Wheeler Wins Toss To Break 3-Way Tie for District

WHEELER MUSTANGS END SEASON

Only 2:23 remained on the clock as Gary Hardcastle got into the ball from the end zone 16 but Campbell threw high and blocked the attempted field goal and brought Mustang hopes to a halt. The Bronchos prevailed by a 7-6 margin.

Wheeler was forced to catch up and although they were inside the Clarendon 20 on four different occasions, they were able to pay dirt only once.

The game was one of big plays with Clarendon getting a touchdown on a big play the Mustangs making big plays all over the field but being bagged down when they got close to the goal.

The loss by the Mustangs, caused by an overflow of Clarendon, left the Mustangs in a three way tie for the championship and the Mustangs had to settle for a tie with Clarendon.

Clarendon won the game Saturday morning to retain the district in a bid to win the championship.

A better fate was due the Mustangs as they controlled the game throughout the game with 74 offensive plays and 36 by Clarendon but were thwarted by the stingy defense when it counted.

After an exchange of punts in the game the Mustangs had the ball on their 45 yard line and proceeded to drive 75 yards in 18 plays to Clarendon 20 where a first field goal attempt the night fell short.

The Mustangs were able to make six first downs on three touchdowns in this drive but could not penetrate the necessary yardage at Clarendon 20 and had to settle for a field goal attempt.

Moving the pigskin to the Clarendon 35 the Mustangs faced second and thirteen when Gardner drove through his left side driving back trap play and drove 56 yards for the touchdown breaking the scoring tie in the game with 5:34 to go in the first half. Archie kicked the ball through the uprights for what proved to be the winning margin.

In the second half of play the Mustangs really played ball control as Clarendon mustered only eight plays from scrimmage in the last two quarters until the final field goal attempt.

Tommy Wiley put the Mustangs in business right in the second half kickoff when he intercepted a pass and returned it to the Mustang 45 yard line and drove 45 yards for the first and goal from that distance. Two wide plays and

one try at the middle netted a minus four and Clarendon took over at the 8 as a fourth down pass was incomplete.

Forcing the Bronchos to punt the Mustangs got excellent field position with the ball on the Clarendon 37. The Mustangs hooked up and this time were not to be denied in their drive for pay dirt. Staying inside the Mustangs moved to the Clarendon 14 for a first down with Fred Good getting the call on all but one of the plays. From the 14 Rives was held for no gain and Good got a couple to the 12. Vanpool got 3 more and was injured on the play and it left the Mustangs facing fourth and five. Good rammed his way through the Mustangs right side and got the first down on the 4. Rives moved to the 1 and Ware got the TD with a quarterback sneak with 7:49 to play in the game. Going for two points and the lead, Good was thrown just short of the goal and the Bronchos held their one point lead.

Clarendon apparently recovered the onside kick but Wiley knocked the ball carrier off the ball and Bob Stiles recovered on the Clarendon 35. The fired up Mustangs seemed destined to pull the game out in the final minutes as they rammied down to the Clarendon 12. Three plays mustered only 6 yards and the ill fated field goal attempt came on fourth down and the Mustangs football season came to an end.

ACCIDENT AT PANHANDLE KILLS ONE, INJURES THREE

Panhandle - One man was killed and three seriously injured when the car in which they were riding turned over about four miles west of Panhandle on US60 Saturday night.

David Lewis Reed, 84, of Allison was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Anthony's hospital in Amarillo about 6 p.m.

Richard Allen Losee, 19, of Amarillo Air Force Base is listed in serious condition. He was the driver of the car, according to highway patrolman, Paul Little and Ray

Finstad, investigating officers.

Richard D. Johnson, 19 of AAFB, is also listed in serious condition at St. Anthony's.

David R. Morse, 20, a cowboy from Allison is listed in critical condition at St. Anthony's according to the officers.

The Losee car apparently went out of control coming over a hill on the highway and overturned twice throwing the occupants from the car, according to the accident report.



INSPECTION COMPLETED: Wheeler County was the first county in the panhandle to be inspected and declared free of scabies. This inspection was brought about with the discovery of scabies in the plains area. The inspection began October 4, and was completed November 11. In charge of the project were W.O. Jones of the Texas Animal Health Commission and Bill Roanes of the Animal Disease Eradication Commission of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture. These men inspected a total of 44,965 head of cattle in the county, as the largest percent of each herd was checked for the mite. It is a requirement in many western states that cattle must be dipped before they can be taken into the state. Through inspections like the one completed it is hoped to eliminate the need for dipping before interstate transportation of cattle from this area. Mr. Roanes and Mr. Jones thanked Charles Jackson, the commissioner; O.W. Pendleton, Shelby Pettit, Clois Hanner and Ernest Henderson and Judge Hefley for the excellent cooperation. The men stated the cooperation received from these men and the area cattlemen helped speedup the operation.

Roanes and Jones went from Wheeler to Canadian where they met with the Hemphill County Agent, Commissioners and Judge Monday. Inspection was expected to begin there Tuesday. VOTERS TO DECIDE ON PAVING TUESDAY

Taxes Will Not Be Raised For Financing

All qualified voters in Wheeler are urged to go to the polls Tuesday and cast their vote on the proposed paving project.

The Voters will actually be voting (For) or (Against) the issuance of \$110,000 Street Improvement Bonds and the levy of the tax in payment thereof.

If the election carries the city will begin the paving program immediately, with engineering and survey work to be done this winter and the actual paving to begin next spring.

The wording on the ballot is a little confusing because it says in part, "and the levy of the tax in payment thereof. This does not mean that the taxes will be raised according to Mayor Don Earney. This is the wording which is re-

quired in any Street Improvement Bond Election Earney said.

The City plans to pave 84 blocks and the entire program will cost approximately \$300,000 which includes paving, curb and gutter, surveying, engineering costs and a new bridge across the creek west of the swimming pool.

The city will pay one-third (1/3) of the cost and each of the property owners will pay one-third (1/3).

As an example Mayor Don Earney pointed out that a property owner with a 50' frontage would be assessed \$195.00 or \$3.90 per front foot which could be paid in four equal installments of \$48.75 per year plus interest on the last three payments. The first payment would be due 10 days after acceptance of the paving job by the city, the remaining three payments to become due annually.

Mayor Earney stated flatly that, "The taxes will not be raised," but the money must come from someplace so the council has decided to raise the minimum water rate from \$2.00 per 3,000 gallons to \$3.00 and the minimum sewer rate from \$1.50 to \$2.50. This will bring in approximately \$12,000.00 per year which is sufficient to pay off the city's portion of the paving program in 15 years.

Earney pointed out that several of the surrounding towns are currently going through paving programs and in each instance the city's share of the cost is less than 20%. This, of course, forces the property owners to pay a much larger share of the paving.

By raising the water and sewer rate and not the taxes, everyone will participate in the program. In the past, the entire burden of paving programs - water and sewer improvements have been put on the city property owner. Under the current program everyone with a water and sewer connection will help pay for the paving.

The Council has extended an invitation to everyone to express their opinions and suggestions on the program.

He was preceded in death by 5 brothers and one sister.

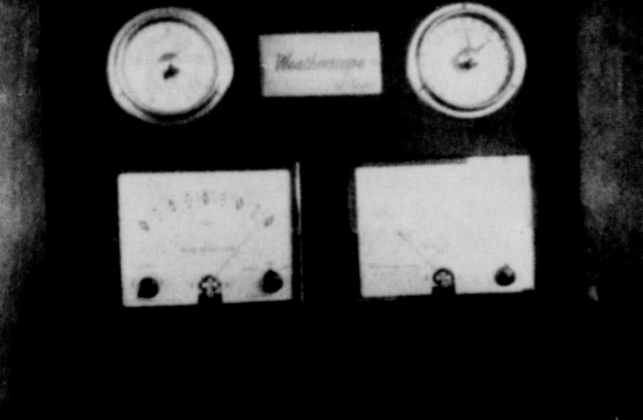

Change in Policy On Mail

Postmaster, Virgil Jamison of Wheeler, today announced that henceforth all first class mail, person sound recordings (voice letters) and parcels weighing 5 lbs or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under public law 89-775--The Dulski Military Mail Act--which was signed by President Johnson on November 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis. Postmaster Jamison explained that parcels weighing

5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation with in the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the Post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail). This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco Concentration Center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Postmaster Jamison also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, through they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than December 1. Air-

mail, he said, should be sent no later than December 10.

As the citizens of the town were asked to come and discuss the paving with the City Council, I personally would like to discuss it with the citizenry of the town.

As we were told that it would not raise our taxes; it would be added onto the water and sewer bill. That would be like a man taking a dose of poison. It would not matter whether he took it accidentally or on purpose, it would be the same to him.

Think friends, \$300,000 debt on our population would be almost \$300.00 for every man, woman and child inside the incorporate limit of the city.

I have been living in Wheeler for somewhat over 40 years, all of that time, I have heard of the city's plan to attract industry. Friends, the only way to get industry in our town is to make it profitable for them to locate here. Look a little farther ahead; the time will come when we will have to have new water system or add more wells or more pumps or other facilities. Where will the money come from. I cannot see where the town could stand another bond election. We are bonded to the limit now. Raise water and sewers to pay for paving, raise taxes to pay for more water? I don't get it.

There are a lot of lots in this town that are not worth the \$3.90 per foot which the paving would cost the owner. I was talking to a man who happens to have 300 feet to be paved. It would cost him \$1170.00 for paving. He is a retired man on social security. The water and sewer rates are raised to help pay the city's cost; why is going to help this man pay that \$1170.00. Besides, he will pay as much as anyone else in water bills.

We have a number of old folks that have moved to Wheeler and bought cheap homes, who can just barely get by on their retirement. Is it right to place such a burden on these people?

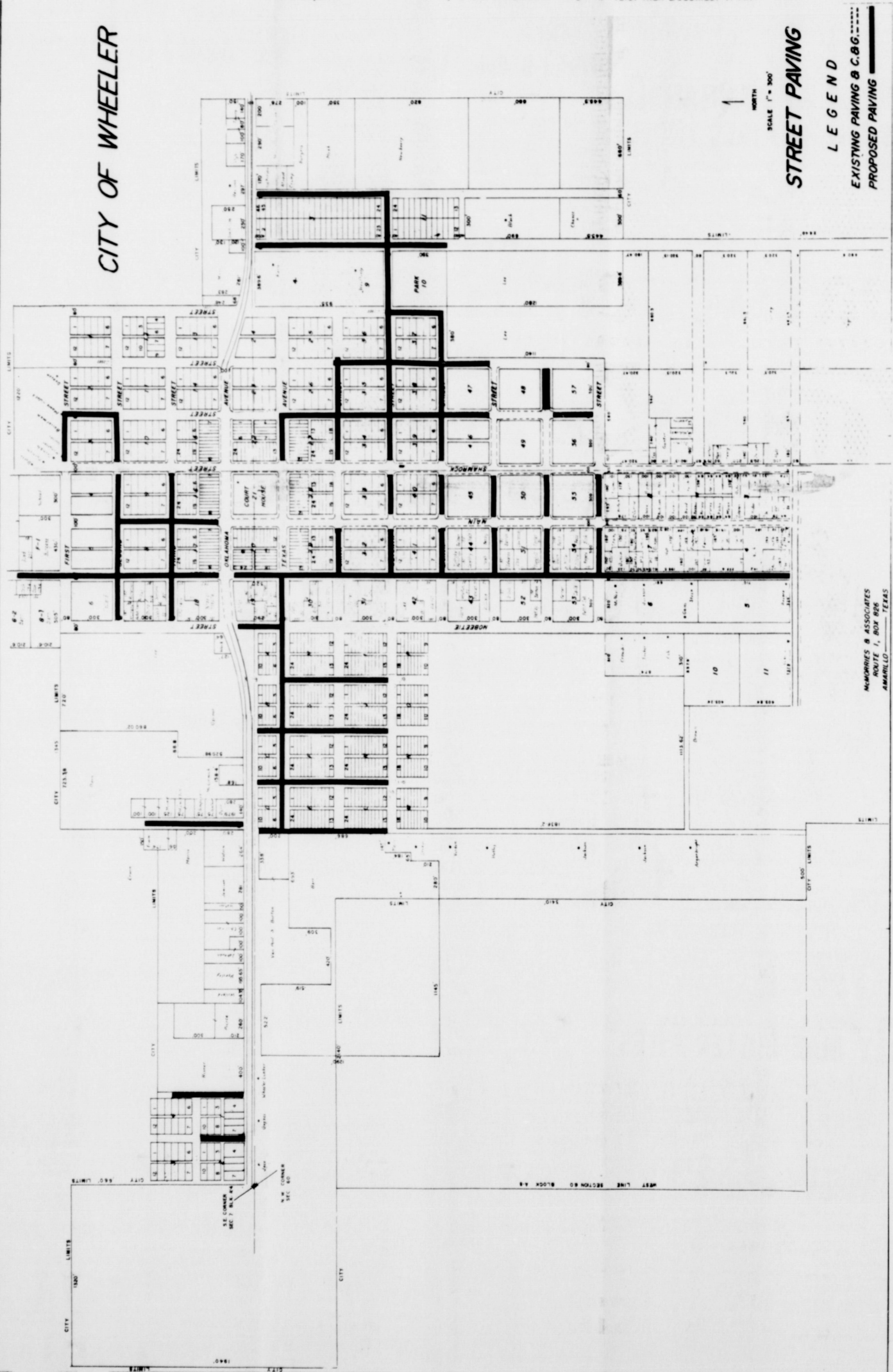
If every property owner were assessed \$1,000 or \$1,200 for this paving, do you think for a moment that it would pass? NO!

Preparing Game Foods

By Vivian C. Warminski

Now is the time of year that sportsmen test their skills in hunting wild game. Game foods properly dressed and prepared can add pleasant variety to the family menu.

Some of the more popular game birds in this area include ducks, geese, dove, turkey and quail.

Most hunters agree that dry plucking rather than skinning conserves flavor and moisture in quail, doves and turkeys.

All game birds should be dressed as soon as possible following the kill. Aging at a temperature just above freezing for 24 to 48 hours generally removes some of the gamey flavor which might detract from eating pleasure.

Duck meat is at its best when served rare. If well done meat is desired, additional cooking time should be given, taking care not to overcook and toughen the birds. Meat of wild duck is dark and drier than domestic

Roasted Wild Duck

1½ lbs. duck
2 c. quartered apples
1 slice of onion
2 teaspoon salt
¼ t. pepper

Clean duck and wash thoroughly. Fill the duck with peeled quartered apples. Truss duck. Rub with a slice of onion, then with salt and pepper. Roast uncovered at 325 degrees F. allowing 20 to 30 minutes per pound.

Another very popular small bird is the quail. Quail meat is white and also tends to be dry.

Roasted Quail with Mushrooms

4 quail
4 slices bacon
1 T. butter
Juice of half lemon
½ cup hot water
1/3 ounce mushrooms

Wipe quail inside and out. Bind each bird with a slice of bacon. Put birds into a buttered pan and roast at 350 degrees F. basting occasionally, about 30 minutes. Remove birds, add butter, water and lemon juice to drippings in pan stirring to make a gravy. Serve birds on toast with gravy poured over them.


