved to be the downfall of the Kiowas as Wheeler was able to capitalize on the Kiowa turnovers. Again, the Mustangs kept the ball on the ground most of the night and held on to the ball. As all you readers realize, turnovers can be the difference in the game and was Friday night.

The Mustang defense also played tough last Friday night, but bended a little to much for comfort allowing the Kiowas to score 13 unanswered points in the second quarter. The Mustangs looked like they did in the first game of the season against Gruver, as the boys in black could not tackle anyone. The Mustangs appeared to be in the right position to make the tackles throughout the game, but just could not wrap up the Kiowas. So, into halftime the Kiowas took a 13 to 6 lead that did not set to well with the Mustangs.

As stated earlier, the Mustangs came out in the second half a different team, and scored 14 unanswered points on tough runs by Bryan Judd (83 yards), Jeremy Davis (81 yards), Andy Francis (6 yards), Aaron Dunnam (2 yards) and Travis Stevens (26 yards of rushing). Stevens also threw the ball three times completing on to Davis and one to Judd for a total of 23 yards. Travis also had one interception for the night, that turned into a blessing because we got more yardage out of the interception and late hit on Stevens as we would have a punt into the strong north wind. The Mustangs garnered only 221 yards of total offense compared to Booker's 242 but

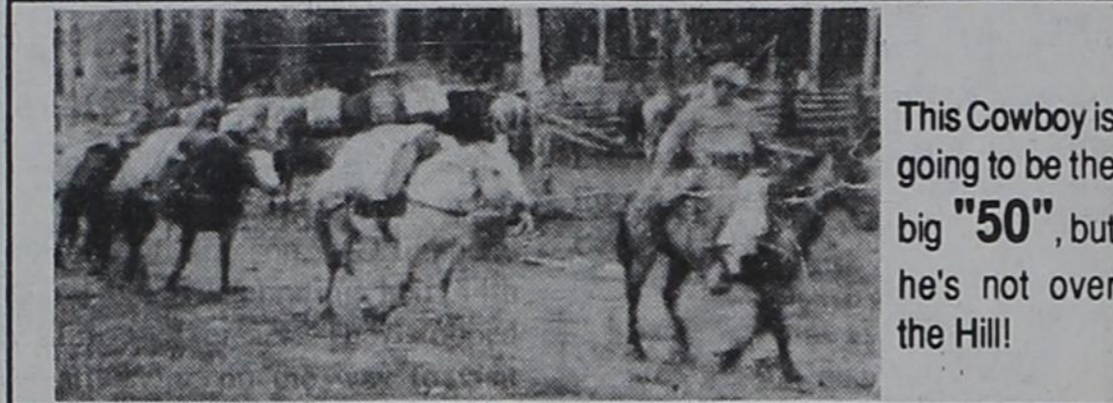

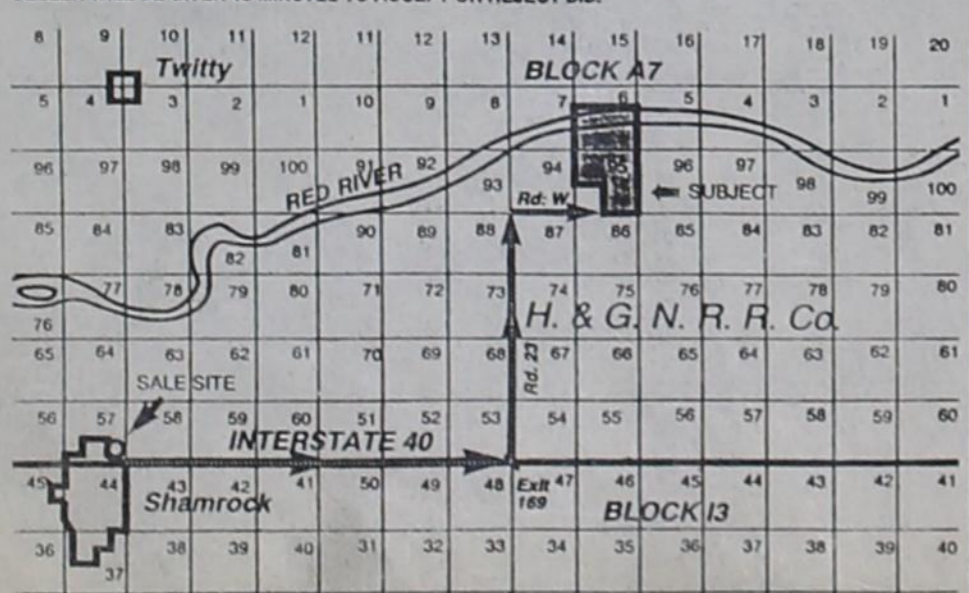

Improvement in Farm Loan Credit Reported

The five-state Tenth Farm Credit District reported improvements in loan volume, asset quality and earnings for the third quarter of 1995, according to financial results released today. The agricultural lending cooperatives loan volume showed a net increase of \$97.2 million at September 30, 1995, up to 2.7 percent over year-end 1994. Increased demand for loans was seen in both production lending, up \$65.5 million, and mortgage lending, up \$31.7 million, since December 31, 1994. District loan volume totalled \$3.76 billion at September 30.

During the same period, the district has experienced an overall net decline in high-risk assets of \$14.4 million. The improvement was fueled by an 11.2 percent decline in nonaccrual loan volume and a 31 percent decline in other property owned. Net income for the third quarter totalled \$20.3 million, a 23.6 percent increase over the \$16.4 million level a year earlier. Net income for the first nine months of 1995 was \$61.8 million, an increase of \$16 million or 34.8 percent from the same period in 1994. The Tenth Farm Credit District includes the Austin-based Farm Credit Bank of Texas, 48 Federal Land Bank Associations in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas which make land and rural housing loans; and 17 Production Credit Associations in Louisiana, New Mexico and Texas which make short-term and intermediate-term operating loans. The bank and associations are cooperatives, owned by their customers. Together, they have approximately \$4.2 billion in assets.

Nationally, the Farm Credit System reported combined net income of \$313 million and \$907 million for the third quarter and first nine months of 1995, respectively, as compared with combined net income of \$233 million and \$765 million for the same periods of the prior year. Gross loan volume rose \$2.441 billion to \$57.117 billion at September 30, 1995, as compared with year-end 1994 volume of \$54.676 billion.

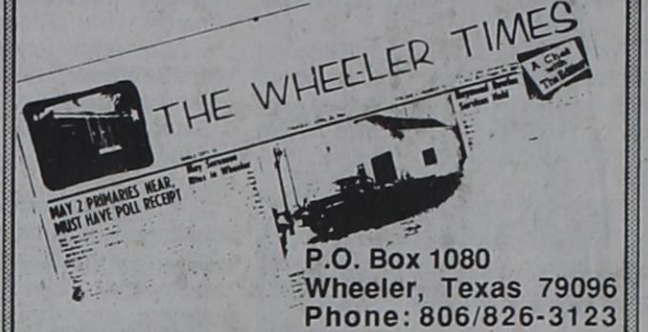

Southwestern Public Files For Regulatory Process

SPS Files for Regulatory Approvals as Part of Merger Process

Southwestern Public Service Company (NYSE: SPS) today filed applications with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and with electric utility regulators in New Mexico, Texas, and Kansas seeking approvals of plans to merge with Public Service Co. of Colorado (NYSE:PSR) and to create a new low-cost energy services holding company.

The proposed "merger of equals" was announced Aug. 23, 1995. The companies are working to complete the merger in fall 1996.

"Customers of both companies, as well as the companies themselves, will benefit from the combination of Public Service Co. of Colorado and SPS, which are two low-cost utilities that have complementary service areas," said Bill D. Helton, chairman and chief executive officer of SPS and designated chairman and CEO of the new holding company. "The combination will result in one of the premier low-cost energy providers of the future."

Helton added, "Forming a larger, broader-based utility is crucial to meet demands for continued low costs and low rates, and will allow these companies to respond more quickly and effectively to the increasingly competitive and deregulated electric utility market. We are confident the merger will result for all our customers in rates that are lower than they otherwise would be."

SPS's rates currently are among the lowest in each state in which it serves — Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas.

Today's filings include the previously announced estimate that a merged PSCO and SPS would achieve a combined net cost savings of \$770 million during the decade following the merger. The projected savings would result from lowered operational and maintenance costs, downsized corporate administration, economies of scale in fuel and non-fuel purchases, deferred future expansions of electric generating capacity and eventual joint dispatching of interconnected operating companies. The combined companies would serve approximately 1.5 million electric customers.

The utilities propose that each would continue its separate corporate existence, as an operating company of the proposed holding company. SPS would continue to be subject to oversight by the various federal, state and municipal regulators presently regulating the company. "There will be little or no noticeable difference to customers of either utility once the merger is completed," Helton said.

General non-utility subsidiaries of the utilities would become subsidiaries of the proposed holding company.

Today's filings propose regulatory plans that are distinct for each of the proposed operating companies. Neither company is proposing an increase in rates.

SPS proposes that its shareholders and customers would share the non-fuel operation and maintenance expense savings realized during the first five years of the merger. SPS customers also would realize all resulting fuel-cost savings. The customers additionally would benefit, Helton said, because the merged utilities would be able to avoid or defer new capital investments that otherwise would increase future rates.

SPS requests state regulators make SPS eligible for an experimental performance-based ratemaking program. Under the proposal, the amount the company could earn for its shareholders would be set in part on how well the company performs for customers in six areas, in comparison to other regional investor-owned utilities.

Proposed comparative criteria include low residential rates, few formal customer complaints to regulators, low capital investment in production plants, low non-fuel operation and maintenance expenses, efficient fuel conversion and exceptional availability of power plants.

"This performance-based concept is indicative of the benefits of the merger," Helton said. "SPS and PSCO are preparing for an extremely competitive environment. The merger will allow us to continue to provide the lowest cost of energy and best quality of service possible."

The merger is subject to approval by shareholders of both companies, and to approval or regulatory review by state utility commissions in Colorado and Wyoming for PSCO, and in Texas, New Mexico and Kansas for SPS. Although SPS also operates in the Oklahoma Panhandle, Oklahoma requires no regulatory review.

Federal agencies, in addition to FERC, that must review the merger are the Securities and Exchange Commission, which would regulate the proposed holding company, the Federal Trade Commission, Department of Justice and Nuclear Regulatory Commission. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission is overseeing PSCO's dismantling of a Colorado nuclear plant that is being converted to a natural gas-fueled plant.

The companies' filing with FERC includes testimony prepared by consultants, Charles River Associates, demonstrating the proposed merger "will not adversely affect competition in any relevant transmission or generation market," and that PSCO and SPS already have filed comparable service, open-access transmission tariffs that FERC has accepted and placed into effect.

Public Service Co. of Colorado is an electric, natural gas and thermal energy utility that serves a 32,000-square-mile area and a population of approximately 2.8 million people in Colorado and the Cheyenne, Wyo., area.

Southwestern Public Service Company is a regional electric utility that primarily provides service to a popula-

Members Louise Hogan, Linda Daughtry and Bobby Hill received 40 hours of training; Kay Gatlin and Rhonda Gallagher received 16 hours of training; Dale and Melba Corcoran received 12 hours of training; and Ada Lester received 8 hours of training. Members received hands-on training using the Jail Museum's collection objects

and forms. The second week of training is scheduled for December 4-8, 1995. Volunteers who have signed up for training seminars are encouraged to attend as many times as possible. Alice's legs and feet are doing some better. Sure glad to hear that! It was kind of hard for her to get around.

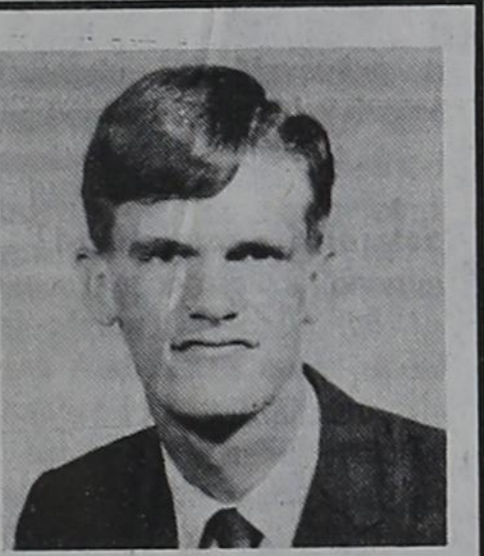

PROTECTING SENIOR TEXANS A TOP PRIORITY

The fastest growing segment of our population consists of persons who are 60 years of age and older. The effect of this growth is that an increasing number of senior Texans are living alone, burdened by one of the nation's highest poverty rates. They face soaring, out-of-pocket health expenses and a rising vulnerability to the schemes of unscrupulous con artists.

That's not the way our senior Texans should be treated. And that's why we at the Office of the Attorney General continue to fight those who prey on the elderly.

Our Elder Law and Public Health Division serves senior Texans by investigating and prosecuting businesses that defraud them, by filing lawsuits against nursing homes and personal care homes that neglect their residents, and by providing useful information on subjects of concern to senior Texans.

The division's primary areas of litigation involve the psychiatric care industry, fraudulent schemes directed at seniors, long-term care facilities, and civil enforcement of health care statutes.

Stopping Fraud Against Seniors
The division works to identify and aggressively prosecute those who cheat or deceive the elderly. In cooperation with our Consumer Protection Division, it files lawsuits under the Deceptive Trade Practices Act and

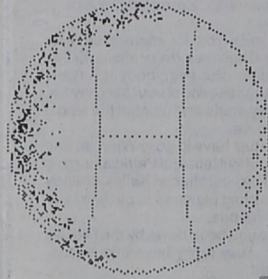
