FOUR ESCAPED SERIOUS INJURY: Four Wheeler youths were on their way to Lake Foss Monday when the driver hit his brakes and lost control of the car. Johnny Chapman, owner of the 1965 Ford LTD, was traveling 40 to 45 miles per hour on a dirt road 15 miles northeast of Elk City when his brother in law, Wallace Johnson traveling a front of Johnny, applied his brakes to slow down for a bridge. The brake light apparently surprised Johnny and he stepped on his brakes, causing the car to skid in the loose dirt. The car spun around, flipped into the air and rolled at least two times before coming to rest 120 feet from where the brakes were applied. Bobby Robison, Donna Davidson and Nancy Moore, passengers in the car climbed out with the driver with only minor cuts and bruises. After the authorities were notified and a wrecker called, the four joined the rest of the party and went skiing as planned.

BOND ELECTION PASSES

A \$750,000 school bond issue designed to finance the construction of a new school plant for Wheeler was passed Saturday, May 29. With 341 persons marking their ballot, 214 voted for the bond election and 127 voted against it.

The Wheeler school board will begin working on the issue immediately. The plans presented were a general outline of what was needed and now the board will begin working out the final details to fill the school's particular needs.

The new structure will consist of one 55,000 square foot building which will

house the high school, grade school, auditorium, cafeteria and administrative offices. This building will cost \$625,000.

County Board Petition Ruling

The county school board met Tuesday June 1 to consider a petition presented to school board president Tom Britt. The petition requested the disattachment of 16 sections from Wheeler school district and attachment of the same to the Lela school district.

After hearing the case, the board members went into closed session and voted to annex the 16 sections in question. The vote was three to two.

The board met in open session to hear the arguments for and against the petition. County superintendent George Weems presented his findings in the case and quoted instances where such petitions had been filed. Tom Britt read the law and opened the meeting for discussion.

The 16 sections mentioned in the petition concern only 4 students. The students were enrolled in Wheeler schools. Two of the students were grade school pupils and two were high school students. A letter was presented to the board which stated that these students were well pleased with the past year's accomplishments in Wheeler schools.

A Note Of Appreciation

Your board of education and I appreciate very much the support of our community in passing the Bond Issue.

This gives to us a clear and definite mandate from the people in our efforts to improve and to modernize our educational facilities. We feel that nothing stands in our way now in building a school program which will meet the needs of our youth for years to come. You, the voters, are to be commended for your fine cooperation.

Plans are now being studied in detail by us and by our architects. The bonds have to be certified by the Attorney General. This usually takes about 30 days. Then the bonds are sold to the bidder offering the lowest rate of interest. After that, a contract is let to the lowest and best bidder for the buildings. When all this is completed the actual construction begins. We think this will be sometime in August. Completion should be in time for us to move in when school begins in September 1966.

We are happy to inform you that next term Miss Ann McMurtry will be employed full time as our music teacher.

May I take this time to thank you, the parents and patrons of Wheeler school for your wonderful cooperation in helping to make this one of the banner years in my professional life. Our students have excelled in all areas and have excelled in all areas of our program. We say to all of you—Thank You.

The present gym will be remodeled to fit the present needs of the school. New dressing rooms will be added and the gym will undergo repairs and alterations at a cost of \$41,500.

The bond election set aside \$30,200 for equipment in the new building includes

auditorium seats, stage equipment and cafeteria equipment and furniture and equipment. This equipment will be in addition to the \$25,000 to \$35,000 worth of equipment which has been added to the Wheeler school system within the past few years.

\$15,625 has been set aside for Landscaping, curb and gutters, parking area, paving and added space for track and field.

Construction of these facilities is expected to be completed before the 1966-67 school term with the present buildings being removed the following summer.

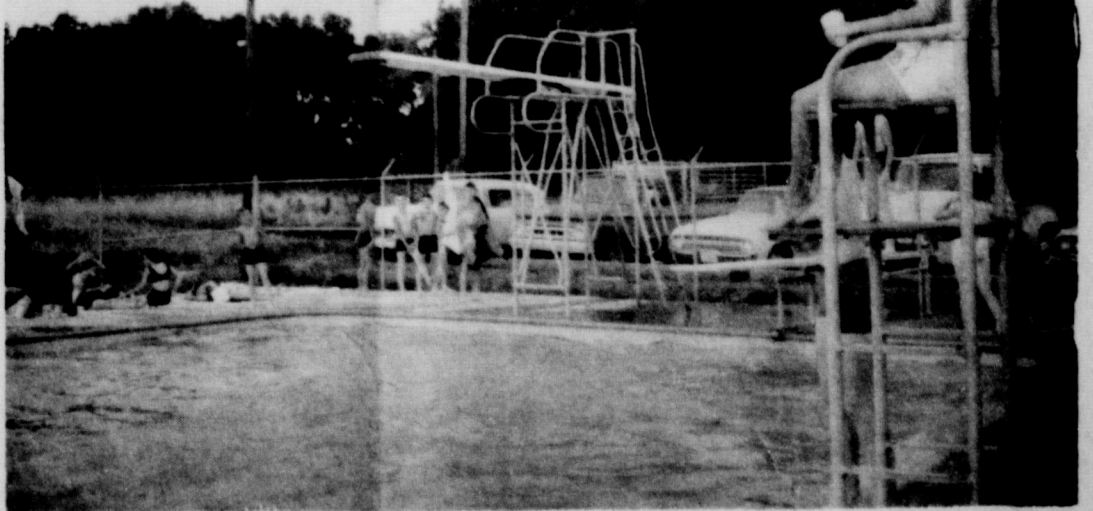

Pending Bill Is Threat to Economy

Wheeler County Farmers Union representative testified before the house ag. Committee in Washington D. C. May 17 on the economic condition of Wheeler county farmers and of the serious threat to farmers an businessmen in dryland area that would exist under Title VI of the farm bill dealing with the sale and transfer of allotments.

This part of the bill if passed would permit a person to sell his allotments of cotton to the highest bidder with the buyer being allowed to transfer these allotments to another part of the state.

The Farmers Union representative pointed out that tenant farmers who rent several farms in order to have an economic unit would be in danger of having these allotments sold out from under him.

Every acre of cotton in Wheeler county produces \$60 to \$100 gross income. So every acre lost cuts into every business in our county. With loss of cotton allotments additional tax burden would be shifted to other sources to pay for our schools and hospitals.

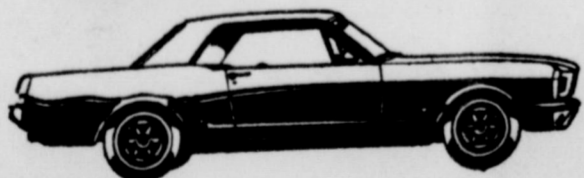

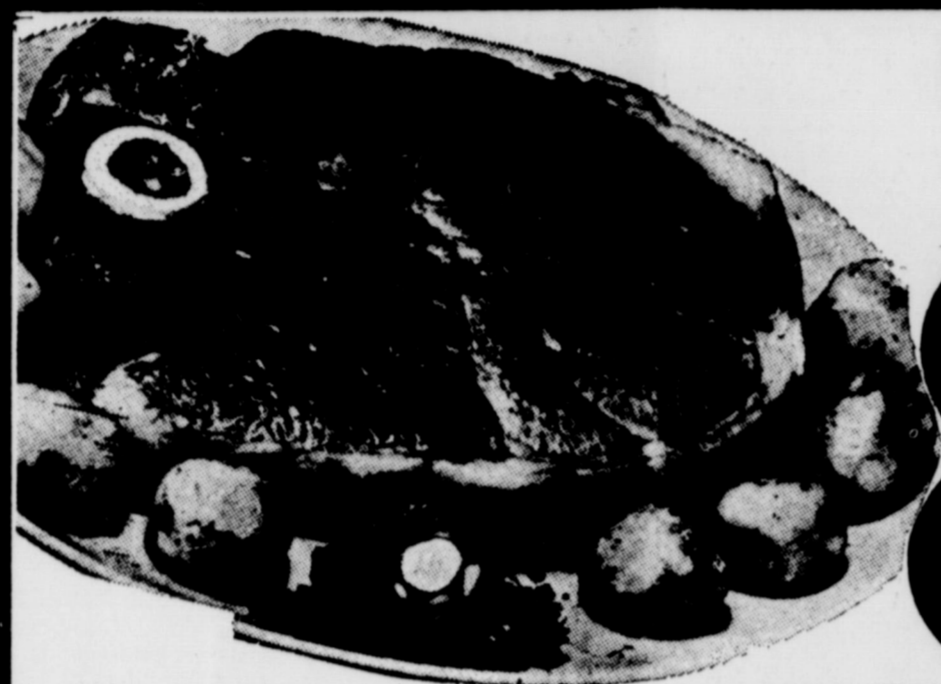

Civil Defence Q's & A's

Q. How can we be sure what area will be hit by fallout?
A. We Can't. We could not be sure of the area of fallout even if we knew where the explosions might occur because of the many variables such as wind, size, etc. This is why we all need to be prepared.
Q. Why are we no longer planning to evacuate people to a safe place?
A. Actually, certain emergency evacuation is included in our total civil defense plans. The development of new bomb delivery techniques will not give time to evacuate large urban centers. However, after the initial emergency, it may be necessary to move some people to safer places but protection should be sought first where you are or nearby. People who have

been caught in large city 5:00 traffic will understand that mass evacuation in a few minutes is impossible.
Q. Why should I prepare and stock my own shelter when the government is marking and stocking public shelters?
A. For many reasons, public shelters are not available or will not meet the needs of may of our people in a large number of our Texas counties there are no buildings that meet the specifications for government shelters and government stockpiles. In these areas and in all rural areas, families or groups of families need to develop their own shelter. Even in Urban areas more family shelters are badly needed for adequate protection.
Q. Should fallout protection be included in the design of new houses and barns?
A. Definitely. It will be easy to develop dual purpose shelters at little extra cost with proper planning for new construction.
