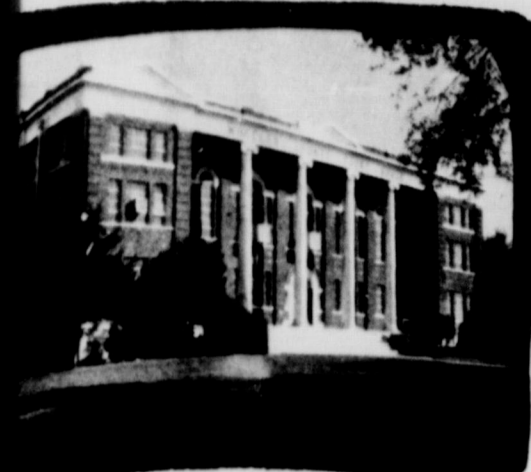

62 PINTS DONATED

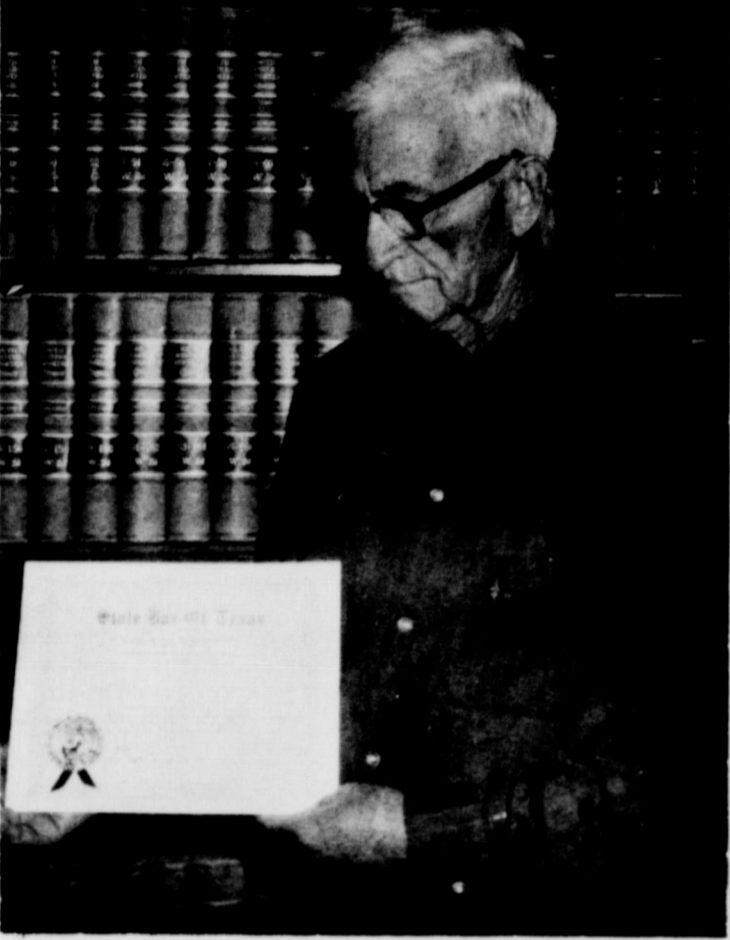

NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF TEXAS: That Article III, Section 1, of the Constitution be and the same is amended so as hereinafter provided: That the members of the Legislature shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the State of Texas, at an election to be held on the first Monday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have been printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

INSURANCE RATES RAISED

The average motorist in Wheeler County will pay \$4 more for automobile insurance if the proposed change in rates is made by the State Board of Insurance according to the Southwestern Insurance Information Service of Dallas. Present cost of insurance on a new Ford or Chevrolet private passenger car driven to and from work and not driven by a male under 25 years of age is \$138. The new cost would be \$142. This increase is assured by the United States Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service, says Vivian C. Warminski, County Home Demonstration Agent.

VEGETABLES ARE IMPORTANT

By Vivian Warminski. If you have a "vegetable hater" in the family, don't get discouraged from serving vegetables to the rest of the family. Vegetables are important protective foods. They serve as rich sources of vitamins and minerals while adding flavor, color and texture to your meals. Of course, "vegetable hater" is a temporary thing. Children may go through periods when they refuse to eat a certain vegetable. This does not indicate a permanent dislike. Serve vegetables in appetizing ways to build up your family's enthusiasm for eating vegetables. Introduce new vegetables under favorable conditions by serving them at meals which include other familiar, well-liked foods. Prepare vegetables so that they are at their attractive tempting best. Cook them quickly in a small amount of water only until tender crisp. Overcooked vegetables lose color, texture, and food value. Use imagination in seasoning vegetables. Taste before serving. This is the best way to make certain that it is cooked and seasoned to suit your family's taste. Encourage a spirit of adventure and a willingness to try new vegetables. It may take several exposures to develop a liking for a new one. Keep the servings small and let those who wish have seconds. Serve vegetables in a variety of ways. Try raw vegetables as relishes or in salads when cooked vegetables are not accepted. Children often will eat raw vegetables when they refuse the same vegetable cooked. They'll get the most vitamins and minerals when vegetables are served raw. Use vegetables in main dishes such as chowders, soups and casseroles. Good labeling helps you when you go grocery shopping. The labels you find on federally inspected meat and meat products are clear and accurate.

Under the new rates, motorists would pay \$1 more for bodily injury and property damage liability and \$5 more for comprehensive. But the cost of \$100 deductible collision would be reduced \$2. Cost for the same coverage but with \$50 deductible collision would be raised \$4 also, from \$151 to \$155. Other types and older cars would have different rates. Texas has 26 rating territories and eight automobile classifications. The cost estimates given are for cars in classification 1B, which includes about half of the private automobiles in Texas. For cars in this classification and insured under \$100 deductible collision policies, insurance would cost less in nine territories and remain unchanged in two. Costs for \$50 deductible policies would be lowered in seven territories and unchanged in one. Even with the rate increases, Texas would rank about 30th among the states in the cost of automobile insurance to policyholders.

Cured Hams for instance are traditionally associated with the "dry" cure method and slow smoking and long drying which was standard in Colonial times. Today, all hams marked "country style" must thereafter be "dry" cured in much the same way and always require further cooking before eating. Additionally, these hams may be marked as regional origin - Virginia, Georgia or Texas for example. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Section 62 of Article XVI a new subsection to be denominated subsection (c), of said Section 62; authorizing the Legislature to enact laws establishing, subject to the limitations stated, a State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation benefits for the officers and employees of the counties and other political subdivisions of the state, and of the political subdivisions of any county. Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a subsection (c) which shall read as follows: "(c) The Texas Legislature is authorized to enact appropriate laws to provide for a System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for all the officers and employees of a county or other political subdivision of the state, or of a political subdivision of a county; providing that when the Texas Legislature has passed the necessary enabling legislation pursuant to the Constitutional authorization, then the governing body of the county, or other political subdivision of the state, or political subdivision of a county shall make the determination as to whether a particular county or other political subdivision of the state, or subdivision of the county participates in this System; providing further that such System shall be operated at the expense of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and providing that the Legislature of the State of Texas shall never make an appropriation to pay the costs of this Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System. "The Legislature may provide for a voluntary merger into the System herein authorized by this Constitutional Amendment of any System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Benefits which may now exist or that may hereafter be established under subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution; providing further that the Texas Legislature in the enabling statute will make the determination as to the amount of money that will be contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county to the State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits, and the Legislature shall further provide that the amount of money contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or subdivision of the county shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each officer and employee covered by this State-wide System. "It is the further intention of the Legislature, in submitting this Constitutional Amendment, that the officers and employees of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county participate in the Retirement, Disability and Death Benefit System authorized by this Constitutional Amendment, or whether they participate in a System under the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as the same is herein amended. Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1966, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officials and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of such amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said proposed Amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas, and laws of this state.

JAPAN IS BEST CONSUMER

By Charles David Jackson
Marketing the farm products that we raise in Wheeler County as well as the rest of the United States has been one of the major problems confronting Agriculture for a number of years. Farm organizations and the U.S.D.A. has been working at ways to develop foreign markets. It seems that headway has been made in this direction. The most promising aspect of the program is that we are getting cash which looks good for a change. If other countries would follow the pattern that Japan is setting then our marketing problems would be greatly reduced.
Japan is far the leading foreign purchaser of U.S. farm products -- and all for hard cash. In 1965, U.S. farm exports to Japan totalled \$879 million, far exceeding the \$615 million shipped to Canada, second biggest customer of the U.S. farmer.
According to "Japan: The American Farmer's Best Export Market," a pamphlet just released by the United States-Japan Trade Council, the U.S. annually supplies about one-third of Japan's total agricultural imports, which now amount to over \$2.5 billion annually.
In 1965 Japan took more than 14 percent of all U.S. farm exports, purchasing more cotton, wheat and rice from this country than the entire six-nation common market. Japan also exceeded all individual countries in purchases of U.S. soybeans, corn, grain sorghums, hides and skins, tallow and barley.
The Council predicts a continuation of this profitable market for the U.S. farmer. "This is due to a combination of circumstances" according to the Council publication. "The rapid growth of Japan's economy, the country's rising standard of living, propitious changes in Japan's consumer tastes and finally the definite limitations on the expansion of Japan's agricultural production."
To maintain its position as the largest supplier of Japanese agricultural imports, the U.S. must continue to accept imports from Japan. The Council pointed out that the U.S. is Japan's principal export market, and that attainment of Japan's objectives for economic growth requires a steady increase in Japan's sales to the U.S. over the next few years. "The pattern of U.S. - Japan trade has been very favorable to the U.S. In the last ten years the United States exports to Japan have exceeded U.S. imports by a little less than \$2 billion."
The publication analyzes each of the leading farm commodities in U.S. - Japan trade: Japan is the top foreign buyer of U.S. soybeans, taking nearly one-fourth of total exports. In 1965, this amounted to 52.4 million bushels, valued at \$153 million. Japan's import requirements for soybeans are expected to triple in the next ten years, with the prospect that its imports of U.S. Soybeans will rise to 150 million bushels by 1957.
U.S. exports of feed grains to Japan have risen phenomenally from only \$19 million in 1959 to over \$250 million last year. Japan was the largest dollar purchaser of U.S. Corn in 1965 (\$138 million). Ninety percent of Japan's imports of grain sorghum came from the U.S. last year (\$70 million) representing almost one-third of the total U.S. overseas shipments.
Japan bought \$125 million worth of U.S. cotton in 1965, exceeding the purchases of the entire common market by 67 percent. Every fourth bale of cotton exported from the United States was purchased by Japanese cotton mills.

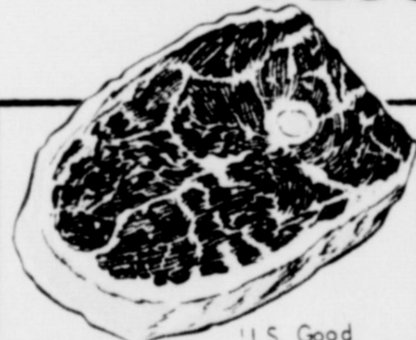

Japan is the leading buyer of U.S. wheat, purchasing 68 million bushels last year worth \$109 million. White winter wheat from Pacific Northwest and hard winter wheat from the Midwest are leading commodities in this trade. U.S. exports to Japan may reach 150 million bushels a year in 1976 if the present market can be maintained.
Sales of the U.S. rice to Japan exceeded \$51 million in 1965 making the U.S. primary source of Japanese rice imports.
Among livestock products Japan accounted for \$29 million worth of U.S. hides and skins exports and \$34 million in inedible tallow. Japanese import requirements in commodities are sharply increasing.
Other U.S. agricultural products finding a substantial outlet in the Japanese market in 1965 were tobacco (\$23 million) raisins (\$4.9 million) and lemons and limes (\$4 million).

use he shall file with the local tax assessor a sworn statement in writing describing the use to which the land is devoted.

(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.

(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and amount of income as may be necessary for determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, effective February 1, 1968, by deleting the following language:

"and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. If said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost, such affidavit shall be in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor," and by substituting therefor the following language:

"provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term 'qualified elector' as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature." The text of this Section, as so amended, is shown below, with the deleted language marked through by a broken line and with the new

language underscored:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and

Section 3. If any other Amendment to Sections 2 or 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this Amendment shall not be construed as nullifying any change made by such other Amendment.

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."

"AGAINST repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."

Section 5. If the foregoing Amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the Amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Sections, as amended herein and as amended by any other proposed Amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

Section 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water reservoirs; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto; providing for the lease or transfer of such facilities under the necessity of providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, and proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General

Law, including the requirement of a permit for storage or beneficial use, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; provided, however, the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which contemplates or results in the removal from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within the river basin of origin, except on a temporary, interim basis.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, together with any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and/or transportation of water, by any one or more of the following governmental agencies: by the United States of America, or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas, or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas; by the State of Texas as a party; and by municipal corporations. The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir and associated system or works

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment.

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue all or any portion of such \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized.

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same, and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the

acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, no further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or providing financial assistance as authorized by Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service and maintenance of aqueduct facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of the anticipatory character of the Amendment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds providing for the investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

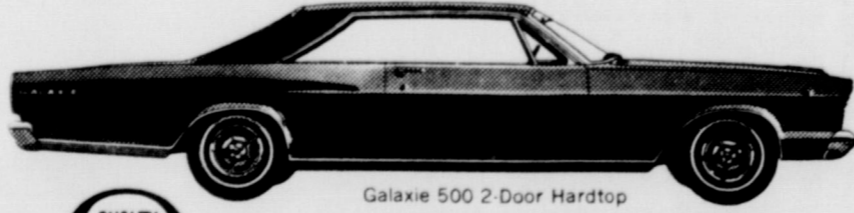

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
