## CITY COUNCIL OFFERS PAVING PROJECT



Wheeler Citizens will have the opportunity to vote on a \$55,000 Paving Program on Tuesday, March 14. The election will be held at the city office with the polls open from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

The program is a revision of the Nov. 22 program which was voted down 213 to 130. The new program calls for the paving with curb and gutter of 30 blocks. The earlier project called for the paving of 84 blocks.

The \$55,000 cost to the city represents 40% of the total cost. The City will finance their part of the project by raising minimum water and sewer rates 50c each.

The cost to the property owner will be \$3.95 per frontal foot. The property owner with a 50 ft. frontal would be assessed \$197.50 which could be paid in four equal installments.

Mayor Don Earney stated that the minimum water rate will be increased from \$2.00 per 3,000 gallons to \$2.50 and the minimum sewer rate from \$1.50 to \$2.00. This will bring in approximately \$6,000 per year which would be sufficient to pay off the city's portion of the paving program.

### WHEELER BOYS TIED FOR FIRST WITH CLARENDON; PLAYOFF FRI.

The Wheeler boys cinched their tie with Clarendon for the district 2-A Championship. The Wheeler team met Silverton with the boys winning and the girls losing. Clarendon boys were also victorious in their game with McLean Tuesday.

### HOSPITAL BOARD SETS ELECTION FOR DIRECTORS

The deadline for filing for director of the North Wheeler County Hospital District is March 5, 1967. Three districts will elect directors this year. They are Allison, Briscoe and Mobeetie. These districts are currently represented by Clyde Dukes, Allison - H. J. Finsterwald, Briscoe - and Lester Leonard, Mobeetie.

A candidate for director shall file a petition signed by not less than five qualified voters residing in the candidates voting precinct, asking that the said name be printed on the ballot with the secretary of the Board of Directors. Such petitions shall be filed at least twenty five days prior to the date of the election.

This election will be held in conjunction with the school election on April 1, 1967. Any qualified taxpayer desiring his or her name to be placed on the ballot as

a candidate for director shall file a petition signed by not less than five qualified voters residing in the candidates voting precinct, asking that the said name be printed on the ballot with the secretary of the Board of Directors. Such petitions shall be filed at least twenty five days prior to the date of the election.

### SECOND BLOOD BANK DRAWING SET MARCH 1

Your committee men and organization heads will be contacting you to donate your pint of blood to make our hospital blood bank participation possible and to ensure a supply of blood for our wounded in Viet Nam.

We are scheduling 12 donors every 15 minutes from 9 to 12:15 on August 4th. If you are not sure you will be in town on that date plan to be a "Walk In." A "Walk In" is an unscheduled person who comes when he can and waits a turn. The whole time for your visit will consume less than 45 minutes.

Remember, blood is only made by humans and your unique pint of blood you give this way may someday save your own life when you need it.

**A. REGARDING IMMUNIZATION:**

1. Rabies: one year after last shot.
  2. Small - Pox: Two weeks for "Two Weeks for 'No Take'" for "Take" after scab comes off.
  3. Yellow Fever: Two weeks after last shot.
  4. Typhoid: 24 hr. after last shot.
  5. Typhus: 24 hr. after last shot.
  6. Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever: 24 hr. after last shot.
  7. Influenza: 24 hr. after last shot.
  8. Tetanus: 24 hours after last shot.
  9. Cholera: 24 hr. after last shot.
  10. Diphtheria: 24 hr. after last shot.
  11. Poliomyelitis - Salk Vaccine: 24 hours after last shot.
  12. Sabin Vaccine: (oral) no waiting period.
- B. Vitamin, hormone, liver, antibodies and related products and other injections-donor must be evaluated by the physician on an individual basis.

Cortisone - 1 month after last dose.

**C. EXPOSURE TO CONTAGIOUS OR INFECTIOUS DISEASES:**

If donor has been exposed to infectious or contagious diseases in or out of the home, he should not be scheduled for three weeks. If there is more than one child in the family, he should not be scheduled for three weeks after the last patient has recovered.

**PROPER DIET:** It is important that you eat to maintain your strength, "but avoid fatty foods for four hours PRIOR to donation."

**Suggested Breakfast:** Fruit, fruit juices with generous amounts of sugar. Cream of Wheat or oatmeal with sugar and trim milk, toast with jam, jelly or honey. (no butter.)

**Suggested Lunch:** Clear soups without fats, sandwiches (no butter or mayonnaise) roast beef, tongue chicken, lettuce, tomato, onion or cucumber (catsup), eggs, if eaten, boiled or poached.

**Vegetables:** prepared without fat. Bread: toast or crackers, no butter.

**Salad:** Vegetable, fruit or dairy cottage (no mayonnaise or oil dressing.) Use lemon juice, vinegar, salt or sugar.

**Dessert:** jello or fruit. **ADVISABLE TO FORCE LIQUIDS:** Any carbonated drinks, coffee, tea (without cream,) water.

**FOODS EXCLUDED:** Fried foods, cream, butter, mayonnaise, oil dressings, peanut butter, gravy, ham, bacon, pastries, nuts and chocolate.

Following are revisions of "Instructions to Blood Donors."

1. Proper diet: While it is not desirable for donors to ingest heavy,

### DON C. KING TO SPEAK BEFORE WHEELER KIWANIS CLUB FEB. 20

Don C. King, 37, of Fort Worth, Texas, Secretary-General manager of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association will present the program for the Wheeler Kiwanis Club on Monday, Feb. 20, 1967 at 12:00 noon. The club meets at the First Methodist Church in Wheeler. Any livestock producers, that would be interested, is invited to attend the program which begins about 12:25. If anyone would care to eat with the group, then Bill Brooks, president of the Wheeler Kiwanis club, should be contacted ahead of time so arrangements can be made for food preparation.

King was appointed Secretary-General of the largest cattlemen organization of its kind in the world on Dec. 5, 1966 following the death of the late Joe S. Fletcher. He is head of a force of approximately 80 Market Inspectors in Texas and 30 Field Inspectors in Texas and Oklahoma. The primary duty of these men is investigation and apprehension of cattle thieves.

King has a lifelong interest in cattle industry, having come from a pioneer family near Jermyn, Texas. He was

graduated from high school at Jacksboro in 1946 and entered John Tarlton College in Stephenville that fall. After finishing John Tarlton, he graduated from Texas Tech in 1949.

I first knew Don King when he was a field inspector at Graham, while I was serving as Stephens County Agent. He is a very capable young man and I think any livestock producer would appreciate hearing his program.

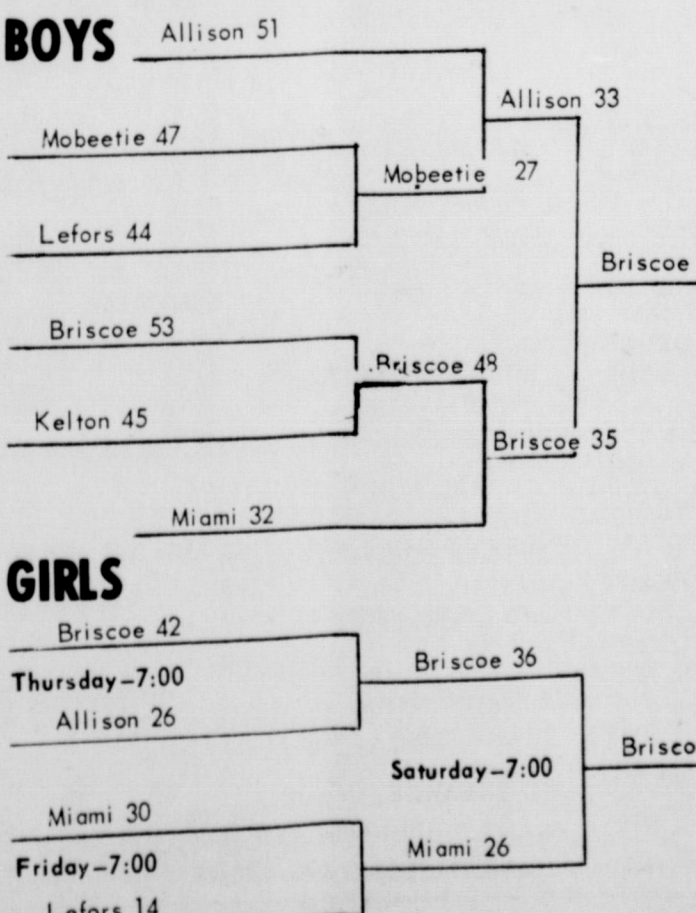
### BRISCOE TEAMS WIN 2B TOURNNEY; ALLISON BOYS DISTRICT CHAMPS

## AUSTIN—AS I SEE IT

I guess I better start off with a little good news for our area. If you will get one of the new 1967 Texas Highway Department Maps, you will see a picture of two hunters and their dogs with a lot of pretty cottonwood trees in the background. Where else could you see such a pretty sight except during the Foliage Tour near Canadian. The hunters are Gib Dickens and Warren Hill of Canadian. It was taken on the Persimmon Creek Ranch near Lake Marvin, but it does not tell you where it is. I could claim credit for it but I better not.

Guess, I better talk about money a little as that is the main commodity down here. Everybody wants some but we are to get it from the other fellow. The Governor proposes to collect sales tax on alcoholic beverages which would bring in about 26 million dollars during the next 10 years. He wants to increase franchise taxes on corporations which would bring in 31 million dollars. I have heard very little opposition to these so far. He proposes an increase from 7% to 8% on the production taxes on natural gas which would produce 18 million dollars. This might be riding a good horse a little hard.

The price of gas is set by the FPC and there is no way to pass this tax on. This "income tax" is already the highest imposed on any business in Texas and comes directly out of the pocket of land owners and companies. The big chunk comes from a one cent gas tax increase which would bring in nearly 100 million dollars. We are told that the new 6c tax would be the same as surrounding States get. There is no proposed increase on diesel LPG which the big trucks use.

Besides this increase, he proposed to repeal the Colson Briscoe Act. Most of you, probably like me, are wondering what the heck it is. This is the bill that specifies \$15 million per year earmarked for Farm to Market roads. It would leave Farm to Market roads at the discretion of the Highway Department and the Farm Bureau is not at all happy with this.

The last \$15 million dollars he recommends probably caused more static than all

the rest put together. That is the LBJ (liquor by the jigger.) The mail from our District has been about 35 to 1 against Liquor By the Drink and Horse Racing. They had about a four hour hearing in the Senate on Horse Racing and although the Committee passed it by 6 to 5, I don't think, from all I hear, that either of these Bills will pass.

I meant to discuss Daylight Savings Time a little with you but this column is already too long. See you later.

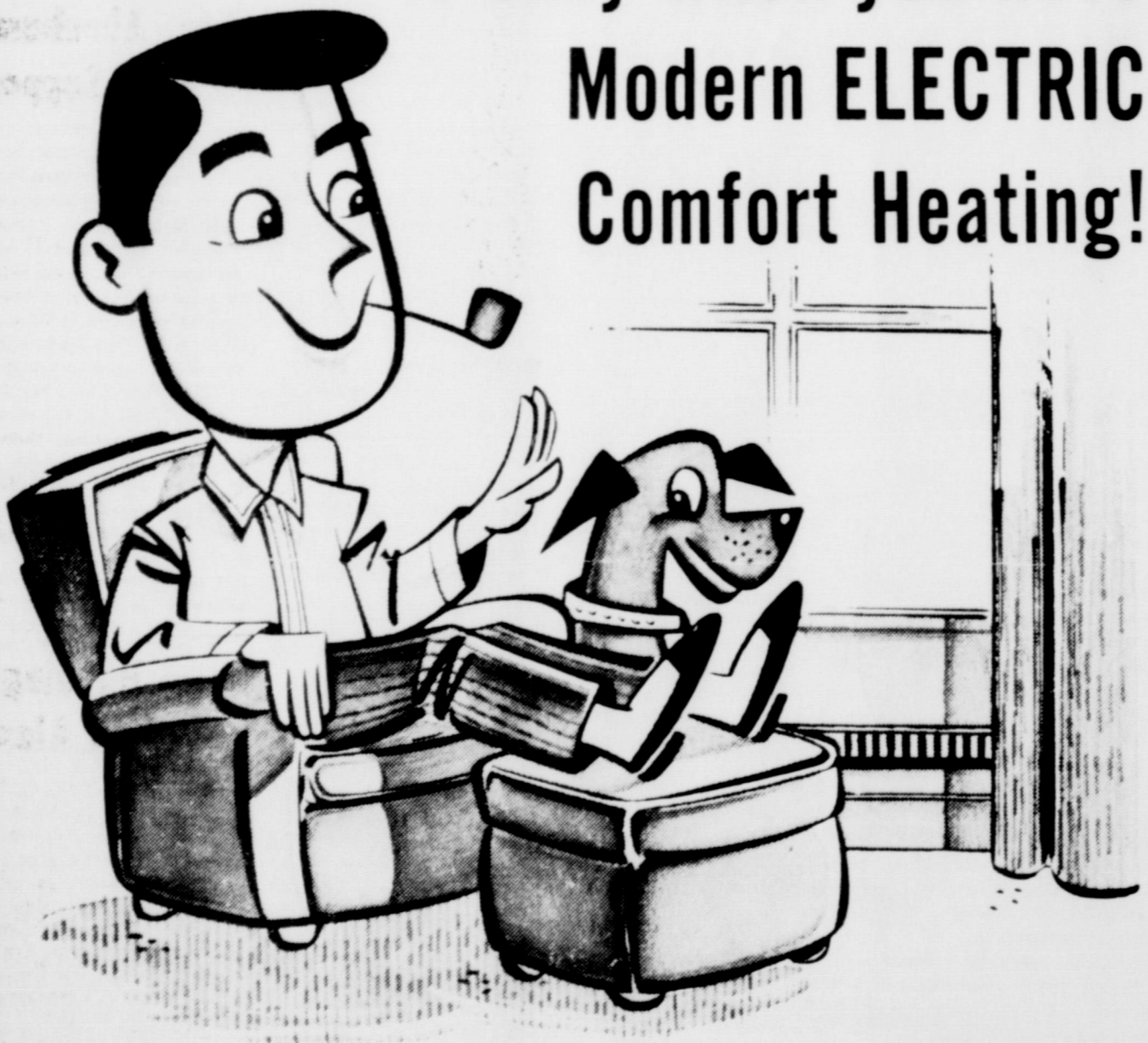

to college as a freshman. One of your biggest concerns will be MONEY. For example, what's the best way for you to handle your allowance?

1. Decide in advance what your allowance is supposed to pay for. If your allowance is supposed to pay for clothes, important supplies at school and so forth, have this clearly understood and allocate funds for these expenses.

2. Plan the spending of your allowance as carefully as you plan your study time - both with your parents and on your own.

3. Open a bank checking account immediately. If you use your desk drawer or your pocket, you are increasing your chances of a loss or increasing the chances of the feast-famine pattern to take over.

4. Don't try to figure your spending down to the last penny. No plan should be that precise. You will need a margin of safety over your regular spending to cover "regular emergencies."

5. Maintain some simple records on where your money is going. Your check stubs will help, but also keep a notebook in a spot where you easily can jot down every day how your spending your allowance. Don't be too detailed in these records, but don't neglect them either.

6. Look for ways you can stretch your allowance by free entertainment and using your leisure time to save on expenses.

7. Learn sensible buying methods and apply them to yourself. If you're handling your own wardrobe at school, take advantage of neighborhood store sales and off-season clearances.

8. Show your record books during your first reunion with your parents, discuss what's right and wrong with your allowance setup. If you are running short despite all your efforts and have records to prove your responsible management, you will have a good case for a raise.

WEED CONTROL ON COTTON

By Charles David Jackson Recommendations Released For Weed Control On Cotton: Researchers serving the High Plains recently prepared their 1967 recommendations for successful use of pre-plant herbicides in cotton.

The recommendations are based on tests, observations and county agents' comments from over the cotton production area, according to Dr. Allen Wiese, weed-control researcher at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center, Bushland.

Pre-plant herbicides are suggested for fields where severe weed problems exist and where hoeing costs have been high.

Pre-plant herbicides have acquired tremendous popularity recently although Wiese believes some farmers could save money with band applications of pre-emergence herbicides.

Farmers seem to prefer broadcast pre-plant applications because they can be made before the busy planting season and because they reduce late cultivations which increase moisture loss and prune cotton roots.

Heavy crop residue should be thoroughly worked into the soil before application. The herbicides must be incorporated into the soil two to four inches within a few hours after application, he said.

Wiese attributes the few cases of poor results with the pre-plant herbicides to faulty applications, to listing deeper than incorporation and failure to use follow-up weed control measures.

Faulty application comes from not calibrating the sprayer and from overlapping or skipping spots in the field. "You can't use the tractor tracks as a guide for your spray boom," Wiese says.

The first step is to record the number of seconds it takes your tractor to travel 100 feet at spraying speed.

The second step is to collect spray from the nozzles it takes to cover 40 inches for the same number of seconds it took the tractor to travel 100 feet.

Several farmers have gotten poor results from pre-plant herbicides because they listed deeply and the furrow became weedy before planting.

Wiese and Hudspeth are both strong advocates of on-the-bed planting where pre-plant and pre-emergence herbicides are used.

A Chat With The Mayor

I am sure you have noticed where the City Council plans to hold another Bond Election on March 14th in an effort to pave, curb and gutter approximately 30 blocks in Wheeler.

We have tried our best to cut-out the blocks where we received most of our opposition in our first bond election and we hope this reduced program will satisfy the majority of our citizens.

In our first bond election we were apparently hitting some of our senior citizens pretty hard. Many of them living on corners with paving in front and on the side would have found it very difficult to pay for the paving.

The city will pay approximately 40% of this new program and property owners on each side of the street will be assessed \$3.95 per front foot. In other words a 50 ft. lot would cost \$197.50 and a 100 ft. lot will cost the property owner \$395.00.

I think I can speak for all of the city council when I say, "We aren't trying to cram a paving program down anyone's throat." However, we all feel that the city needs the paving in order to prosper and progress.

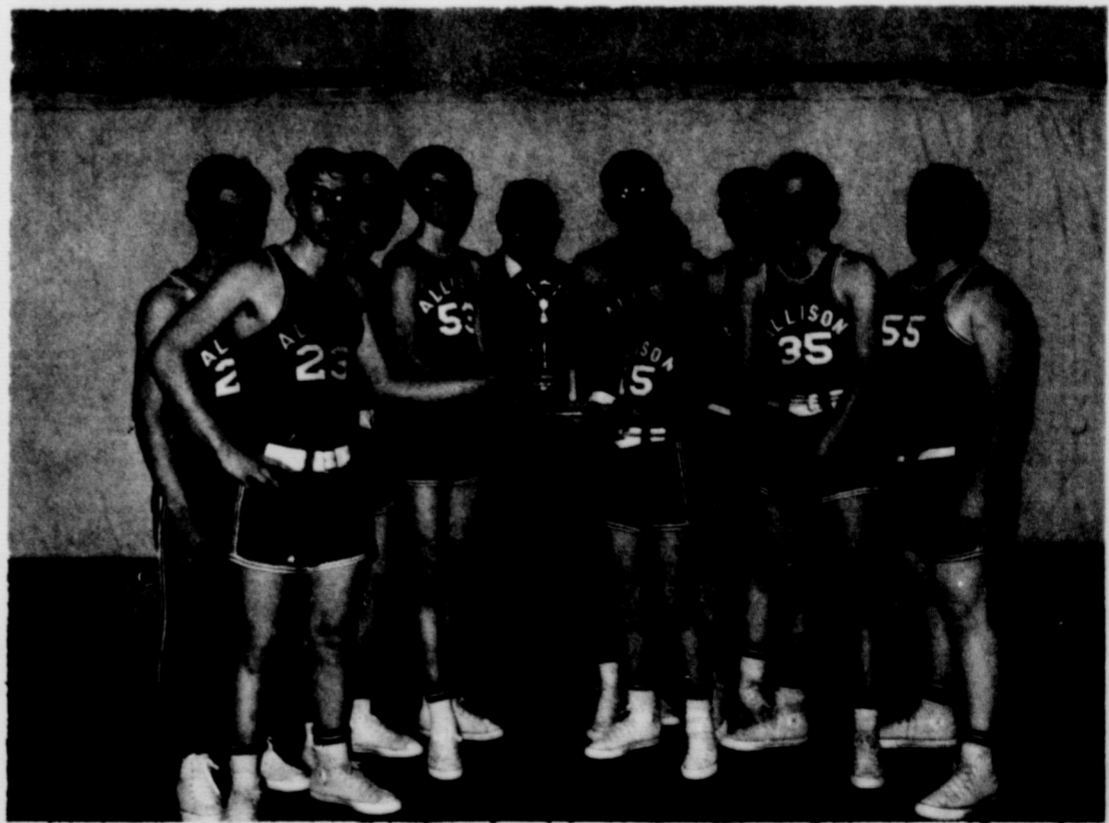

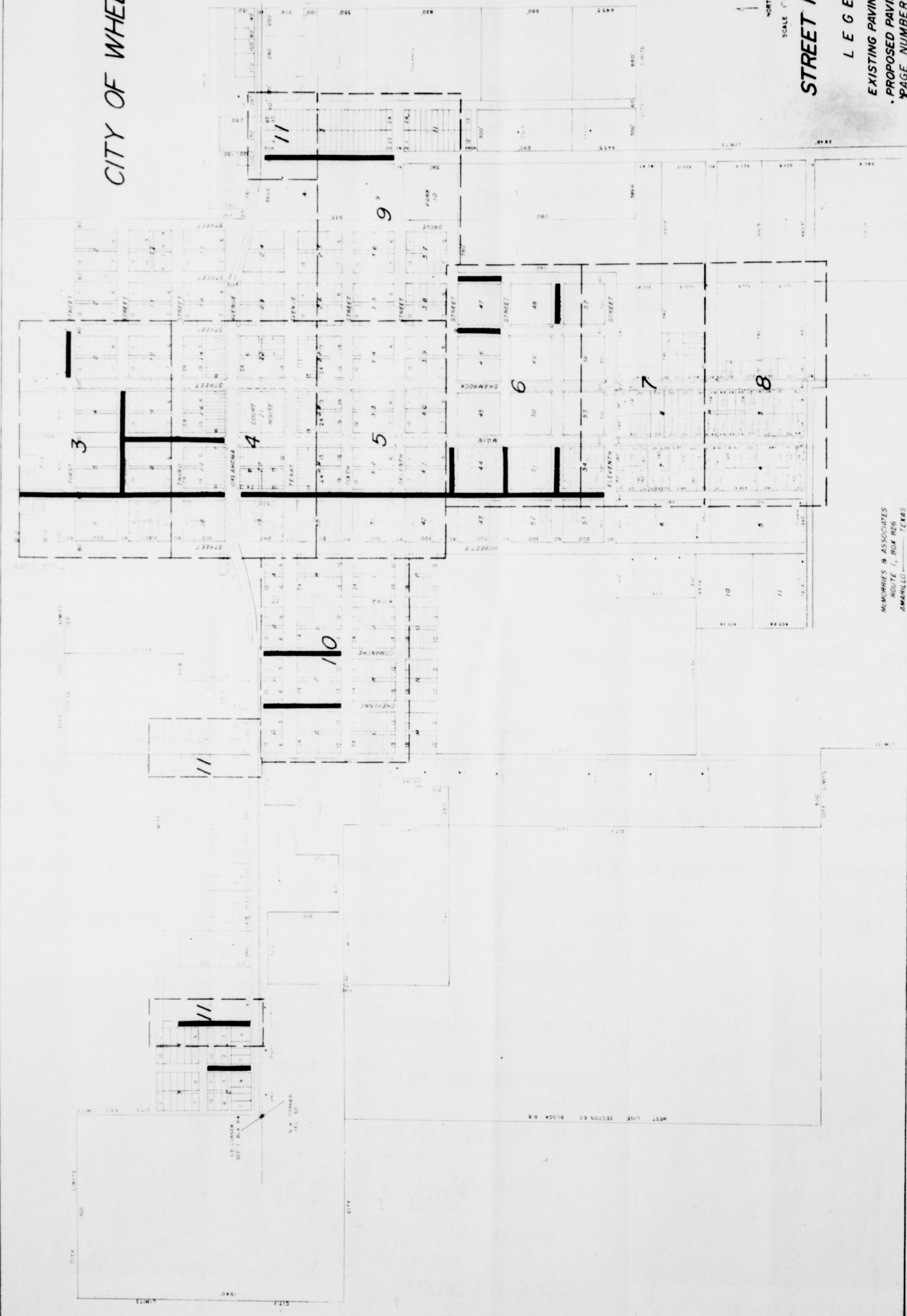
