RODEO-BARBECUE BIG SUCCESS

Two thousand people were served barbecue Thursday night, the first night of the 11th annual Wheeler Riding Club Rodeo. The huge success of the parade, barbecue and rodeo was the result of the combined efforts of the Riding Club, Chamber of Commerce and a host of willing other workers.

The afternoon parade, the largest in several years, formed a block east of the stop light.

The parade went down main street and turned to pass in front of Parkview hospital. May Don Earney served as announcer for the parade of several riding clubs 3 covered wagons, a clown, three trucks from Luttrell Trucking Company, Elsie's Borden train from Amarillo, two antique cars, a car by the Rainbow Girls and a car for Modern Woodmen.

Trophies were awarded to Riding Clubs: first - Beckham Wranglers; second - Reydon, Okla. and third - Boys Ranch. Wagon Trains: first - Reydon, second - Pampa; Floats: first - Bardsen; second - McIntire's antique cars, Dodge and Ford Modern Woodmen car, third.

The serving of barbecue by Chamber of Commerce members began at 5:30. The 2000 receiving generous helpings of barbecue, sauce, beans, pickles, onions, apple sauce, bread and tea or coffee were served through two lines in two hours. The barbecued beef was prepared by John Hodges.

The merchants of Wheeler, as they have done for eight years, furnished the food for the barbecue. Required for the feed were 1500 lbs. of beef of which 1450 lbs. was served. Mrs. J.B. Oglesby with the aid of Sheila Guynes prepared 150 pounds of beans.

Others helping with the serving and preparations were: Fat Moore and Johnnie Reed in charge of the tea. Loyd Davidson prepared the

coffee. Otis Reid hauled the beans from the cafeteria to the rodeo grounds and helped with the serving.

The Riding Club extended thanks to a number of people. Jerry Earnest with Meads Fine Bread furnished the

bread for the barbecue. Coy Revious was in charge of the gate. Dan Luttrell furnished a truck of water for use at the barbecue. K.D. Ford hauled stock water and wet down the parking areas and rodeo arena to keep

down the dust. Wheeler Lumber furnished the truck for the speakers stand, Don Earney announced at the parade and barbecue. Rev. C.M. Abercrombie and Rev. Billy Ferguson offered the invocations. Red Meadows, Floyd Davidson, Truman Bradstreet and Robert Shugart handled the stripping shutes. Robert Shugart was recognized for light maintenance. Earl Barnes did a lot of work getting the lights ready for the rodeo. Sheriff Bus Norman, Deputy Doyle Ramsey and Deputy John Topper did an excellent job of policing activities.

Jim Wright, Chamber of Commerce president gave us the following list of workers in the serving of the barbecue, Ocie Ford and R.J. Holt, Jr., Hiram Whitener, Thurman Rives, Louis Stas, Leonard Gaines, Don Earney, Bill Owen, David Cross, Jodie Johnson, Charlotte Coward, Walter Dunn and Carroll Warren.

The Wheeler Riding Club is to be commended for the excellent job of organizing and putting on the rodeo and barbecue. Parade Marshals were Earl Barnes and Russell Hull. Directors were Owen Jones, Bus Walker, Bob Hutchison, Russell Hull and Earl Barnes.

The Rodeo fans certainly enjoyed the new and repaired leathers. The credit for the bleachers goes to Raymond Burks, Russell Hull and Coy Revious.

USE OF PEACHES

By Vivian Warminski

Now is the time of the year that peaches are plentiful. Peaches are not only good to eat but are also relatively low in calories, very high in Vit. A content, store easily and can be served in many ways.

Try this Fresh Peach Pie: 1 small (6 oz.) can fresh frozen orange juice 1 cup sugar 1 T. Cornstarch 1 t. almond flavoring 3 large fresh peaches 1 baked pastry shell 1/2 c. whipping cream flavored to taste with sugar and vanilla.

Dilute orange juice with 2 cups water, add sugar and cornstarch. Cook until thickened and bubbling. Add Almond flavoring. Remove from heat and cool slightly. Slice fresh peeled peaches into pre-baked pie shell. Cover with filling and let stand for about 1 hour. Cover with whipped cream and serve. Garnish top with sliced peaches if desired.

If you are in a hurry and need a quick delicious dessert try this!

Floating Peach Pie: 1 cup flour 1/2 cup sugar 2 tsp. baking powder 1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 cup sweet milk Mix all together well and pour into a deep baking dish.

1 pt. peaches 2/3 c. sugar 3 T. butter 1/8 cinnamon or nutmeg 1 tsp. sugar Heat fruit and sugar to dissolve sugar. Pour over the batter and dot with butter and sprinkle with sugar and spice. Bake at 375 F. 30 to 40 minutes. Batter rises to top and forms a nice crust. It's quick.

Peaches packed in either syrup or sugar make an excellent frozen product.

Follow these general directions for packing fruit in syrup. Make up syrup ahead of time so it will be ready and cold when you need it. Peaches are best packed in a 40 percent syrup--3 cups sugar to 4 cups of water. This amount makes about 5 1/2 cups of syrup. You need about 2 3/4 cup of syrup for each pint container of peaches. For frozen peaches with better color and flavor, add ascorbic acid to each quart of syrup.

Pit peaches and peel them by hand for the best looking product. Peaches peel more quickly if they are dipped first in boiling water, then cold, but have ragged edges after thawing.

Pour about 1/2 cup cold water into each pint container. Slice peaches directly into containers.

Add syrup to cover peaches. Leave 1/2 inch head space at top of wide-mouth pint containers for the expansion

of fruit during freezing.

Put a small piece of parchment paper on top of fruit to keep peaches down in syrup. Seal and Label.

W.M. LOHBERGER TO BE HONORED

W.M. Lohber, a resident of Wheeler County since 1905 will be honored by his family Sunday afternoon at the Briscoe Cafeteria from 3 to 5 p.m. Mr. Lohberger will observe his 90th birthday July 26. Mr. Lohberger's friends are invited to attend.

W.M. "Bill" Lohberger came to Texas in September 1905 by Sante Fe train from Grawin Iowa to Canadian. The J.G. Brown Lang Company showed him the land in the north part of Wheeler County. He took an option on two sections. Later he went to Amarillo, Plainview, and Hale Center and took an option on two sections at Hale Center, finally deciding on the land in Wheeler County.

He brought his wife, Clara and brother Clarence from Iowa. They freighted lumber and put up a shop 10x12' with a dirt floor. They lived in the shop while building their house.

A cowboy called "Big Henry," who always had five blue hounds with him told them about a good spring of water a mile and half north of the house. Before that, their water supply was hauled in barrels from Gageby Creek.

While still living in the "shop", Mrs. Lohberger was along one day, when a herd of 20 wild bulls smelled the meat barrels which were salted down and standing close to the door; they were fighting each other to get to the salt. She got the 12 gauge shot gun and shot at them until they went away. The shack was so flimsy, if one had hit it hard enough, it would have collapsed.

Four sections were fenced, but ranchers tore down fences when they wanted to go through. The old trail went on the north part of the place and the freighters hat-

ed to make a new trail. The house was started in March of 1906. Lumber, wire, posts and nails were freighted from Canadian, which was a two day trip. They always stayed at Uncle Dick Bussell's wagon yard for food and shelter.

Three hundred acres were broken out with 10 mules that spring and planted. Seed and feed corn was bought from Jesse West, famous outlaw. Mr. Lohberger recalls grass being high all over the country.

Fire guards were plowed around the lumber for the house, the well and the shop. The last big fire in Wheeler County started close to Wellington in fall of 1906. It could be seen three or four nights before coming across the prairie. It went around and over the fire guards at the Lohbergers. Smoke and Cinders were blown into the "shop" where three people huddled with wet sheets around them. The fire went on to burn out at the Canadian River, leaping across Gageby Creek and the Washita River.

Mr. Lohberger recalls buying 15 sows from Mr. Stanley, who lived at what is now Wheeler. He was in a 16 foot wagon and before he got home with them, he had a gunny sack of new born pigs.

In the fall of 1906, Mr. Lohberger bought the first steam engine and thresher ever in Wheeler County. It was shipped by train from Iowa and unloaded at Miami, so he would not have to cross Yashita River and Gageby Creek. A special platform had to be constructed for the big engine to be unloaded.

Bill also had the second car ever registered in Wheeler County. By this time, twenty-eight gates were open-

ed between his house and Canadian. Many a team away at the sight of this strange vehicle.

In the winter of 1911, 1912, snow blocked the roads for many weeks and they were low on supplies and had had no mail weeks. A neighbor, John Largent and Mr. Lohberger, six mules to a wagon and finally made it to Wheeler. They brought back 11 sacks of mail which they took to the Blair Post Office (located halfway between Allamore and Briscoe) the next day.

Dr. Joss, who lived five miles west of the post office was the mail carrier. He was with Judge Reese Ewing now U.S. Supreme Court Justice Marvin Jones were frequent guests in the Lohberger home.
