## BUS ACCIDENT INJURES 3

Three persons received minor injuries in a bus accident 12 miles east of Wheeler.

The accident occurred at 3:00 Monday morning. The Golden Eagle Trailway bus was occupied by 24 passengers, the hostess and driver.

The passenger vehicle traveling east, topped a hill to find a cow in the right lane of traffic. The driver pulled the bus to the left to miss the cow. At this point the road makes a curve to the right and the bus left the road.

The bus traveled 400 feet after leaving road. The coach

went over an embankment, through a fence and into some shinnery. Clearing a path through a shinnery thicket, the luxury liner continued through the garden patch of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Slaton and stopped within a short distance of the Slaton home.

Wright-Denson Ambulance was called to the scene at 4:30. The injured included the driver, his daughter of Amarillo and Mrs. Margaret Gilligan of Phoenix, Ariz. Mrs. Gilligan was brought to Parkview hospital where she is being treated for back injuries. The driver, Robert Klein, and his daughter, Karen Klein,

in, 10, were treated for cuts at Parkview and released.

Mrs. Klein and two daughters were enroute to New York to visit relatives at the time of the accident. They

continued on their trip via a bus sent from Amarillo.

The fact that the bus stayed on its wheels was the reason for no more injuries. The drives stayed at the Wheel

of the bus and is to be commended for keeping it upright. A company representative stated suspension on the bus makes it difficult to turn over.

## WHEELER FOOTBALL TEAM RATED NO. 1 IN DISTRICT

Wheeler's Football team was recognized as the top team in Class 2-A in a recent article in "Texas Football." Even though it will be the first year that the Mustangs will compete in Class 2-A competition, the author feels they will give stiff competition to Clarendon.

The article stated: "Wheeler, a well armed team moving up from Class B, and a veteran Clarendon squad are on a sharp collision course in 2-A. The winner should win the district title. Wheeler, 9-1, a year ago and now blessed with 8 offensive and defensive regulars (19 lettermen), counts on two sizzling performers to set a fast pace. End Villard Hunter (6-0, 170) second team all state in 'B' circles last year excels on defense and as a receiver and blocker. One rival coach hailed him as

the best lineman he saw in '65. Halfback Bobby Vanpool, although small (140) has 9.8 speed, great breakaway ability, an eye for the goal line (45 touchdowns in 3 seasons) and thirdteam all state credentials. Fullback Fred Goad and QB Bobby Ware join him in striking the best background sprks. Up front, along with Hunter, guards Johnny Hutchison and Richard Sechrist, tackle Ricky DeArment, end Gary Hardcastle and center Tommy Wiley rate prime attention."

Predicted by the magazine are Wheeler, 1; Clarendon 2; McLean 3; Claude 4; and Silvertown 5.

## Blood Donations Are Taken Today

Today is the day to give that pint of blood to help save a life. The Red Cross Blood mobile will be in Wheeler today, August 4 with an effort being made to obtain 311 units of blood from Wheeler, Briscoe, Allison Kelton and Mobeetie.

The blood bank will be open from 9 a.m. until 2:15. Under the direction of Robert Adams and Cummi Warren, a committee from each committee contacted area residents and make appointments for donating blood. An appointment is not necessary. If you would like to give a pint of blood and do not have an appointment, you are urged to "Walk-In." You will then wait in turn and only 45 minutes of your time is required.

By donating blood to the blood bank, you will make yourself eligible to receive blood through the Red Cross Blood Bank. You will receive a card designating your eligibility to receive blood at any time it is needed within the year from the time of your donation. Parkview Hospital is a member of the Red Cross Blood Bank.

You are eligible to donate blood at the mobil unit today if you are between the ages of 18 and 59 and in good health.

You may not donate if you have given a blood donation within the past two months, have ever had infectious hepatitis or have polycythemia.

Women donors must weigh at least 110 pounds.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

"Section 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of

the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Weight Important  
By Vivian Warminski  
WEIGHT CONTROL IS IMPORTANT:  
Approximately 13 million Americans are afflicted with arthritis and rheumatism, according to a recent national health survey conducted in the United States. Arthritis is most susceptible to quackery and faddism, because knowledge and treatment of arthritis is limited, Texas regional staff members of the Food and Drug Administration emphasize. They estimate that more than \$250 million a year is spent on such useless cures as filtered sea water, alfalfa tablets, "immune" milk, "glorified aspirin" and similar concoctions, all of which are reflected by medical science. This means that \$50 a year of misplaced hope is spent by the average arthritis sufferer. While no specific diet in itself will cure arthritis, it is important to follow good basic nutrition, national and state Extension nutritionists emphasize. All foods needed for the arthritis patient can be found in local food markets. The alluring array of modern convenience foods may appear to be a boon to the homemaker whose energy and function are limited. However, the homemaker needs criteria to evaluate the many products available, first in terms of nutritive values and costs and then in terms of palatability, keeping qualities and suitability for use in family menus. Patients with osteoarthritis, gout and some other rheumatic conditions may be overweight. A physician generally prescribes a calorie-restricted diet for them. Weight control is of special importance for persons with arthritis, since extra pounds put an added burden on the weight-bearing joints, aggravate the pain, make movement more difficult and may even accelerate the progress of the disease.

Grub, Grasshopper Control  
By Charles David Jackson  
Grub Control Demonstration:  
A grub control demonstration was established this week on the herd of Hereford cattle owned by Marion A. Bryant of Kelton. Approximately 140 head of cows, replacement heifers and bulls were treated with a new systemic insecticide named Negeuvon which is a product of Chemagro Corporation. This chemical is applied as a pour on. It is giving good fly control now and will control the grubs. Five cows that have been in the average as far as the weaning weight of their calves were left untreated. Their calf's weaning weights will be compared to the others next summer. Thus far no blistering or ill effects have shown up on the cattle that have been treated. Final results of the demonstration will be published in the Northwest Texas Research Demonstration handbook. Calf Crop Declines:  
According to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, the Texas calf crop is expected to total 4,631,000 head in 1966. This is a decrease of 1 percent from last year's crop of 4,677,000 head. This year's calves born will be the first reduction from the preceding year since 1957 in Texas. Cows and heifers 2 years old and older on January 1 numbered 5,580,000 head, down 2 percent from the previous year. This compares with the 5 year (1960-64) average of 5,235,000. The United States 1966 calf crop declined 2 percent. The total for 1966 is expected to be 42,263,000 head which is 2 percent less than 1965. This is the first reduction from the preceding year since 1958. Cows and heifers 2 years old and older on January 1, 1966 at 49,243,000 head, also were 2 percent less than a year earlier. The number of calves born and to be born in 1966, expressed as a percentage of cows and heifers 2 years and older the first of the year, is 86 percent, the same as in 1965. Emergency Feed Assistance:  
This week I received a letter from Congressman Walter Rogers concerning emergency feed for the county. I asked our State Representative Grainger McIlhany, to contact Congressman Rogers several days ago concerning a request that I had from several ranchers. Mr. Rogers reminded us that Wheeler County was approved for grazing and haying privileges on cropland diverted from production on July 5. Under another program that can be initiated by the County Disaster Committee and forwarded to the state, livestock feed is sold at 75 percent of the support price for foundation herds of cattle, sheep and goats and at 100 percent of the support price for other eligible livestock. The hay purchase, by which farmers and ranchers several years ago were able to purchase hay at one-half price, no longer exists. I would appreciate hearing from anyone that has any questions concerning emergency feed. Crop Conditions:  
Crop conditions look a lot brighter as a result of the rain received last week. Crops are still a long way from being made, but the recent rain should prevent a crop disaster which had everyone worried for a while that it would not rain in time. Wheeler County bounces back quick when we do receive moisture. Range conditions are still very much below normal. GRASSHOPPERS:  
Ranchers that sprayed for grasshoppers through the federal program in the Lela area obtained a good kill. The ranchers cost through the program was 41 cents per acre. It was the cheapest contract let in West Texas. If conditions remain the same

next year as we had during the spring of this year, 1967 promises to be an even worse year for grasshoppers. Lets hope that conditions change next year. Carl Kenney, who is foreman on the Davis ranch at Kelton, reported that grasshoppers were so bad where he lived that they had already eaten the fenders off his saddle. He said that the bridle reins were almost gone. I asked Carl what he planned to use when the reins got to where they were beyond repair. Carl replied, "Barb wire."

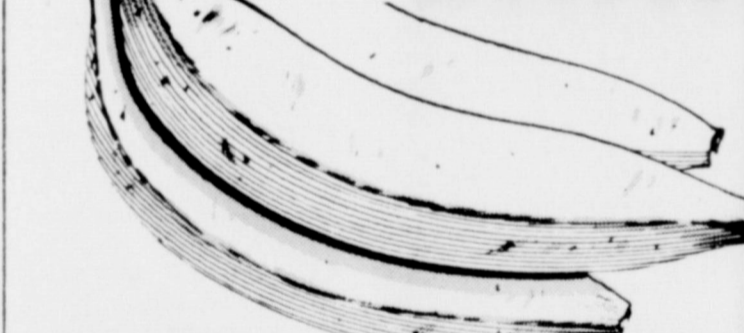

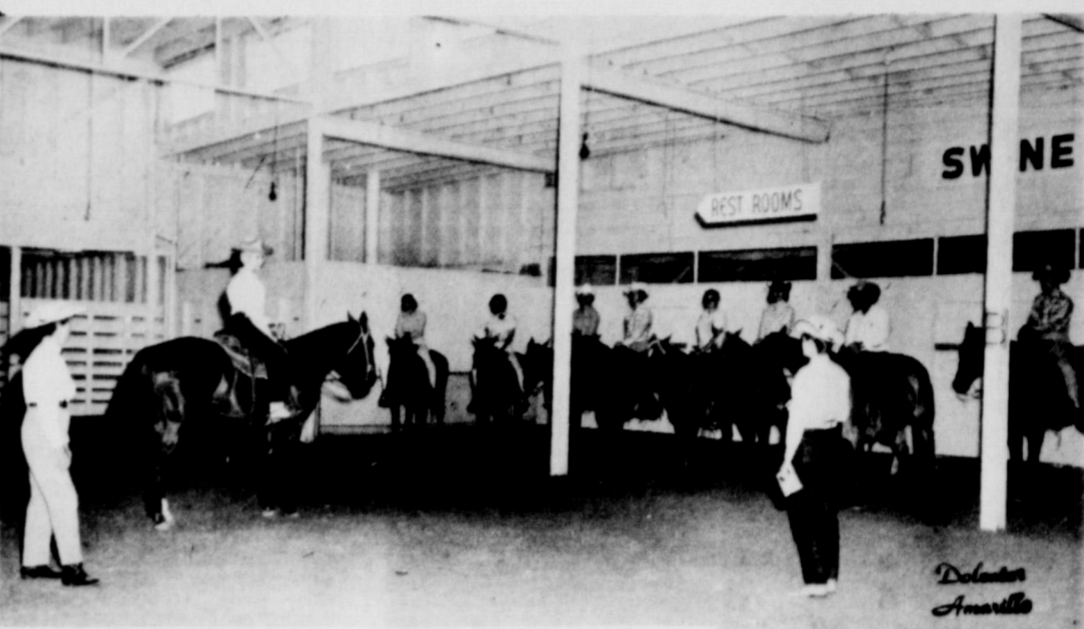

CLINIC AND RATING CENTER

The Clinic and Rating Center, which was held the first week in June in Amarillo, Texas, was the first one ever held in Texas and one of five held in the United States this year.

Under the sanction of the American Association for Health Physical Education, and Recreation, a department of the National Education Association, the clinics are held for the purpose of rating Western Riding Instructors. The NEA has sponsored clinics for instructors for 20 years in the Eastern state, for English riding, but have only held them for Western Riding for the past three years. Both Junior and Senior Ratings are granted to those candidates who qualify. Junior Ratings are given to those qualifiers under 20 years of age. Candidates receive intensive training on horseback, schooling of horses for children's riding groups, and have taken written examinations. In addition to work on horseback, there have been lectures, films, and text study.

Out of seven Junior candidates at Amarillo Diane Dadd was the only one to receive an "A" Rating which is classed as Excellent.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4...

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding subsection (c) which shall read as follows:

"(c) The Texas Legislature is authorized to enact appropriate laws to provide for a System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for all the officers and employees of a county or other political subdivision of the state, or a political subdivision of a county; providing that when the Texas Legislature has passed the necessary enabling legislation pursuant to the Constitutional authorization, then the governing body of the county, or other political subdivision of the state, or political subdivision of the county shall make the determination as to whether a particular county or other political subdivision of the state, or subdivision of the county, or political subdivision of the county shall participate in this System; providing further that such System shall be operated at the expense of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and providing that the Legislature of the State of Texas shall never make an appropriation to pay the costs of this Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System.

"The Legislature may provide for a voluntary merger into the System herein authorized by this Constitutional Amendment of any System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Benefits which may now exist or that may hereafter be established under subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution; providing further that the Texas Legislature in the enabling statute will make the determination as to the amount of money that will be contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county to the State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits, and the Legislature shall further provide that the amount of money contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each officer and employee covered by this State-wide System.

"It is the further intention of the Legislature, in submitting this Constitutional Amendment, that the officers and employees of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county may be included in those systems regardless of whether the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county participates in the Retirement, Disability and Death Benefit System authorized by this Constitutional Amendment, or whether they participate in a System under the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as the same is herein amended."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1966, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officials and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or

political subdivisions of a county; authorizing the Legislature to provide for a voluntary merger into the system authorized by this Amendment by those officers and employees covered by the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as now existing or may hereafter be established; providing that costs of this System shall be borne by the counties and other political subdivisions of the state and political subdivisions of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and forbidding the Legislature from making any appropriations for the operation of this System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officials and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or political subdivisions of the county; authorizing the Legislature to provide for a voluntary merger into the system authorized by this Amendment by those officers and employees covered by the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as now existing or may hereafter be established; providing that costs of this System shall be borne by the counties and other political subdivisions of the state, or political subdivisions of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and forbidding the Legislature from making any appropriations for the operation of this System."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of such amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said proposed Amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas, and laws of this state.
