



3y Vivian Warminski WEIGHT CONTROL IS IM-PORTANT:

Approximately 13 million Americans are afflicted with arthritis and reheumatism, according to a recent national health survey conducted in the United States.

Artiritics are most susceptible to quackery and faddism, because knowledge and treatment of arthritis is limited, Texas regional staff members of the Food and Drug Adminstration emphasize.

They estimate that more than \$250 million a year is spent on such useless cures as filtered sea water, alfalfa tablets, "immune" milk, 'glorified aspirin' and similar concoctions, all of which are reflected by medical sc-

This means that \$50 a year of misplaced hope is spent by the average arthritis sufferer. While no specific diet in

itself will cure arthritis, it is important to follow good basic nutrition, national and state Extension nutritionists emphasize.

All foods needed for the arthritis patient can be found in local food markets. The alluring array of modern convenience foods may appear to be a boon to the homemaker whose energy and function are limited. However, the homemaker needs criteria to evaluate the many products available, first in terms of nutritive values and costs and then in terms of palatability, keeping qualities and suitability for use in

family menus. Patients with osteoarthritis, gout and some other rheumatic conditions may be overweight. A physician generally prescribes a calorie-restircted diet for them. Weight control is of special importance for persons with arthritis, since extra pounds put an added burden on the

Grub, Grasshopper Control

By Charles David Jackson Grub Control Demonstration: A grub control demonstra-

tion was established this week on the herd of Hereford cattle owned by Marion A. Bryant of Kelton. Approximately 140 head of cows, replacement heifers and bulls were treated with a new systemic insecticide named Negeuvon which is a product of Chemagro Corporation. This chemical is applied as a pour on. It is giving good fly control now and will control the grubs. Five cows that have been in the average as far as the weaning weight of their caleves were left untreated. Their calf's weaning weights will be compared to the others next summer. Thus far no blistering or ill effects have shown up on the cattle that have been treated. Final results of the demonstration will be published in the Northwest Texas Research Demonstra-

tion handbook. Calf Crop Declines: According to the Texas Crop and Livestock Report-

ing Service, the Texas calf crop is expected to total 4,631,000 head in 1966. This is a decrease of 1 percent from last years' crop of 4,677,000 head.

This year's calves born will be the first reduction from the preceding year since 1957 in Texas. Cows and heifers 2 years old and older on January 1 numbered 5,580 000 head, down 2 percent from the previous year. This compares with the 5 year (1960-64) average of 5.235.000.

The United States 1966 calf crop declined 2 percent. The total for 1966 is expected to be 42,263,000 head which is 2 percent less than 1965. This is the first reduction from the preceding year Herd, Mrs. J.B. Oglesby since 1958.
