The Texas, Veterinary Medical Association states that rabies is a virus disease which attacks the central nervous system (brain) is invariably fatal in any warm blooded animal and is transmitted by a bite of an infected animal. This disease is found in wild life as well as in domestic dogs and cats. It is also transmissible to man. Vaccination against rabies is very reliable. A booster should be administered to maintain a good imm

Texas State Department of Health lastest quarterly report shows five cases of rabies in Panhandle wildlife, all from skunks. Should rabies break out of wildlife sources into pets, an epidemic could occur.

Pets may be immunized for one year or 39 months. The one year immunization which may be given to any age animal will cost \$2.00 The 39 month vaccination, which is optional on all dogs above 51/2 months age but cannot be given to cats, will cost \$3.00. Vaccination tags and certificates will be given each animal immunized. For convenience of pet owners, vaccines against distemper, hepatitis, leptospirosis and enteritis will also be available at the rabies vaccina-Cont'd on page 6


