1000 Attend Open House At School

The Open House and Dedication of Wheeler's new school plant drew a crowd of approximately 1,000 people. The visitors had an opportunity to observe one of the most modern school plants in the Panhandle.

The school building cost \$625,988. The building houses all twelve grades, administrative offices, cafeteria and auditorium with accommodations for 500 students.

The structure is built in three levels. The grade school is located on the west end of the 410' building. The center level houses the administrative suites, cafeteria and auditorium with the east end-lower level housing the high school.

The school has many outstanding features. Each of the first five grades are self-contained. The 6th, 7th and 8th are centralized with their own library, laboratory and restroom facilities. The high school classes offer offices for department heads.

The Agriculture department has five rooms. The Class room is joined by an office for Mr. Wilks and the shop. In the large shop are a storage room and restroom facilities.

The Home Economic's Department is divided into six rooms. The kitchen is

complete with three ranges and accommodations for a washer and dryer. The department has a livingroom and a dining room for the girls to learn the art of entertaining. The sewing and classroom is joined by a fitting room complete with cosmetic table and closets. An office is available for Mrs. Whitener's use.

The auditorium is one part of the building to be enjoyed by all Wheeler's citizens. Aside from seating 500 people the large stage is joined by dressing rooms, storage and band room. The public address system in the auditorium allows a microphone to be located in three places on the stage. A stand is located at the back of the auditorium for projectors, judges, spotlights and etc.

Wheeler can proudly point to the educational facilities we now provide.

Visitors at the Open House were also given an opportunity to see the newly remodeled gymnasium which will seat 800 people and has three courts and a weight lifting room.

If for some reason you were unable to visit the school Sunday, you will again have the opportunity to visit the school during Texas Annual Public Schools week March 6-10.

In announcing the Open House, FLB Manager, Jack Corn said: "Friday, March 10 is a proud day for us and we want you to share it with us. Our modern, new offices have been designed to serve you and nothing has been left undone where your comfort and convenience are concerned. Come in next Friday and let us show you around."

The new offices, which

present an attractive, dark-red brick and glass front to the passersby, are in the J.M. Tindall Building, and were contracted for by Mr. Tindall especially for Federal Land Bank occupancy.

"We think our new offices are a credit to Shamrock and we are especially grateful to Mr. Tindall for the fine cooperation extended in the planning and completion of this project," Mr. Corn said.

The facilities include a foyer, a front office, manager's office, conference room, restroom, file room and coffee bar.

The dominant decor is nutmeg paneling and dark-red brick. Ceilings are suspended

acoustical tile in white, with recessed fluorescent lighting. Floors in the foyer, the front office and file room are embossed inlaid Armstrong linoleum in two shades of brown, complimenting the paneling.

The manager's office and the conference room floors are covered wall to wall in an apache style carpeting.

The foyer, comfortably furnished with deep green vinyl covered divan and chairs is separated from the front office by the main counter and an attractive red brick planter. An amber-based table lamp and an amber colored ceiling light fixture

are added decorative touches that lend character and beauty to the entrance lobby.

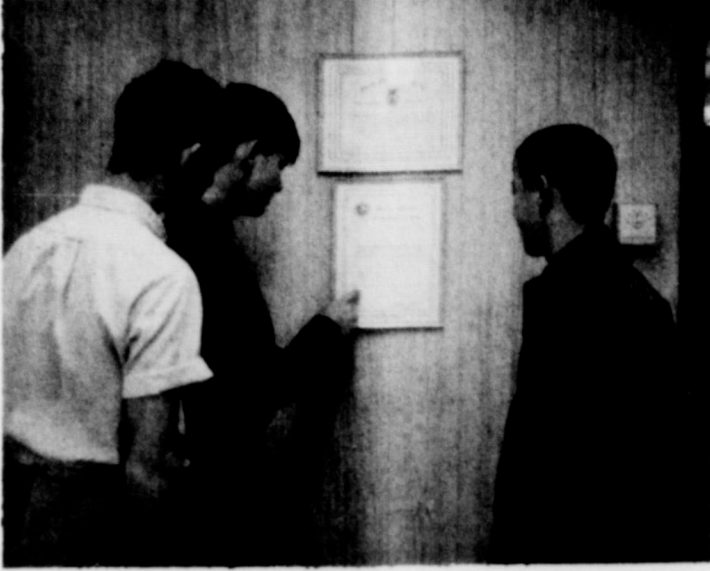

CONTROLLING BAGWORMS

One of the most economical and efficient means of controlling bagworms is by removing the bags from the trees during the winter months and destroying them.

Bagworms belong to the order--Lepidoptera--moths and butterflies. The male larvae pupate and emerge from their tapered brown bags usually during late August. The female also undergoes pupation, but being legless and wingless, she remains inside her silken bag. After mating, the females lay approximately 500 eggs inside the bag she has occupied all summer. The females then fall to the ground and die. The bag containing the eggs remains on the tree until the following spring.

If the bags are destroyed, the life cycle is broken. If not, the eggs hatch into tiny worms which begin feeding greedily on the surrounding foliage. A silken case is soon spun about the developing larvae with the front end being left open so that the larvae may extend a portion of its body from the bag to crawl about in search of foliage. Pieces of the bark and foliage are soon attached to the case for re-enforcement and camouflage.

These destructive pests prefer evergreens, but often attack deciduous shrubs and trees. Aside from destroying the overwintering stage (the eggs in their silken bags) they can be controlled with several insecticides if applications are made while the larvae are quite small. As soon as the larvae become fairly large, they are extremely hard to kill and heavy infestations will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub; at times resulting in the death of the plant.

TIME SAVING MEALS

By Vivian C. Warminski

For many homemakers these days it is necessary to get family meals on the table in a very short time. But let us remember that the health and well-being of your family is of most importance. You cannot afford to sacrifice well prepared, balanced meals and the happy social atmosphere of the family table for the time saved in cooking.

However with good management you can save time, energy and money in meal preparation and also have balanced meals with more time to enjoy your family. Learning to save time and labor in cooking will mean more time to enjoy your family. Learning to save time and labor in cooking will mean studying better methods and adopting them to suit your own situation. Plan Meals Ahead:

Meals which you can prepare in a hurry take careful planning ahead of time. Planning ahead means shopping ahead too. When storage space allows, keep the makings of two or more quick meals on hand. Shop systematically with fewer trips to the market. Plan simple desserts. Cakes and pies require much time and work in preparation but do not give good value in greater health returns. Fresh or cooked fruit, ice creams, milk and egg puddings and custards are much more healthful than pastries. Have a planning center in the kitchen where you can sit and plan menus and market orders. Keep a file of quickly prepared menus and often used recipes.

MAKE A PLAN FOR PREPARING A MEAL--ELECTRIC SKILLET MEAL
 MENU: Pork Chops with Pepper-Rice Rings; Green beans; Carrot and Raisin salad; Whole-wheat bread;

milk-coffee; Gingerbread with Apple Sauce.

In your plan; estimate how long it takes to prepare each food for cooking. Then decide how long it takes to cook each food and how these foods can fit together in the preparation. Usually it is best to start with the food that takes the longest cooking time.

The total time for preparing meal equals cooking time of longest food plus all preparation time which must take place before that. In this case 50 minutes plus 10 minutes equals 60 minutes. Vegetable, salad and dessert may be prepared and table set while main dish cooks.

ELECTRIC SKILLET MEAL--Pork Chops with Pepper-Rice Rings:
 2 tablespoons fat, 4 pork chops--3/4 inch thick; 4 onion ring slices; 4 slices green pepper; 1/4 cup quick cooking rice, 2 cups tomatoes; 1 cup chopped celery and 1 1/2 teaspoons salt.

Heat the fat at 360 deg. F. brown chops on both sides; place onion and pepper rings on each chop. Fill rings with uncooked rice; pour tomatoes around chops, spoon some tomato juice over rice to moisten. Add celery and seasoning. Reduce temperature to 240 deg. F. Cook covered for 50 minutes.

ON THIS, the 15 day of February, 1967, the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, regularly convened at a special meeting in the CITY HALL of said City, with the following members of said City Council present, namely: Don Earney, Mayor; O.B. Burton, Alderman; N.D. Ware, Jr., Alderman; Jack Helton, Alderman; Robert Denson, Alderman; C. Harold Nash, Alderman and Lillie Carlyle, City Secretary, with quorum being present, the following proceedings, among others, were had, to-wit:

Mayor Don Earney introduced a proposed ordinance calling a bond election, hereinafter set forth, which was read in full, considered and discussed. Alderman N.D. Ware, Jr. then made a motion that the ordinance be finally passed and adopted. The motion was then seconded by Alderman Robert Denson and

carried the following vote: AYES: Mayor Don Earney and Aldermen O.B. Burton, N.D. Ware, Jr. Jack Helton, Robert Denson and C. Harold Nash; NOES: None
Thereupon, the Mayor announced the ordinance finally passed and adopted, and said ordinance as passed and adopted by the City Council and approved by the Mayor of the City of Wheeler, Texas, is as follows:
AN ORDINANCE

Calling an election in the City of Wheeler, Texas, for the purpose of submitting to the resident qualified electors of said city, who own taxable property in said city, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, a proposition concerning and relating to the issuance of \$55,000 of street improvement bonds; providing for notice of said election; and enacting provisions incident and relating to the subject and purpose of this ordinance.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, deems it expedient to issue bonds of said City in the principal amount of \$55,000 for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and accordingly desires to submit to the qualified electors of the City, for their action thereupon, the proposition hereinafter set forth for the grant of such authority as therein contained; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WHEELER, TEXAS:

I. That an election be held in the City of Wheeler, Texas, on March 14, 1967, which is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of this ordinance, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors

of the City of Wheeler, Texas, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon, the following proposition:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the City Council of the City of Wheeler, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of Wheeler, Texas, in the principal amount of FIFTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$55,000), maturing serially or otherwise, as may be determined by the City Council of said City, the maximum maturity being not more than twenty (20) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, interest payable annually or semi-annually as may be determined by the City Council of said City, for the purpose of the construction and improvement of the streets of said City; and to levy an annual ad valorem tax on all taxable property in said City sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay the principal thereof as the same matures, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, including Chapters 1 and 7, Title 22, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended?"

II. That said election shall be held in the regularly established election precinct of said City (all of said City being included in and composed of one election precinct); and that the polling place for the holding of said election shall be at the CITY HALL in said City, and A.B. Crump is hereby appointed Presiding Judge and Laura Guthrie is hereby appointed Alternate Presiding Judge of said election.

That the Alternate Presiding Judge above named, in the absence of the Presiding Judge above named, shall perform the duties of the presiding judge in such election; and the Presiding Judge shall appoint for such election three (3) qualified voters who are residents of the election precinct to serve as clerks in said election; provided, however, that if the alternate presiding judge is present, he shall be appointed and counted as one of such election clerks.

III. That absentee voting in said election shall be conducted at the City Hall of said City in Wheeler, Texas, and the City Secretary of said City is hereby charged with the duty of conducting absentee voting in said election, as required by law.

That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas; and only those resident qualified electors of the City of Wheeler, Texas, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be allowed to vote at said election.

That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and there shall be printed on such ballots the following:
FOR: The issuance of \$55,000 street improvement bonds as submitted in the proposition
AGAINST: The issuance of \$55,000 street improvement bonds as submitted in the proposition

VI. That, concerning said proposition, each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

VII. That a copy of this Ordinance signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice of said election shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925 as amended.

VIII. That the City Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to post notice of said election at the CITY HALL in the City of Wheeler, and at three (3) other public places within the City of Wheeler, all of which notices shall be posted not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election.

IX. That the City Secretary is further authorized and directed to cause said Notice of Election to be published in the WHEELER TIMES, a newspaper published in and of general circulation in Wheeler, Texas, which notice shall be published on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks in said newspaper, the date of the first publication being not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided herein and in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the applicable laws governing general elections.

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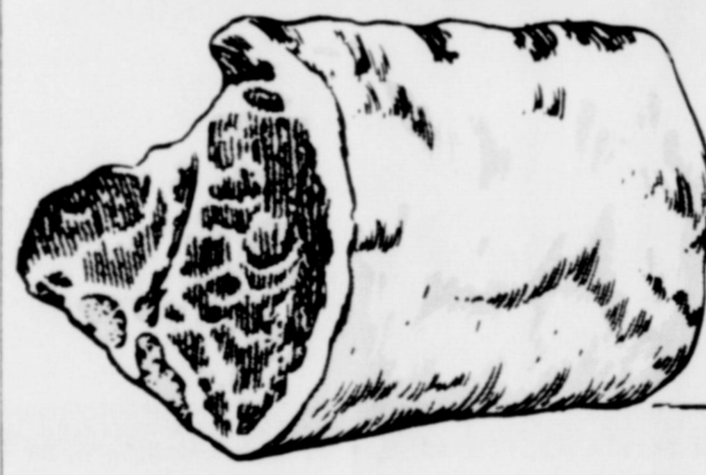

"The anniversary observance is dedicated to America's farmers, Providers of Plenty," he added.

The present Federal Land Bank Association of Shamrock which serves Wheeler and Collingsworth counties, is a combination of former offices located at Wheeler and Wellington.

Known as the National Farm Loan Association, prior to January 1960, the history of the association in Shamrock dates back to 1924. The late Jim Caperton served as its manager from that time until 1948.

In 1948, the office was combined with the Wheeler office under the management of R.H. Forrester. Upon Judge Forrester's retirement in 1957, the work of the Wheeler and Wellington offices was combined and an office established in Shamrock.

Managers of the Wellington office following World War I included Charley Glenn, Lee C. O'Neil and A.Y. "Andy" Bell who served the association as manager from Sept. 1944 until 1954. Paul Bell managed the office in 1943-44 and again in 1954-55.

Rayburn L. Smith took over the management of the Wellington office in 1956 and established the Shamrock office to take care of both counties when the work of the Wellington and Wheeler offices was combined with Shamrock in February 1957.

The present manager is Jack Corn, 29, who succeeded Rayburn Smith upon his retirement in June, 1966, after 23 years with the F.L.B. Born and reared in Baird, Mr. Corn graduated from high school there and attended Texas Tech, Lubbock. He has been with the F.L.B. for five years and served as assistant manager of the Coleman and Breckenridge Association before moving to Shamrock.

Mr. Corn is married to the former Joy Latimer of Baird. They have two daughters.

The Corns are making their home at 111 N. Illinois St. They are members of the First Methodist Church and he is a Mason.

Mrs. Bob Seeds has served as office assistant in the Shamrock office since Oct. 1959. Prior to that time, Mrs. Seeds was employed for a year in the County Clerk's office in Wheeler.

STATE LAW REQUIRES PERMITS FOR INJECTION WELL TYPE CESS POOLS

Wheeler County Sanitarian Charles Gragg this week called attention to a law which requires persons to obtain permits to drill injection wells or to convert existing wells into injection wells for the purpose of using them as cess pools.

"This law, which applies to rural as well as urban locations, is being violated in our county and we must put a stop to it in order to save our water from pollution," Gragg said.

The sanitarian points to "Vernon's Texas Civil Statute Article 762 1b."

The article states, in part:

"Before any person shall commence the drilling of an injection well, or before any person shall convert any existing well into an injection well, for the purpose of disposing of industrial and municipal waste... a permit therefor shall be obtained from the Board of Water Engineers of the State of Texas.

"The Board shall prepare suitable forms for making such application which shall be available upon request without cost. The Board shall require the furnishing of such information by an applicant as the Board may deem necessary...

"Any application for a permit to drill such injection well, or to convert any existing well to such an injection well, shall be accompanied by a fee of \$25.00 which shall be collected by the Board for the benefit of the state.

"Upon receipt by the Board of an application in proper form and accompanied by the necessary fee... the Board shall cause an inspection to be made of the location of the proposed injection well to determine local conditions

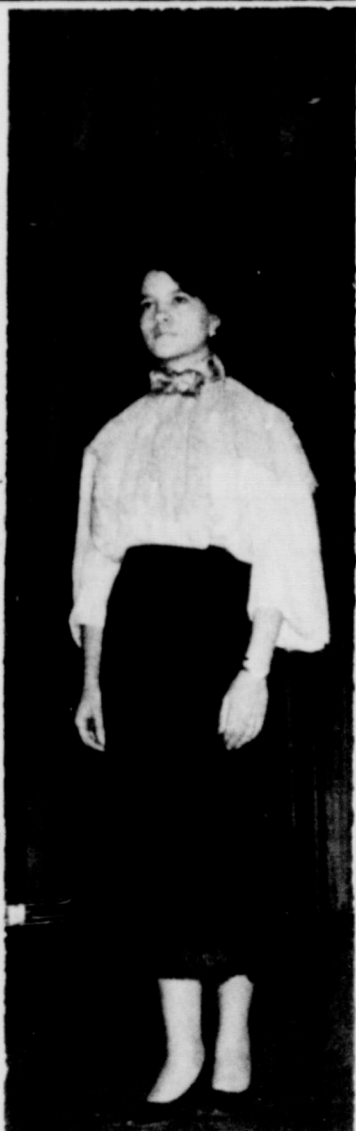
