Mr. Wofford noted the growing number of March of Dimes-supported centers where birth defect children receive superior treatment from teams of trained medical protessionals. There are now 77 of these centers in operation

In research, scientists supported by March of Dimes grants have developed ways of detecting several defects of body chemistry that can cause mental retardation, and are studying the hereditary and environmental factors which affect a baby's

development before birth. 'In addition," said Mr. Wofford, the March of Dimes is conducting a national educational program to inform ever expa

every expectant mother of th e importance of prenatal care in minimizing risks to the newborn child.

'The Mothers' March offers women the opportunity to take a personal part in the fight against birth defects, Mrs. Carroll Adams of Wheeler declared today.

"As chairman of the 1967 Mothers' March for the March of Dimes, Mrs. Adams will ii rect the activities of more than thirty volunteers who will call at homes throughout Wheeler on January 23rd at The marching mother said Mrs. Adams, "knows that her efforts will make it possible to expand the new March of Dimes prenatal care program and thereby helpm thers to reduce the risk of bearing defective babies." Funds raised this January will also provide the best medical care for children suffering from birth defects. "This problem is an enormous one," she pointed out, "because more than 250,000 ba bies are born each year in the United States with deformities evident at birth or with hidden defects which become evident during later The most serious of these cases require the type of comp ete medical care available at special March of Dimes-supported centers. At these centers, which number 77, teams of experts deal with the complex med ical, social, and economic problems caused by birth defects. "Our long-range goal--just as it was in the successful polio program -- is prevention. That is why the March of Dimes is supporting leading research scientists as they search for the causes of birth acticis and the means to protect the children of tomorrow, 'rs. Adams concluded.

reaches 60 Registration receipts must be written out by the tax assessor-collector's office staff. An application for voter registration certificate dence after the Jan. 31 deadmay be sent in if the qualified voter is unable to go to that office, but this application must be received through the mail or in person. Another individual or organization could pass out the registration certificates, but they may not be collected by that individual or organization for return to the tax office.

Registration may be made by a qualified voter only for himself, and spouse, mother, father, son or daughter. The person doing the registering for these family members must himself be a qualified voter. For example, an 18-year-old could not register for his father or

By Charles David Jackson County Agri. Agent. With the moisture shortage this fall and winter, supplemental feeding will be mighty important during the next few months. Cattlemen may be able to save some time and money by protein feeding

supplemental twice a week rather than daily feeding. In a Texas A & M University test, cattle fe a protein supplement twice a week performed just as well as those fed daily. The result from twice weekly feeding was about a 60 percent saving of labor and travel as compared to daily feeding. Feeding twice a week doesn't necessarity mean
