AGRICULTURAL LAND

TAXATION AMMENDMENTS

Texas)

Amendment I, passed by the 59th Texas Legislature and accepted by the voters of Texas in the 1966 General Election, is concerned with the relief of heavy taxation of agricultural land in or near centers of population when the taxes on such land reflect values other than its use for agricultural purposes.

The land eligible or such tax adjustment is subject to the following limitations:

1. The primary source of income of the land owner must be from agriculture.
2. The land owner each year must file a sworn statement with the local tax assessor designating agriculture as the use to which the land is devoted.
3. Land owners may be called upon to furnish proof of use of land for agricultural purposes, as well as proof of agricultural income being the primary source of income.
4. Land so designated for tax relief must have been devoted exclusively to agricultural use for a period of three years or continuously developed for agriculture during such period prior to the lower assessment for agricultural purposes.
5. When the land is sold or diverted to uses other than agriculture, such land becomes subject to three years back taxes at a higher rate reflecting what taxes would have been had the land been otherwise assessed.

for benefits under this amendment it is the responsibility of the owner to initiate the proceedings and not the tax assessor.

This new amendment will probably not affect Wheeler County land owners directly, but land owners should be keenly aware of any new legislation concerning taxing of land. The future of agricultural land taxation. Agricultural producers in several states are already finding this to be a problem.

FARM RECORDS
"Closing time," as it refers to 1966 farm records, is at hand. This means totaling the balance sheets on farm and home enterprises and taking a look at what happened during the year.

A close look should point up problems that must be met in planning for 1967 and the years ahead. Records often reflect whether management changes are needed and also whether an enterprise should be dropped or expanded.

Furthermore, a complete set of records is a must for proper income tax reporting. Regularly kept records can save dollars at tax paying time, for deductible expenses are often overlooked, especially if paid in cash.

Complete farm records are an asset when money must be borrowed for production and operating expenses. Knowing what the business is doing makes a strong talking point in effecting credit arrangements. Farm families need facts on which to base their decisions and none are more reliable than those ob-

tained from well-kept records.

Two years ago, the Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Shamrock and Palmer Siver, Wheeler County Treasurer, purchased a supply of farm record books through the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. A few of these books should still be available for people interested. I would recommend these family account books as a good system to begin keeping records in 1967.

County Survey Continues

The field work for the Standard Soil Survey of the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District continues, according to Bill Brooks, Work Unit Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service. About 375,000 acres have been mapped. This is about two-thirds of the county. The survey is scheduled for completion in the latter part of 1968. There are nearly 200,000 acres yet to be mapped.

Jerald Crump, Soil Scientist of Wheeler, is now mapping in the area between Wheeler and Twitty. Jack Williams, Soil Scientist of Pampa, has been mapping west of Mobeetie.

When completed, this survey will be published in book form. The book will contain soils maps of the entire county as well as all known information about the characteristics of each soil in the county. The problems with each soil, predicted yields, and management practices needed to maintain the productivity, tilth and to control erosion will also be included. The survey report will also contain considerable information on the early history, climate and other natural resources in Wheeler County.

The Standard Soil Survey is simply an inventory of the soil resources in the county. A soil survey tells us of the kind of soils and their characteristics. It tells us how

the soils are distributed and where they came from and how they behave.

These surveys are a part of the National Cooperative Soil Survey. It is a cooperative project of the Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The purpose of the survey is to get a complete inventory of the Agricultural land of the nation to learn as much about it as possible.

Law Protects Mailboxes

Mailboxes are protected by Federal Law and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment. Postmaster Virgil Jamison warned today.

The Postmaster noted that some 25,000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the past year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested in the year up to June 30 for damaging or destroying mail receptacles.

Postmaster Jamison quoted from the law: "Whoever willfully and maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

This applies to all mail receptacles and the mail in them, even though the boxes are bought by citizens and are their personal property. Postmaster Jamison emphasized.

"Pranksters--and especially children who do not know any better--should be made to realize the seriousness of their actions," the Postmaster said. "A \$1,000 fine or a term in jail is enough to take the humor out of any prank."

Often the mailbox damage is the work of youths, who do it for "kicks." And the

courts have shown little sympathy for this youthful means of expression. In Michigan a justice sentenced two 18 year olds to 10 days in jail, including two on a diet of baby food. The diet specification, explained the judge, was because the youths "acted like babies." They were also fined \$25 each plus costs.

In New York state five youths were fined \$25 each plus restitution or restoration plus no driving for an indefinite period, plus an 8 p.m. curfew, plus a written analysis by each of a magazine article "A Judge Gets Tough On Hoodlums."

Two Iowa youths who damaged 39 mailboxes were required to personally apologize to each boxholder in addition to making repairs or providing a new box.

In Missouri, three 17 year olds lost their driving privileges were given a 9 p.m. curfew and had to report twice weekly to juvenile authorities. They damaged 63 mailboxes.

And in Arkansas, four juveniles face the following: 1. no driving until further notice, 2. a 10 p.m. curfew, 3. return to court in a month with letters from their school principals reporting on grades and attitudes, 4. full restitution of all damages and 5. wear a sign for 30 days stating "I have not learned to respect the property of others."

From a Former HD Agent

Recently I was given a letter from a person who lived here about forty years ago. She was the home demonstration agent when the first home demonstration club was formed in Wheeler County. This remarkable person is Viola Jones Krug. Here is her Christmas greetings: Christmas Greetings from Olney, Texas.

The year of 1966 is almost gone. I suppose I have traveled fewer miles this year than any since our daddy drove his first car home in 1914. Even then if you averaged 20 miles to the hour you were a good driver. On the one little trip I did take this year to Decatur in Wise County, the county where I was born, a distance of 88 miles, I made in a little less than two hours. This same trip in the beginning of the century took us two whole days. Of course we made it in a covered wagon pulled by a team of mules. Sometimes we had to get out of the wagon and push to help the mules get the wagon out of a good long stretch of sand.

This year I have spent much of my time doing church work such as teaching the Women's Bible Class on Sundays, attending the women's organizations twice each month. As treasurer that took a little time as we have bought 16 Bibles to leave in the church pews, sent baskets of food to two undernourished families for Thanksgiving, bought a mattress for the nursery and many other things as the need arose. I helped with summer Bible school and we are in our 6th week of having a Bible school on Monday after school dismisses for the first six grades. Our preacher's wife is director. He takes his part of the time teaching all the children songs, games and devotionals. I have the Bible part of the 4th, 5th and 6th grades. We took them to the senior citizen's rest home to sing for them last Friday. They did so well we all came back inspired. They will sing for the church soon. We study the book of Revelations on Wednesday night and we also have Bible study on Sunday night after the prayer service. Of course the real sermon comes on Sunday morning. Then for my extra time after keeping the house and preparing two meals a day, trying to grow a garden, irrigating the garden and more than 30 peach trees all through the summer, canning, freezing, visiting the sick and lonely, I have spent the

rest of my time sewing. Most of this goes to the Juliette Fowler Home in Dallas. I have made 92 garments since the first of the year. We have canned 160 containers and froze 92. We have a good variety of canned and frozen fruits, but most of our vegetables are blackeyed peas. Years ago I remember a plaque on the wall at the school house that said, "An idle brain is the devil's workshop." I try to keep mine busy, but I will have to admit this: "I know full well my youth has been spent, 'ly get up and go has got up and went, But I really don't mind when I think with a grin, Of all the grand places my get up has been."

I hope all of you will have Health that will make living a pleasure, Wealth that will supply your needs and Faith in God that will bring Peace that passeth all understanding to linger in your heart through the years.
