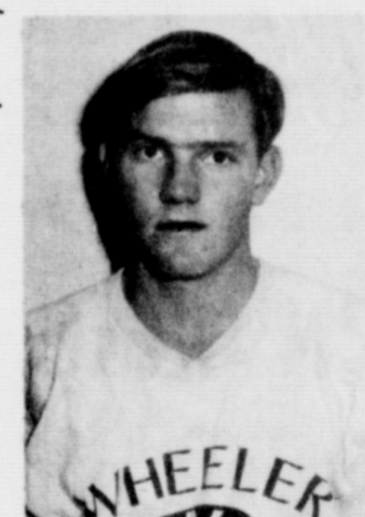

WHEELER BOYS BASKETBALL HAVE WINNING STREAK

Wheeler's Fighting Mustangs are now racking up the points on the basketball court. The Mustangs brought home their fourth straight victory of the season with a 73-29 victory over Miami Tuesday night. Tuesday's victory gave the Mustangs their second win over Miami's Warriors this season. The score for the first game was 49-39.

The Mustangs took an early lead Tuesday evening and ended the first half with a score of 36-18. The Mustangs scored 19 points in the final quarter while holding the Warriors to only 5 points. Villard Hunter scored 32 of Wheeler's 73 points.

Briscoe Man Hurt In Car Accident

Gary Puryear, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Puryear of Briscoe, was in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo Tuesday suffering from injuries received in a one-car accident about 1:45 p.m. Tuesday 23 miles southeast of Canadian.

According to Hemphill County Sheriff Jim Cloyd, Puryear's car went out of control on a farm to market road and overturned 2 1/2 times. Puryear was taken to Parkview Hospital in Wheeler for emergency treatment of a compound fracture of the left arm and of cuts and bruises. He was then transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital by ambulance.

Post Office Ask Use Of Zip Code

ZIP Code will help put ZIP in your Christmas Mail. This year, more than ever before, the use of ZIP Code is essential to efficient delivery of the more than eight billion pieces of holiday mail that will be handled by the Postal Service just before Christmas.

Postmaster Virgil Jamison, Jr. today urged all residents of Wheeler to make a concerted effort to include the five digit number in both the address and return address. ZIP Code help cut down the number of times a piece of mail must be sorted before reaching its final destination. This saves time in delivery and cuts down the cost of moving the mail.

"We expect a record-breaking volume this Christmas and will need all the help we can get," Postmaster Jamison said. "There are three easy ways in which you can cooperate with the Postal service and at the same time assure that you get on-time delivery for your holiday gifts and greetings. You should shop early, mail early and use ZIP Codes."

ZIP Codes for addresses you use most often can be obtained from the ZIP Code directory in the post office lobby or by phone. The ZIP Code information phone number is 826-3681.

"Probably the easiest method of getting the ZIP Codes you need is to check the return address on the mail you receive from your correspondence. In most cases the proper ZIP Code has been included. Then you should transcribe the codes into your address book." Postmaster Jamison said. "Remember, mail moves the country ZIP Code moves the mail."

CHRISTMAS MAILING HINTS FROM MR. ZIP:

1. Airmail cards and parcels should be mailed to Servicemen overseas no later than Dec. 10 to assure before Christmas delivery.
2. Don't forget to use ZIP Codes on all your Christmas mail...in both the address and Cont'd. on pg. 2

the return address, only you can put ZIP into your postal system.

- All gifts should be packed in sturdy boxes. Cardboard boxes should be wrapped in heavy paper and tied with strong cord.
- Don't let any gifts rattle around in your Christmas mail packages. Sufficient cushioning is important to give the box strength. There may be a set of encyclopedia shipped in the box on top of yours.
- Each package you mail should include a slip showing the person receiving your Christmas gift and listing the contents. In cast outer wrapping of package comes loose your gift will still be delivered.
- In addition to articles normally prohibited in the mails, matches, and lighter fluid may not be mailed to overseas military addresses.
- Make sure your addresses are written or printed clearly and that they are complete. Don't let your mail end up in the Dead Letter office because your handwriting can't be read.
- Gift parcels to distant States should be mailed by early December, and those for local delivery by December 15.
- Don't forget that under normal conditions there is no delivery of cards and letters on Christmas Day.

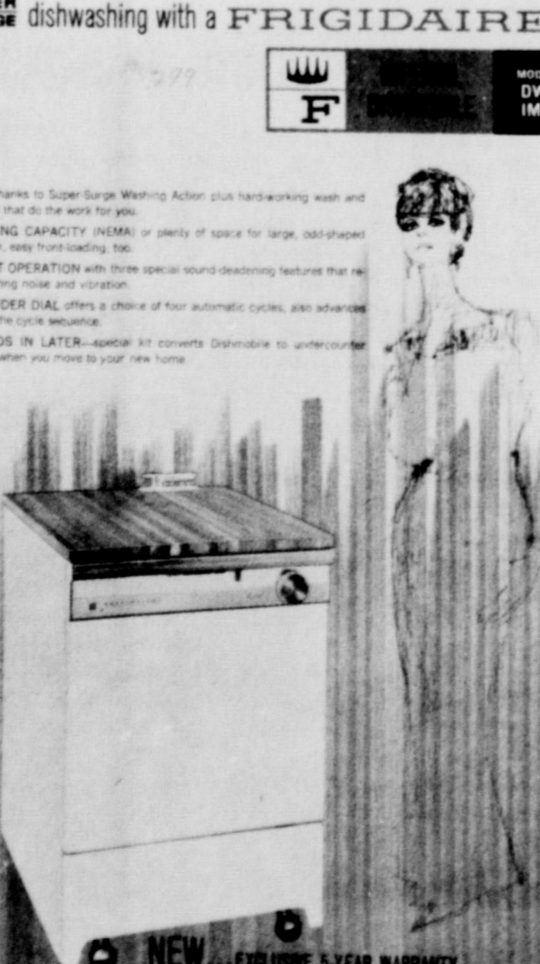

The Stranger At The Door

By Vivian Warminski
Some strangers who come to your door are well meaning people with legitimate business. The Better Business Bureau gives these cautions when answering the door:

1. Do not let anyone into your house until his or her intentions have been definitely established. If alone, this is not always advisable. One might say, "I think I will call my neighbor in. She might be interested in what you have to offer."
2. Beware of persons who claim to be making a survey or representing themselves as government officials wanting information.
3. Beware of "free offers" and ask the sales person to write down the free articles you are to receive, signing his name. Usually there are strings attached.
4. Read carefully anything you are requested to sign and suggest that the representative come back after you have discussed the matter with a member of the family. What you think is a receipt or statement could be a contract to purchase.
5. Beware of statements that "You are the winner of a contest" or "selected for advertising purposes."
6. If in doubt about the integrity of a firm call the Better Business Bureau before buying.

Now that the Holiday season is here the next series of articles will be concentrated on foods.

Succulent roast turkey becomes the piece de resistance that makes an everyday meal a holiday treat.

Frequency of cooking is the basic reason for the "frantic questions" about turkey during the traditional holiday season. A 1964 USDA consumer study indicated that 76 percent of homemakers used turkey (up 11 percent in eight years) but that three-fourths of the users served turkey less than four times per year.

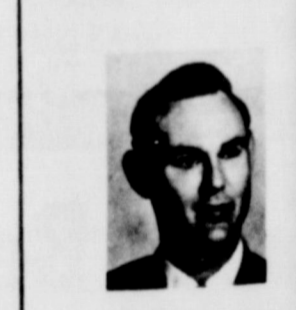
The first question most homemakers ask is "How much to buy?" The following suggestions are based on servings - each serving amounting to approximately 3 ounces of cooked meat without bone, skin or juice. When buying whole ready-to-cook turkey under 12 pounds, allow 1/2 to 1 pound per serving. For larger birds allow 1/2 to 3/4 pound. With uncooked boneless turkey roast allow 1/3 pound per serving.

A ready guide for turkey size and servings: Ready to Cook Weight Whole Turkey (lbs) 5-8, serves 6-10; 8-12, serves 10-20; 12-16, serves 32-40; 16-20, serves 32-40 and 20-24, serves 40-50. In most cases, large turkeys are more economical and excellent for use in future meals.

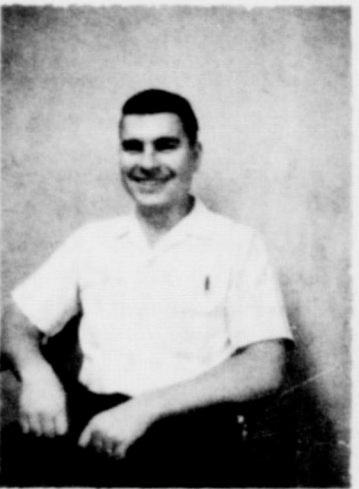

Beef Cattle Demonstration

The beef cattle demonstration utilizing sudan hybrid grass conducted on the Clarence Zybach farm revealed a lot of good information even on a dry year. The test showed an average daily gain per head of 1.8 pounds per day for the fifty days at a cost of 3.8 cents per pound of gain. Growing cattle seems to be one of our most efficient enterprises in Wheeler County.

The grass was planted on June 20 at a rate of 20 pounds per acre on 8 inch spacings. Only 20 pounds of anhydrous ammonia per acre was applied due to the dry weather. Moisture was short the entire growing season compared to 1965.

A rain gage was kept at the demonstration and an accurate record was kept of the rainfall. Following is the amount received each month: April 1.00", May 0.6", June 1.3", July 0.8", August 2.0" and September 2.6". Other farms in the locality received more moisture, but this was the amount received on the demonstration.

The cost per acre not counting interest on the land and cattle was land preparation \$1.00, seed and drilling \$3 and fertilizer \$1. Total cost per acre was \$5 for establishing the grass. Total salt cost for the entire demonstration was \$1.00.

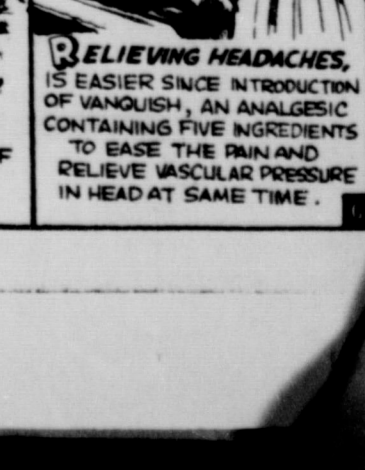
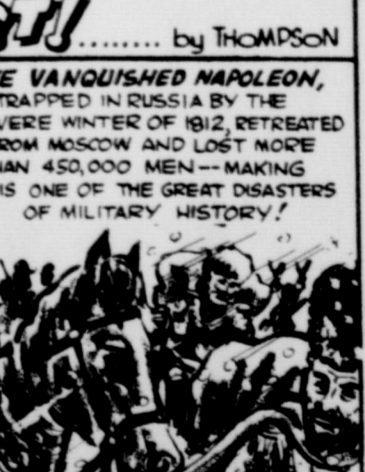
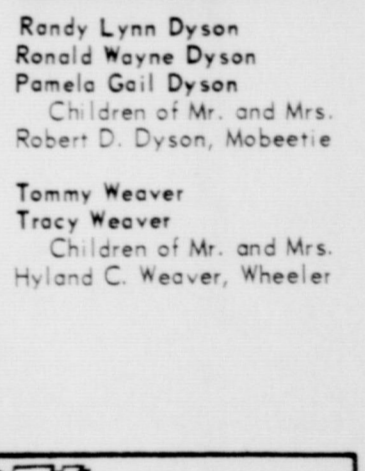
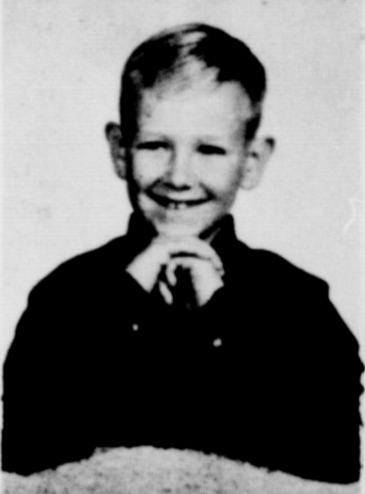
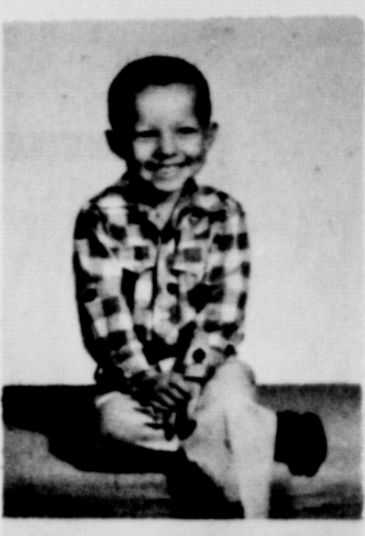
Twenty-two head of heifers were grazed for 50 days beginning August 10th and grazing through September 30th. Beginning weight of the cattle was 430 and final weight was 520# for an average gain of 90# per head. The total pounds of gain produced on the 15 acres was 1980 pounds.

Irregardless of the variations from year to year in the demonstration results, Wheeler County is increasing in stocker cattle each year. This year, not counting cows and calves, we are running between 7 and 10,000 head of different types of stocker calves and yearling. The main reason people are turning to more stockers is the cost per pound of gain under different types of conditions, number of head that can be run per animal unit and allow break even point with a fast turnover.

As long as livestock producers in south and east Texas as well as the other states produce these light cattle, then it is going to be profitable for Wheeler County farmers and ranchers to take advantage of their mistakes and add cheap pounds to their weight. I wouldn't recommend for anyone to try this program unless they have buying knowhow, cheap feed and are willing to spend some time backgrounding these cattle and doctoring sic cattle before they are grazed. This is where management pays big dividends in a stocker program.

Let's assume that 20 offspring from the selected sire are sold each year and that five daughters are kept for replacements each of the three years the bull is used. Each of the 15 daughters should produce five offspring before they are in turn replaced.

The average weaning weight of the daughter's offspring, beginning when they are three years of age and producing for five more years should average about 12 1/2 pounds. Add this to the increased weight of the calves sold and you come up with the \$389 or \$445 increase for the 7 year period.

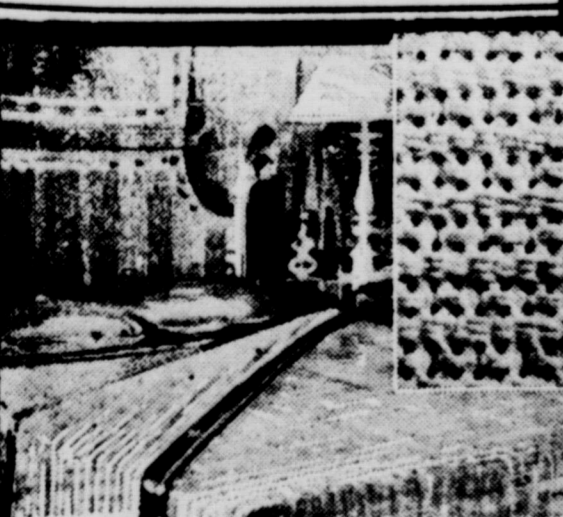
