'WAR ON POVERTY' LOANS

War-on-Poverty Loans to Texas Rural Families in Fiscal Year 1966:

Over 750 families in Texas found the means to start working their way up from the poverty income level through family Economic Opportunity loans during fiscal year 1966, L.J. Cappleman, Farmers Home Administration State Director said today.

Mr. Cappleman reported on progress of a lending program administered by the USDA Farmers Home Administra tion for the Office of Economic Opportunity

The past fiscal year saw 751 loans totaling \$1,258,940.00 made to rural families in the lowest income group to provide tools, sup plies and working space they their way forward and they need in order to earn a bett-

Since the program began in January 1965, loans totaling \$2,548,120.00 have been made to over 1535 families throughout Texas.

Mr. Cappleman said the Economic Opportunity borrowers are following more than 125 different kinds of non-agricultural enterprises. in addition to farming as a result of the helping hand extended them through the program. Loans average \$1659.00 a family, with a maximum of \$2,500.00 in

"These are loans to families at the botton of the economic ladder. Nation-wide more than half of them exis ting on less than \$1,500.00 a year for family living ex-

people who have been isolat ed in poverty, with nowhere to look except to their own capacity for self-imployment.

'Their most common handi cap has been lack of money or credit to equip themselves for the more profitable work they might do if they had the

"Economic Opportunity loans help them overcome this obstacle. The loans stake them to the things they need for a profitable farming enterprise or to increase their income by following a trade or performing a service needed in their home comm-

"The plan is working. The rural Economic Opportunity borrowers are working are paying back their loans.

Nation-wide first studes of the results realized by borrower who have had their loans approximately year showed gains in gross family income averaging \$2,800 a year for families starting non-agricultural en terprises and \$900 a year for families using Economic Opportunity loans to improve their methods of farming.

The year-old loans were being paid back on the average 8 percent faster than scheduled.

The Office of Economic Opportunity has delegated loan-making under the program to the Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration, which has a net work of 1600 county offices throughout the United penses," Mr. Cappleman said. States to serve rural people

Alfalfa Rust

Alfalfa Rust is showing up in ghiate a number of alfalfa fields in the county due to increased moisture and dampness. The rust is not harmful to livestock, but it will cause the leaves of alfalfa to turn yellow and fall off. The meadows infected should be cut and baled as soon as possible after the rust appears so as to prevent loss of leaves.

Rust can be treated by dusting with twenty pounds of sulphur per acre. This should be repeated in ten to fourteen days. The sulpher

is not dangerous to livestock. Since fall is fast approaching, treatment will probably not be necessary. The above recommendation is given for those that would like to treat at the present time or later.

Some experts list as much as 27 percent of the grocery bill as non-food items. Many stores offer housewares, clothing and items other than actual food selections.

Extension Plant Pathlogist, Robert W. Berry of Lubbock, said that nematodes are becoming a problem in the area and the resistant varieties are being tested to learn how well they yield here. He said that fumigation can also be used to control nematodes, but it cost about \$10 per acre. The tour stopped at the

Charley Davis farm to view a bindweed control demonstration as well as a cotton variety demonstration. Gray County Agent, Fost-

er Whaley said there are many yielding ability and good herbicides available that can give effective control of the weeds. He told the visitors that a liquid formulation tend to be most economical while dry formulations are generally more convenient.

For controlling large infestations he suggested 2-4 D. This could be used in all growing crops except cotton. For eradicating small patches seasons. Tascosa, Caddo, Whaley said it was important to spray 10 feet out from the last bindweed plants to get a kill on the roots.

Farm Demonstration Assistant, Duane L Scott, of Wellington, gave a brief talk on the cotton variety test at the Davis Farm.

John L. Manning, of the Wheeler County Farmers Home range management practices Administration also explained the credit program available for local farmers during the stop at the Davis farm.

Agronomist Ben Spears of Texas A&M University said the cotton fertility demonstration on the N.L. Sechrist farm was designed to help make soil test recommendations more precise so rates could be suggested for maximum yields.

On the Grady Harris farm, discussed the livestock demonstration that was conducted on the Harris farm.

He said that growing stock er cattle offered a great potential for this area. The sorahum sudan hybrid arass demonstration where 89 Okie type steers were grazed netted \$50 per acre.

Grady Harris explained performance testing, how the commercial and registered breeders could apply it to their operation. He said that it was another important tool that should be used to improve efficiency of produc-




