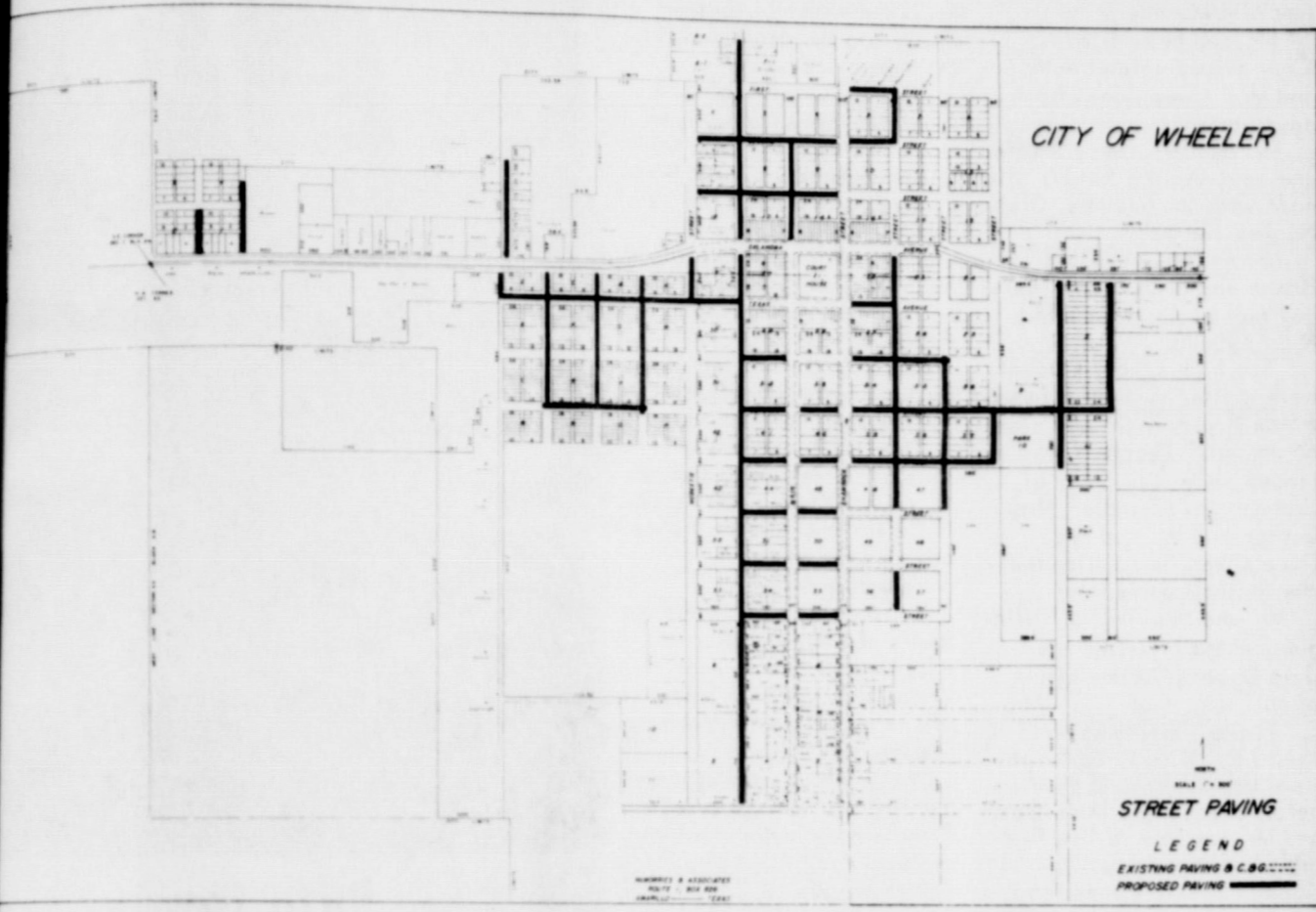

CITY PLANS 84 BLOCK PAVING PROGRAM



CITY TAXES WILL NOT BE RAISED

Property Owners Urged To Express Opinions to Council

The Wheeler City Council in their regular meeting voted unanimously to approve plans for an 84 block paving program in the City of Wheeler. The plans have also been approved by the directors of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

Mayor Don Earney and Council members Jack Helton, N.D. Ware, Jr., and Robert Denson met with the Thursday Review Club last week and received their unanimous support.

The Council also presented the program to the Kiwanis

Club Monday at their regular noon luncheon.

The entire program will cost approximately \$300,000 which includes paving, curb and gutter, surveying, engineering costs and a new bridge across the creek west of the swimming pool.

The city will pay one-third (1/3) of the cost and each of the property owners will pay one-third (1/3).

As an example Mayor Don Earney pointed out that a property owner with a 50' frontage would be assessed \$195.00 or \$3.90 per front

foot which could be paid in four equal installments of \$48.75 per year plus interest on the last three payments. The first payment would be due 10 days after acceptance of the paving job by the city, the remaining three payments to become due annually.

Mayor Earney stated flatly that, "The taxes will not be raised," but the money must come from someplace so the council has decided to raise the minimum water rate from \$2.00 per 3,000 gallons to \$3.00 and the minimum sewer rate from \$1.50 to \$2.50. This will bring in approximately \$12,000.00 per year which is sufficient to pay off the city's portion of the paving program in 15 years.

Earney pointed out that

several of the surrounding towns are currently going through paving programs and in each instance the city's share of the cost is less than 20%. This, of course, forces the property owners to pay a much larger share of the paving.

By raising the water and sewer rate and not the taxes, everyone will participate in the program. In the past, the entire burden of paving programs water and sewer improvements have been put on the city property owner. Under the current program everyone with a water and sewer connection will help pay for the paving.

The Council has extended an invitation to everyone to express their opinions and suggestions on the program.

SKYROCKETS DUMP MUSTANGS 14-12

Neither ball club threatened in the remainder of the game with great defensive play by the Mustangs holding off the bigger Skyrockets when it appeared that they were getting scoring drives under way.

The Mustangs got a good scoring opportunity in the second quarter when they recovered a Wellington fumble on the 24 but couldn't get the pigskin over as Wellington intercepted a pass from Jamison on the 10.

Virginia will "retire" at the same time as her husband. After the couple complete their tour in Germany. They will settle in Ft. Worth where Holt plans to work in a civilian hospital.

He'll be 39 with a monthly income, years of training and still time to embark on a career outside of the service.

Holt is the son of Mr. and Mrs. O. F. Holt of Wheeler.
