billion pieces of holiday mail that will be handled by the Postal Service just before Christmas.

Postmaster Virgil Jamison, Jr. today urged all residents of Wheeler to make a concerted effort to include the five digit number in both the address and return address.

ZIP Code hel s cut down the number of times a piece of mail must be sorted before reaching its final destination. This saves time in delivery and cuts down the cost of moving the mail.


"We expect a record-break ing volume this Christmas and will need all the help we can get," Postmaster Jamison said. "There are three easy ways in which you can cooperate with the Postal service and at the same time assure that you get on-time delivery for your holiday gifts and greetings. You should shop early, mail early and use ZIP Codes."

ZIP Codes for addresses you use most often can be obtained from the ZIP Code directory in the post office lobby or by phone. The ZIP Code information phone numb er is 826-3681.


"Probably the easiest method of getting the ZIP Codes you need is to check the return address on the mail you receive from your correspondence. In most cases the proper ZIP Code has been included. Then you should transcribe the codes into your address book." Postmaster Jamison said, "Remember, mail moves the country ZIP Code moves the mail." CHRISTMAS MAILING HINTS





7. Make sure your addresses are written or printed clearly and that they are complete. Don't let your mail end up in the Dead Letter office because your handwriting can't be read. 8. Gift parcels to distant

Beef Cattle Demonstration

By Charles David Jackson The beef cattle demonstration utilizing sorghum sudan hybrid grass conducted on the Clarence Zybach farm reveiled a lot of good information even on a dry year. The test showed an average daily gain per head the fifty days at a cost of 3.8 cents per pound of gain. Growing cattle seems to be

one of our most efficient enterprises in Wheeler County. The grass was planted on June 20 at a rate of 20 pound per acre on 8 inch spacings. Only 20 pounds of anhydrous

Ammonia per acre was applied due to the dry weather. Moisture was short the entire growing season compared to 1965.

A rain gage was kept at the demonstration and an accurate record was kept of the rainfall. Following is the amount received each month: April 1.00'', May 0.6'' June 1.3'', July 0.8'' August 2.0'' and September 2.6'' Other farms in the locality received more moisture, but this was the amount received \$29.04 and the net return on the demonstration.

1980 pounds. The beginning price of the cattle was 25¢ per pound calves and yearling. The but the selling price upon completion was 22¢ which gave a gross profit of only \$6.90 per head. The total gross profit was \$151.80 on the 22 head and the total expenses not including interest was \$76. The net income for the 15 acre demonstration was \$75.80.

On a per acre basis the gain was 132#; price per pound of gain was 22¢; total value of gain per acre was was \$5.05 per acre.

cost per pound of gain was 3.8¢ and the average daily gain was 1.8 lb. This is the most impressive information gained from the demonstration. If the price of cattle had remained constant or even risen a dollar or more, the demonstration would have compared favorable with the 1965 test when the same fifteen acres netted over \$51.00 per acre.

Irregardless of the variations from year to year in the demonstration results, Wheeler County is increasing in stocker cattle each year. This year, not counting cows and calves, we are running between 7 and 10,000 head of different types of stocker main reason people are turning to more stockers is the cost per pound of gain under different types of conditions, number of head that can be run per animal unit and alow break even point with a fast turnover.

As long as livestock producers in south and east Texas as well as the other states produce these light cattle, then it is going to be profitable for Wheeler County farmers and ranchers to take advantage of their mistakes and add cheap

By Charles David Jackson A beef herd bull that increases weaning weight of

your calves by 15 pounds may be worth much more in increased income that you realize. Over a 7-year period, with calves selling at 24 cents per pound, he could up income by \$445. With calves selling at 21 cents, a selected sire could add \$389 to the

beef income. Let's assume that 20 offspring from the selected sire are sold each year and that five daughters are kept for replacements each of the three years the bull is used. Each of the 15 daughters should produce five offspring before they are in turn replaced. The average weaning wei-

ght of the daughter's offspring, beginning when they are three years of age and producing for five more years should average about 1234 pounds. Add this to the increased weight of the calves sold and you come up with the \$389 or \$445 increase for the 7 year period.

This information is contained in a very recent Texas Agricultural Extension Service publication, L-681 "Pay more for a Good Beef Herd Bull." The leaflet was written by Tom Prater, farm management specialist and L.A. Maddox, animal husbandman.

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
