Y COUNCIL OFFERS PAVING PROJECT



a \$55,000 Paving Program on Tuesday, March 14. The election will be held at the city office with the polls op en from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

The program is a revision of the Nov. 22 program which was voted down 213 to 130. The new program calls for the paving with curb and gutter of 30 blocks. The earlier project called for the paving of 84 blocks.

The \$55,000 cost to the city represents 40% of the total cost. The City will finance their part of the project by raising minimum water and sewer rates 50¢ each.

The cost to the property owner will be \$3.95 per frontal foot. The property owner with a 50 ft. frontal would be assessed \$197.50 which could be paid in four equal installments

Mayor Don Earney stated that the minimum water rate will be increased from \$2.00 per 3,000 gallons to \$2.50 and the minimum sewer rate from \$1.50 to \$2.00. This will bring in approximately \$6,000 per year which would be sufficient to pay off the city's portion of the



Anothers Source Of Funds: If you are wondering where the money for college will come from, why not look into the growing number of cooperative programs that enable a student to alternate

between work and study? More than 5 colleges and universities around the country have these cooperative programs, under which a student can earn part or all of his expenses. Most require five years to complete studies for a degree, with this consisting usually of 24 months of work and 35 of study. A few permit a student to graduate in four years while some require

Here's how the plan works: under one typical program a full-time job in an industrial firm or Government agency is shared by two students. They take turns on the job and in the class. Pay varies on jobs with industrial firms, but with Government agency a student received \$291 to \$336 a month-depending on the number of years of college completed

You have an opportunity now to establish some habits in handling money that will be good for life. Should you get a fixed allowance or write home as you need cash? Open a checking or savings account?

There are fundamental rules to guide you and your parents. Here are the major Money ABC's for College which will help any student that will use them!

1. Decide in advance what your allowance is supposed to pay for. If your allowance is supposed to pay for clothes, important supplies at school and so forth, have this clearly understood and allocate funds for these expenses.

2. Plan the spending of your allowance as carefully as you plan your study time both with your parents and on your own. The important secret to this is a seven day aweek plan under which you will divide your available cash into a spending kitty for each day. If you don't do this, you'll be feasting on the first days and in a famine on the last days. Start your day-by-day plan right away.

3. Open a bank checking account immediately. If you use your desk drawer or your pocket, you are increasing your chances of a loss or increasing the chances of the feast-famine pattern to take over. Open an account, learn how to make deposits, draw checks, keep any service charges to a minimum, get to know your banker. This type thing will be with you the

rest of your life. 4. Don't try to figure your spending down to the last penny. No plan should be that precise. You will need a margin of safety over your regular spending to cover "regular emergencies.

5.- Maintain some simple records on where your money is going. Your check stubs will help, but also keep a over a quarter of their income natebook in a spot where you easily can jot down every day how your spending your allowance. Don't be too detailed in these records, but don't neglec them either.

6 Look for ways you can stretch your allowance by free entertainment and using your lei sure time to save on

7. Learn sensible buying methods and apply them to yourself. If you're handling your own wardrobe at school take advantage of neighborhood store sales and off-season clearances. Buying essentials in bulk or on special sales can save your impress. ive amounts over a term.

transfused. This action was taken by the joint concern of selected Hospital Administrators, Members of the Executive Committee and the Midway-Kansas Chapter Board. The over-riding concern was the steady increase of funds needed to meet the raising cost of salaries of medical and professional personnel and the cost of supplies and transportation.

Also, all other supplies used in collecting blood have increased beyond expectations since 1963 when the Hospital Participation Fee was last adjusted. It is always the policy of the Blood Program to place on the hospital shelf a unit of blood at less than the cost of production. Currently the cost per unit is \$9.71

WEED CONTROL ON COTTON

By Charles David Jackson Recommendations Released For Weed Control On Cotton:

Researchers serving the High Plains recently prepared their 1967 recommendations for successful use of preplant herbicides in cotton.

The recommendations are based on tests, observations and county agents' comments not have to compete with so from over the cotton production area, according to Dr. Allen Wiese, weed-control researcher at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center, Bushland.

Pre-plant herbicides are suggested for fields where severe weed problems exist and where hoeing costs have been high. Pre-plant herbicides have

acquired tremendous popularity recently although Wiese believes some farmers could save money with band applications of pre-emergence herbicides.

the pre-plant herbicides to faulty applications, to listing deeper than incorporation and failure to use follow-up weed control measures. Faulty application comes

spray boom," Wiese says. If you're applying the herbicide and discing in one operation the spray boom should be the width of the area you cut with the disc. If you're just applying spray, 4 years of operation under I strongly urge the use of a row marker as a quide.

Elmer Hudspeth, ag-engineer at the South Plains Research and Extension Center near Lubbock, works closely with Wiese on weed control

Hudspeth uses a method of sprayer calibration that is one of the easiest to remember and accomplish. The first step is to record

the number of seconds it takes your tractor to travel 100 feet at spraying speed. The second step is to collect spray from the nozz-

les it takes to cover 40 inches for the same number of seconds it took the tractor to travel 100 feet.

The numb r of ounces collected will closely equal the number of gallons applied per acre, Hudspeth says.

The system works for Wins Ford Award broadcast spraying and for 40 inch row spacing with any broadcast spraying and for length boom because the amount of spray distributed over one 40 inch zone should be the same throughout the field, according to the ag-

Hudspeth says if gallonage is not suitable, small adjustments can be made by changing pressure. Larger adjustments in gallonage must be made by changing

Several farmers have gotten poor results from pre-plant herbicides because they listed deeply and the furrow became weedy before plant-

The researchers also say that lister planters tend to throw the herbicide to the middles leaving the row unprotected. Wiese and Hudspeth are both strong advocates of on-

the; bed planting where preplant and pre-emergence her bicides are used. If listerplanting is used, the furrows should be shallow to avoid throwing the herbicide away from the row and into the middles.

In our first bond election we were apparently hitting some of our senior citizens pretty hard. Many of them living on corners with paving in front and on the side would have found it very difficult to pay for the paving. We have tried to eliminate as many of the side streets as possible.

The city will pay approxi mately 40% of this new program and property owners on each side of the street will ne assessed \$3.95 per front foot. In other words a 50 ft. lot would cost \$197.50 and a 100 ft. lot will cost the property owner \$395.00. Finan-

I think I can speak for all of the city council when I say, "We aren't trying to cram a paving program down anyone's throat.' However, we all feel that the city needs the paving in order to prosper and progress. And wouldn't it be a shame to let our new \$750,000.00 school overlook dirt streets.

I think it is an absolute must that we have paving, curb and gutter on the two blocks in front of the school and on the block west of the school, so while we're doing this, why not go ahead and pave the other streets that we need so bad . Sure it's going to cost money, progress


