MUSTANGS SCORE SECOND DISTRICT WIN

Leading by only one touchdown at halftime, the Wheeler Mustangs lit the offensive fires in the second half and routed the Mustangs from Claude 57-6 last Friday night on Nicholson Field.

The win left the Mustangs with a perfect record in district play with two games remaining to determine the champion.

Wheeler's first four touchdowns came from breaks that gave them the ball each time inside the Claude 30 yard line. Although the breaks aided the local crew, the old axiom is that a good team will make the breaks.

Early in the second period, the Mustangs recovered the first of three fumbles they got from Claude as Goad fell on the pigskin after a punt was fumbled at the Claude 17 by Clayton. On the second play Goad tore off right tackle for the final 15 yards. Vanpool got the two pointer around his right end.

Trailing by eight, Claude roared back following the kickoff and drove to the Wheeler 7 and that was as far as they could get as a tenacious defense threw back this challenge and Wheeler took over at the 8 yard line.

The second half was only two plays old when Goad recovered another Claude fumble and 24 yards lay between the Mustangs and paydirt. Pounding at the inner defenses of Claude the Mustangs pushed over for their second TD in six plays with Jamison going the final 8 yards on a keeper at right tackle. Goad got the two points at left tackle.

Hunter recovered another fumbled punt at the visitors 19 to put Wheeler in striking distance once more and the Mustangs were quick to take advantage by scoring in three plays with Rives getting the tally from the 6 as Hardcastle and Holt opened a gap off left tackle. This time the run attempt failed on the extra point try.

Claude couldn't move with the ball and had to punt but it never came off as Rives broke through and smashed the punter to the ground at the Claude 4. Goad rode the back of Sechrist and Wiley to power over on the next play and the Mustangs took a 28 point lead into the final 12 minutes.

Continuing to pour it on, the Mustangs came into possession via the interception route as Goad intercepted a Campbell pass on the 25 and returned it to the Claude 12. Moving to the 9 in three plays the Mustangs went to the field goal try on 4th down and Hardcastle calmly booted a 29 yard field goal with Vanpool holding.

Having a 31 point margin the Mustangs had a 24 yard drive as the longest scoring march in building up the lead.

Wheeler finally had to make a sustained drive for a score shortly after their field goal and from that point on the points came thick and fast. Taking over on an out of bounds punt at their 40 the Mustangs moved the sixty yards to paydirt in eight plays with Vanpool getting 31 big yards on a scamper around the right side as that

The No. 2 team in the state Class A rankings is the White Deer Bucks and the Wheeler Mustangs will do battle with that aggregation this Friday night at 7:30 on the Bucks home field.

Returning a veteran club from their state finals team of last year the Bucks have been overwhelming their opponents this year with their big tailback, Vernon Marlar leading the way.

White Deer not only has a high scoring club but has one of the best, if not the best defense in the state. Boys Ranch has been the only club that has crossed the Buck goal line and they were able to do it only one time.

Coach Hill reported that the Mustangs will be handicapped by various injuries with Hunter, Hutchison Goad and Ware all nursing injuries but expected to play. Frankie Rogers is a doubtful performer as the result of a knee injury suffered in the Claude contest.

"If we are to stay on the field with the Bucks, our defense is going to have to play the toughest it has in two years and we sure can't wait until the last half to decide to play ball," Hill said. "Not only has White Deer got a fine club but they have tremendous pride and this is something all real good clubs have," Coach Hill went on to say.

The McLean Cubs were the victims 30-8 as the Wheeler Colts evened up their season's record last Thursday night at McLean. Using a varied and consistent offense teamed with improved defensive play the Colts were in command of the contest from the opening kickoff.

The Colts had the ball one time in each of the first two quarters and scored each time and had a 16-8 lead at the half.

This win gave Coach Gaines' crew a 2 win and 2 loss record and a tie with Lefors in their five games played to date.

McLean gave up the ball on downs at their 47 following the kickoff and the Colts swept in for their first TD with 2:05 to go in the quarter. Britt got the touchdown from the 2 at left end and Cole added two more points going over right guard.

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QUICK-DRAW CONTEST ENDS IN MURDER CHARGE

A charge of murder with premeditation was filed Monday afternoon against a 20 year old Wheeler youth involved in a quick draw contest that cost the life of Dale Satterfield, 20, of Amarillo.

Riley Bradstreet, was charged before Wheeler County Justice of the Peace J. Guyones on the charge of murder filed by city attorney, Guy Hardin of Shamrock, who said that he felt the case should go to grand jury to decide if it was accidental.

Bradstreet told officers he, Satterfield, Gerald Dale Reynolds of Amarillo had delivered several horses to the T.O. Bradstreet farm near Wheeler Sunday and went rabbit hunting about 8 p.m.

He said that he and Satterfield decided to have a quick-draw practice with two .22 caliber revolvers.

Satterfield stood back to back and began stepping off in opposite directions and at a signal turned and drew the weapons.

Bradstreet said he thought he already had fired all seven cartridges in his revolver. Wheeler County Bus Dorman said Bradstreet's pistol had been fired seven times.

Satterfield had been shot once in the neck. An autopsy revealed he died of a severed blood artery which caused internal bleeding.

Satterfield was taken to Parkview hospital by Wright-Denson ambulance at approximately 12:45 a.m. Satterfield was dead on arrival.

At the present time, Bradstreet is free on \$5,000 bail.

A 15 yard penalty, this time for holding, moved the Mustangs back to the Wheeler 36 but the Mustangs got it all back plus plenty more as Goad was on the receiving end of a pass from Ware and 64 yards downfield was in the end zone. Hardcastle once more kicked the extra point to set the stage for his punt return that finally brought the scoring to a halt with only 37 seconds remaining in the game.

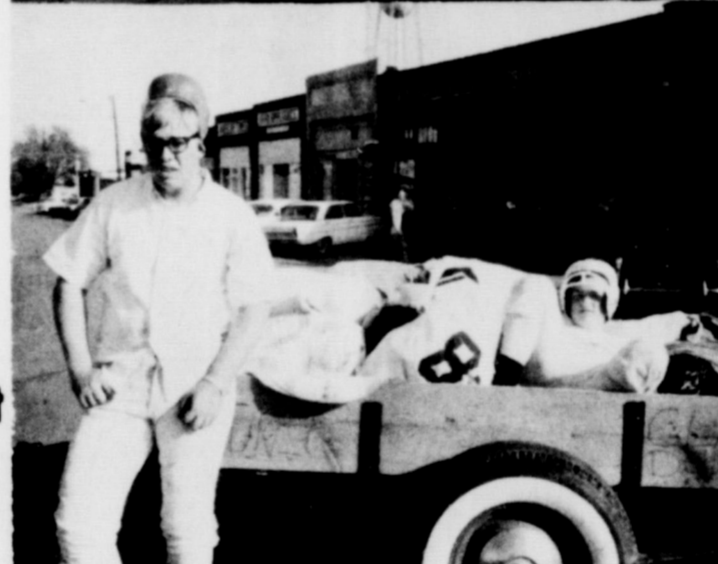

Society Pays First Triple Indemnity

"...a fare paying passenger in or upon a public conveyance being operated on a fixed or regular schedule by a common carrier to transport passengers for hire." So reads the qualifications for triple indemnity as stated in the Double and Triple Indemnity Rider attached to Modern Woodmen certificates when requested by the applicant.

On August 6, 1966, Private Eugene P. McConnell, Camp 171, Council Bluffs, Iowa was aboard the airplane which crashed near Falls City, Neb. killing all thirty-eight passengers and four crewmen.

Private McConnell was insured by a \$500 Ordinary Life certificate with double indemnity rider which had been in effect since December, 1958. (It will be remembered that the Society's Board of Directors extended the triple indemnity benefit to all contracts containing a double indemnity rider issued prior to the effective date of the triple indemnity provision January 1, 1963.)

Accordingly, Private McConnell's mother received the face amount of the certificate a full payment under the triple indemnity provision, the first such payment since the benefit first became payable.

IDEAS WITH IMAGINATION

By Vivian Warminski
 PUT YOUR IMAGINATION TO
 WORK:

Plastic bottles and Suds
 make Unique Decorations:
 Much of the pleasure of
 Christmas is designing a
 unique decoration to display
 on a mantel, piano or table.
 To get your decoration off to
 a good start, select a "medi-
 um" early in the season and
 concentrate your imagination
 on ways to use it.
 Thick soapsuds and em-
 pty plastic bottles, such as
 those from a variety of clean-
 ing products, is an ideal
 "medium" for making "some-
 thing out of nothing," so to
 speak. The basic ideas is to
 "pave" the bottles with
 thick suds made by beating
 packaged soap or detergent
 and a little water with a
 hand or electric beater. The
 consistency should be almost
 dough-like, thick enough to
 hold its shape easily. Just a
 little preliminary experimen-
 ting will make you an expert

on this phase.
 Now look around on the
 bottles on your shelves or
 those already empty and sav-
 ed for craft projects and let
 your imagination roam. With
 the right trimmings, one type
 lends itself to a stylized ver-
 sion of the three wise men.
 Beards can be fashioned from
 crinkle ribbon, a turban of
 gauze, a crown of foil and
 so forth. Another plastic
 bottle suggests a row of choir
 boys with paper lace doilies
 covering their "shoulders"
 and small song books tucked
 into suds hands. Choose a
 number of different bottles to
 create a family in turn-of-the-
 century costume with a bar-
 chester father carrying
 home the christmas tree.
 Mother is dainty in her long
 dress of molded suds decora-
 ted with sequins. Another
 bottle can be turned into
 an impish angel with tattered
 foil wings and halo set askew.
 With an idea of the effect
 you want to achieve, you are

ready to go to work. First,
 coat the bottle with the thick
 suds, applying the mixture
 more heavily where neces-
 sary to form a gown, robe or
 cloak. Smooth and shape this
 "frosting" with a small
 spatula, wooden stick, tooth-
 pick or fingertips dampened
 with water to prevent stick-
 ing.

Start the head by making
 a soapsuds ball of appropri-
 ate size and fitting it over the
 bottle cap. Again smooth and
 shape as desired. Add more
 suds to form arms and to
 "sculpt" the desired general
 shape. An extra dimension
 can be added to a partially
 dry figure by dampening the
 surface with a little water and
 "gluing" more coating in
 place. Facial features and
 other trims can also be
 applied this way. Toothpicks
 are helpful in placing small
 foil shapes, available at
 notion counters for eyes and
 mouth.

Beards, hair, headgear
 and other accessories can
 be attached with straight
 pins after the figure is dry.

Demure eyelashes can be
 made from small wedges of
 foil snipped eyelash fash-
 ion, halfway up, curled and
 inserted into the damp suds.
 When the figure is completely
 dry, it may be colored with
 tempera paints or let the
 whiteness of the suds-snow
 serve as a highlight to the
 colorful trims.



Selecting the Right Irrigation

By John Jackson, area engineer

The primary purpose of irrigation is to supply crops with the needed amount of water at the right time. Irrigated agriculture is an intensive investment. The productivity of the soil must be such that increased returns will more than off-set the added expense. Some of the soil characteristics that need to be considered are: depth, texture, permeability, available moisture capacity, fertilizer and organic matter.

For the sprinkler and flood type irrigation systems, relative elevations of the water source and the various portions of the field to be irrigated are important in determining feasibility of irrigation, type of system and location of control structures.

The sprinkler system is generally used on the sandier soils and water is applied at a rate less than the intake of the soil.

The flood type or surface irrigation system generally is well suited to the fine textured soils. The slope of the land should be considered to determine rate of application, length and direction of runs. This method is not recommended on slopes which cause excess erosion. Drilled crops such as alfalfa or grass may be irrigated on steeper slopes than row crops.

Our underground water can be exhausted and the best possible use should be made of it. A well designed and operated irrigation system will eliminate excessive water loss. An irrigation system must be designed to fit the specific condition under which it is to be used. Soil Conservation Service Technicians are available to help any district cooperators in the planning, design and operation of any type of irrigation system.

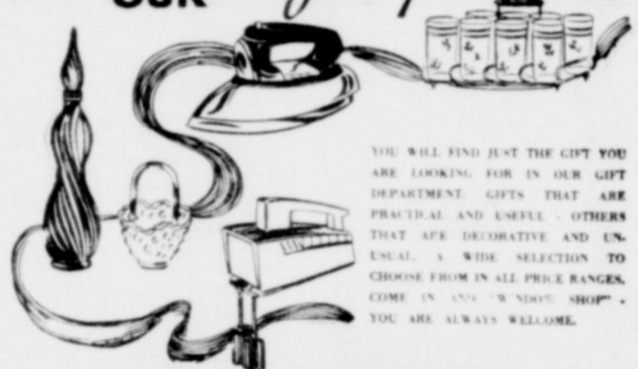

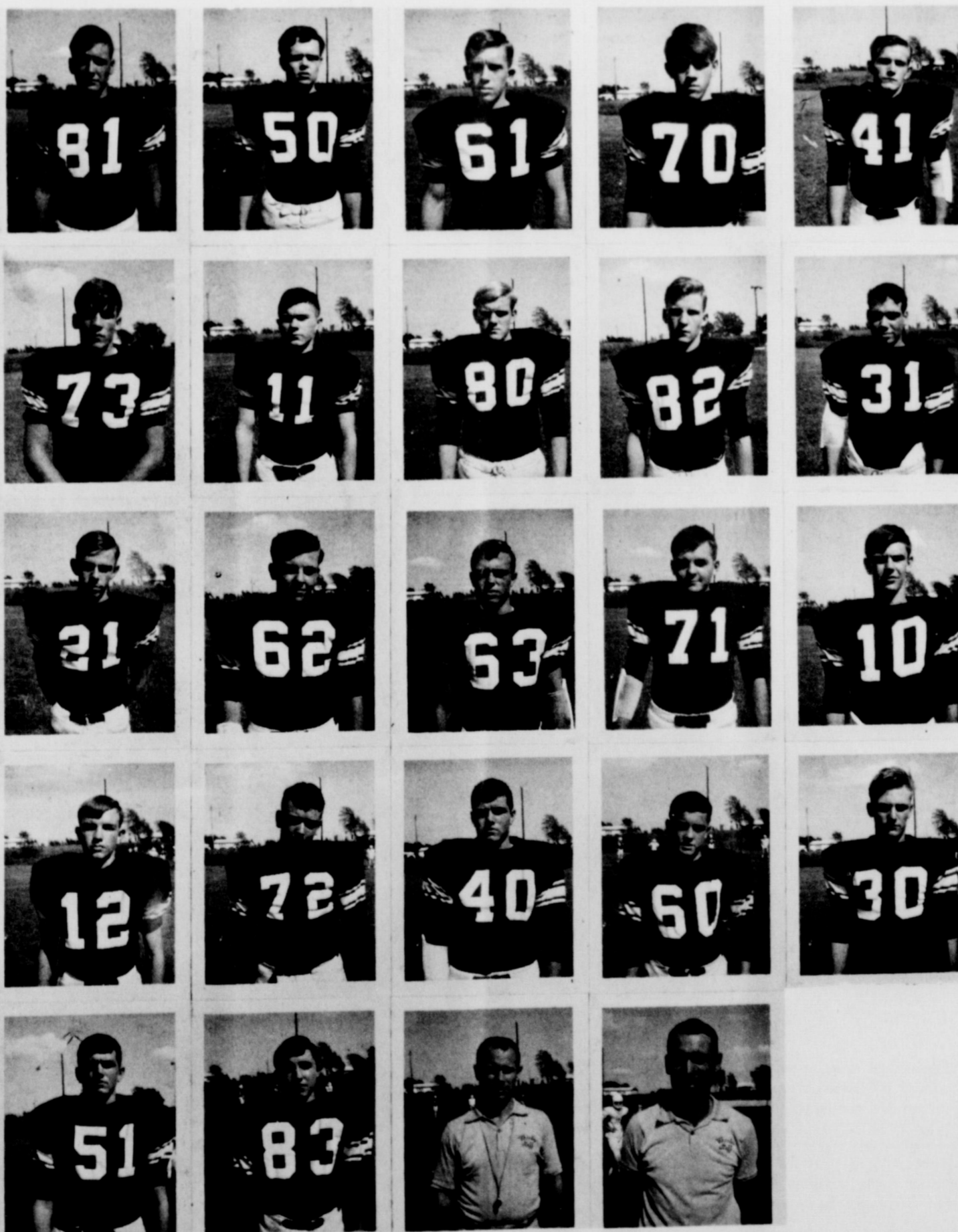

CROP CONDITIONS

Jack Frost or an early freeze has certainly dampened crop prospects for some Wheeler County farmers. Many farmers have late cotton and feed and these are the ones that have been hit the hardest. The frost that we received the night of Oct. 15 did the greatest damage in the Kelson community and low areas. Of course the frost will aid early planters that had mature cotton and needed better maturing conditions. Our average frost date is Oct. 30 and we have been receiving our first frost quite a bit later in recent years. Average dates must have a way to maintain an average and this must be one of those "Catch Up" years.

CATTLE BLOAT

An additive for use in the control of frothy bloat in cattle foraging on legume pastures has been cleared for use by the Food and Drug Administration. The additive is considered a "new drug" under the terms of the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act.

The name of the drug is Poloxalene. It is manufactured by Smith, Kline and French Laboratories, Philadelphia, Pa. The drug is recommended for use as a top dressing for cattle feed to control frothy bloat in cattle foraging on legume pastures at a dosage of 10 gm. per day for cattle weighing over one thousand pounds.

The new drug is available under the trade name "Bloat Guard." Dr. C. M. Patterson, Extension Veterinarian, states that "all of the reports received from the field regarding the use of poloxalene as described in the clearance indicate that the drug is effective in reducing bloat to a minimum."

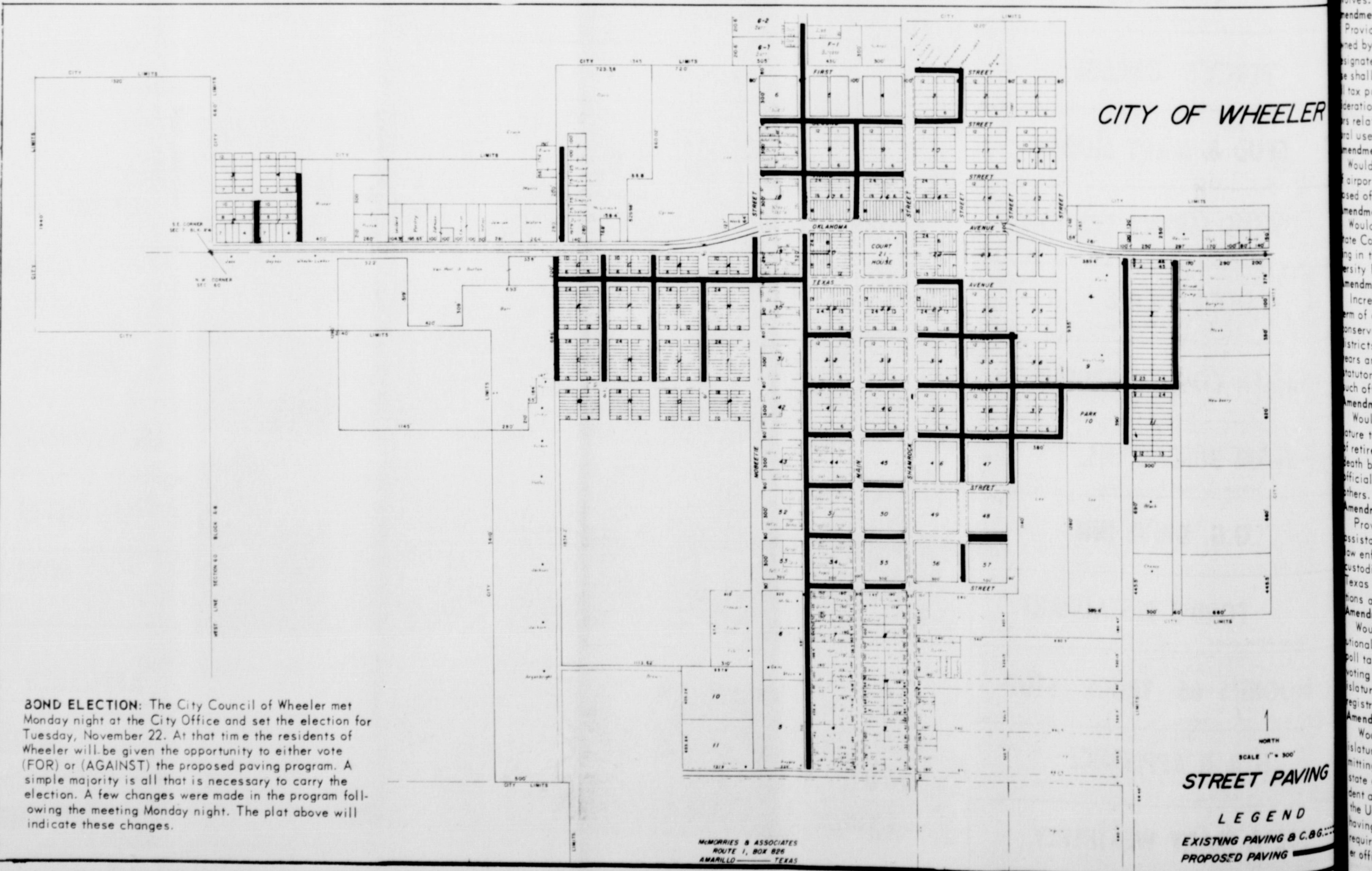
